Explanations, and Principal Articles of the Calendar for 1873.

EXPLANATIONS.

All the calculations are reduced to local mean time for Charlottetown, with the exception of the Sun's Declination and Right Ascension, and the Equation of Time, which are given for Apparent noon. In consequence of the ellipticity of the earth's orbit, the apparent course of the sun along the line of the ecliptic is more rapid in winter than in summer, while the earth's rotation is uniform: hence the length of the day, as marked by the sun's return to the meridian, varies continually. This irregularity has to be compensated by the equation of time, which is to be added or subtracted, as the case requires, from the time as indicated by sundial or other observation, in order to obtain the mean time. So also mean time being known from a correctly going clock, apparent time may be found by reversing the operation.

The various phenomena of the moon's motions and the tides are given to the nearest minute. The bearings, (true, not compass) accompanying the moon's changes are given for the purpose of assisting or testing the matter of weather forecasts.

The days of expected atmospheric disturbance are the days when the Moon in its orbit crosses the equinoctial line, or attains its greatest North or South declination. When these days fall close upon the time of a Moon's change, or Perigee, or both combined, the disturbing influence on the atmospheric Tides is proportionally increased. These cases are marked ** or *** according as two or more of these influences are combined, and the more closely the times agree, the stronger and more certain is the disturbance likely to be.

In addition to the general local disturbance on these days, the effect of a storm generated within the Tropics may be propagated so as to arrive within two or three days, it having been ascertained that the average rate at which such storms travel is about sixteen miles per hour.

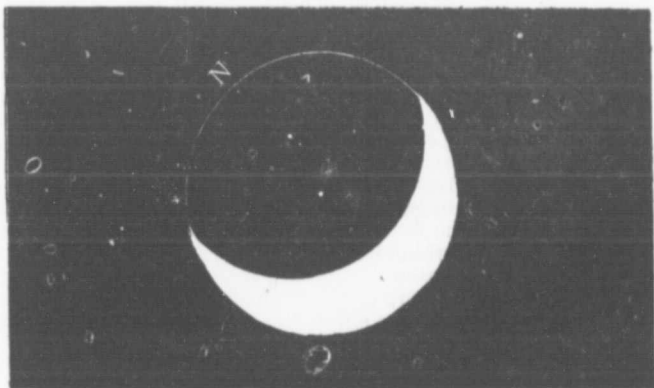
ECLIPSES.

There will be four Eclipses during the year: two Lunar and two Solar, of which latter one will be visible at Charlottetown.

I. A total Eclipse of the Moon. Greenwich mean time of opposition, May 11th, 23h. 10m. 31s. (May 12th, 6h. 58m. 2s. mean time, Charlottetown).

II. A partial Eclipse of the Sun. Visible at Charlottetown. Greenwich mean time of conjunction, May 25th, 21h. 41m. 52s. As seen at Charlottetown, the middle of the Eclipse or greatest phase of obscuration will be a few minutes before sunrise, May 26th. The Moon will finally leave the Sun's disc at 58° from the northernmost point of the limb toward the east at 6 minutes past 5 o'clock. Proportion of Sun's diameter eclipsed. 78.

III. Total Eclipse of Moon, November 4th. Greenwich mean time of opposition, 3h. 39m. 40s. (p. m.)

IV. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, November 19th. Greenwich mean time of conjunction, 16h. 10m. 45s. Not visible to any inhabited part of the earth, the Moon's shadow passing over the south pole, and a limited portion of the southern ocean.

PLANETS.

MERCURY. The apparent motion alternately direct and retrograde between the commencement of the year and the following dates, when he will be stationary, either to the east or the west of the sun:—March 21st, E.; April 17th, W.; July 29th, E.; August 22nd, W.; November 20th, E.; December 9th, W.; being a morning star while to the westward of the sun, and an evening star when to the eastward.

He will be in superior conjunction with the sun, February 21st, June 8th, and September 24th; in inferior conjunction April 5th, August 12th, and November 30th.

VENUS. The apparent motion retrograde from April 13th to May 24th; direct during the rest of the year before and after these dates. In inferior conjunction with the sun, March 5th.

MARS. Motion retrograde between March 21st and June 7th, direct during the rest of the year. In opposition to the sun April 27th, coming to the meridian at midnight, after which he will be a morning star till the end of the year.

JUPITER. Motion retrograde till April 17th, afterward direct till the end of the year. In opposition to the sun, February 14th; in conjunction, September 4th. A morning star from the time of his opposition to his conjunction, after which he reappears as an evening star. His range of motion during the year is about 37° through the constellation Leo.

SATURN. Motion retrograde from May 12th to September 29th; direct during the rest of the year. In conjunction with the sun, January 13th; in opposition, July 24th. His extreme range of motion is about 7° between the constellations Sagittarius and Capricorn.

URANUS. Apparent motion retrograde till April 8th, then direct till November 15th; the rest of the year retrograde. In opposition to the sun, January 23rd; in conjunction, July 28th. Range of motion, 9° in the constellation Cancer.

NEPTUNE. Apparent motion direct till August 1st; retrograde to the end of the year. In conjunction with the sun, April 15th; in opposition, October 19th. Range of motion, 5° in Pisces.

There will be six occultations of Mars by the Moon during the year, and one of Venus, but not one will be observable here.

RAISED RABBIT PIE.—Make a raised crust; cut the meat from a fine young rabbit, season it, and add half a pound of fat bacon, the yolks of four hard-boiled eggs, sliced, and tomato sauce, to color it. Pack the meat tightly, and bake it gently for an hour and a half. To be eaten cold.

APPLE CREAM.—Peel some apples, remove the cores, and cut them in thin slices. Put them into a saucepan with crushed sugar, sliced lemon-peel, and ground ginger, with a little red wine. Let them simmer until they become tender, put them in a dish, and allow them to cool. Then boil a quart of cream with some nutmeg, and add the apples to it, with a sufficient quantity of sugar to sweeten it.

APPLE TANSY.—Pare some apples, cut them into thin round slices, and fry them in butter. Then beat up half a dozen eggs in a quart of cream, and pour them upon the apples.

APPLE PASTE.—Take some apples, peel and core them. Then put in cold water, boil them, and let them drain. Pass the pulp through a strainer and boil over the fire to a proper consistence, and mix with a pound of crushed loaf-sugar for each pound of apples.

APPLE SWEETMEAT.—Pare some apples, and cut them into various shapes, place in glasses and pour some apple jelly over them. Let them remain for a week, and add a quarter of a pound of sugar to each pound of jelly, and season with lemon-juice.

APPLE MARMALADE.—Simmer some apples in water until they become tender, then let them drain. Afterwards strain them through a sieve, and boil them with a strong syrup containing three-quarters of a pound of sugar to each pound of fruit. Mix the whole well together, and preserve it in pots or glasses.

BURNT CREAM.—Beat four or five eggs up in a stew-pan with some flour, and gradually add to them a quart of milk. Then add a little ground cinnamon, with some dried and also some candied lemon peel cut in small pieces. Place a pan over a gentle fire, and simmer the contents, taking care to stir them continually while on the fire. When ready, pour it into a dish, and bake it in an oven until the contents adhere to the sides of the vessel, and then cover the surface with powdered loaf-sugar.

CREAM TOASTS.—Cut some bread in slices as thick as a finger, and lay them in a dish. Pour over them half a pint of cream and a quarter of a pint of milk, and sprinkle some crushed lump sugar and cinnamon on their surface. When the pieces of bread are soaked in the cream, remove them, dip the slices in some raw eggs, and fry them brown in butter.

APPLE PANCAKES.—Cut some peeled apples into round slices, and fry them in butter. Then beat up twenty eggs in a quart of cream, with two drachms each of cinnamon, nutmeg, and ginger, and six ounces of crushed lump-sugar, and pour it over the apples.

APPLE PUFTON.—Prepare some apple marmalade, and mix with it the yolks of five eggs, a handful of bread grated, and some butter; and also some stewed pears, or cherries if thought proper. Make the paste into shape, and bake in a slow oven.

THIN SOUP WITH CABBAGE.—Cut in pieces half a cabbage, rejecting the outside portions, and fry them with a good sized piece of butter—according to the size of the cabbage. When it is so well done that it begins to turn

brown, add water to it, with salt and coarse pepper. and allow it to boil for three-quarters of an hour, or an hour, until the cabbage is done. When served up, the soup is to be poured over bread.

EGG SAUCE FOR FISH.—Boil one or two eggs quite hard. When cold (which you may hasten by throwing them into cold water), chop them quite fine, whites and yolks together. Taste the liquor in which your salt fish and parsnips have been boiled. If not too briny, take some of this, and with the addition of a little water or milk, make good melted butter with flour and butter. When smooth, throw in your chopped-up eggs; give it one boil up, and transfer it to your sause-boat.

VEGETABLE STEW —Put two ounces of butter into a deep stewpan; peel one onion, slice it thin, and put it on the fire till lightly brown (stirring it now and then), add half a pound of vegetables, as taurips, leeks, celery, carrots, etc. Do not peel them, or throw away anything, but wet them well, cut them in a standing direction, put them into the stewpan and fry ten minutes longer; add a pound and a quarter of peas, and fill up with two gallons of water; let it simmer for three hours, or until the peas are in a pulp; mix half a pound of oatmeal with a pint of water, make it into a liquid paste; and pour it into the stewpan, stirring it with a spoon; add three ounces of salt, half an ounce of brown sugar, boil it ten minutes, and it will be ready for use. A little mint, bay-leaf, thyme, marjoram or winter savory, is an improvement, as is also soaking the peas in soft water.

CAULIFLOWER OMELET.—Take the white part of a boiled cauliflower after it is cold, and chop it very small. then mix with it a sufficient quantity of wellbeaten egg to make a very thick batter, then fry it in fresh butter in a small pan, and send it to table hot.

SUGAR BISCUITS.—Mix two pounds of flour and the same quantities of powdered sugar and good butter with nutmeg, cloves, and mace. Make them into paste with some milk or cream. Roll out into a thin layer, cut in squares, prick them with holes, and bake them on tin plates.

POTATO BALLS.—Make mashed potatoes into balls with egg yolk; flour them, fry them in dripping, drain them, and brown before the fire. The above, not browned, but served with brown sauce over them, are a *ragout of potatoes*.

RICE CHEESECAKES.—Simmer two quarts of cream with some mace and cinnamon: then take it off the fire, and put in it half a pound of ground rice, mix them well, and again boil the cream, taking care to stir it continually. Remove the vessel from the fire, and beat up two dozen eggs in it. Again make it boil, continuing to stir it, until it becomes thick like curd, sweeten it, and add half a pound of blanched almonds beaten up with sugar into powder.

LEMON DUMPLINGS.—Mince four ounces of suet, and mix it with the same quantity of moist sugar, half a pound of bread-crumbs, and the juice and peel of a lemon cut small. Put them into tea-cups, and boil them for three-quarters of an hour.

LEMON CHEESECAKES.—Simmer together in a saucepan a pound of loaf-sugar, a quarter of a pound of butter, four eggs, the juice of two lemons, and the rind cut small. When the materials have become of the consistence of honey, pour into a jar and preserve for use.

CUSTARDS—Throw into a pint of new milk part of the very thin rind of a lemon, a little cinnamon stick, and two ounces of loaf-sugar; let them simmer till the milk is nicely flavored, then strain, and turn into it the thoroughly beaten yolks of four eggs; mix together, and then pour the custard into a jug; set this over the fire in a pan of boiling water, and keep the custard stirred gently, but without ceasing, till it begins to thicken; then move the spoon rather more quickly, making it always touch the bottom of the jug, until the mixture is brought to the point of boiling, when it must be instantly taken from the fire, or it will curdle in a moment. Keep stirring it till nearly cold, then add some brandy and a few drops of essence of almonds. This makes a small quantity of custard, but enough for a tipsy cake, or perhaps it would fill eight custard glasses.

HOW TO RESTORE STAINED AND DISCOLORED MUSLINS.—Discolored muslins may be whitened, if they are laid in a flat dish with suds made of white soap, and set out in the sun. This takes time, and the suds have to be renewed daily. In the country, away from the smoke of towns, white linen may be bleached by being wetted with soapsuds, and spread out upon the grass in the sun.

LEMON AND SUET PUDDINGS.—Take some suet, cut it small, currants, sugar grated lemon-peel, ground ginger, eggs, and bread-crumbs: mix them into a paste, roll them into balls, tie up in a buttered cloth, and boil them for twenty minutes.

TO TAKE STOPPERS OUT OF BOTTLES OR DECANTERS.—Take the bottle or decanter by the neck with the left hand, and place the first finger at the back of the stopper. Take a piece of wood in the right hand, and tap the stopper first one side, then the other, turning the decanter round in the hand. A quick succession of little short taps is the most effective. If this plan fails, wind a bit of rough string once round the neck, one end of the string being held by one person, the other by another; pull backward and forward till the neck becomes hot with the friction. Then tap as before. Stoppers often become wedged into decanters from the wrong stopper being used. To avoid this the bottom of the stopper should be scratched with a number, and a corresponding number scratched under the bottom of the decanter.

TO WASH HAIR BRUSHES.—Fill a pan with hot water, with a piece of soda dissolved in it—say a quarter of an ounce to half a gallon of water. Comb the loose hair out of the brushes; take one brush at a time by the handle and dip it in the water without wetting the back of the brush. It must be dipped several times. Then rinse in cold water, and put near the fire or in the open air till dry.

TO PURIFY RIVER OR MUDDY WATER.—In a quart of warm water dissolve an ounce of alum, and stir it about in the proportion of a teaspoonful to each gallon. The impurities present will settle at the bottom, and the water will in the course of a day be quite clear.

A PLEASANT STRENGTHENING DRINK.—Boil very gently in a saucepan the following ingredients: The rind of a lemon, a small piece of cinnamon, and a teaspoonfull of pearl barley, in about one pint of cold water. When the barley is tender, strain through a fine sieve, and sweeten with a spoonful of treacle, honey, or sugar, according to taste.

A NICE CORN-BREAD.—Thicken one pint and a half of rich butter-milk with corn-meal to the consistency of batter; dissolve one teaspoonful of soda in a cup of new milk, add a little salt, and beat very light; pour this into buttered pans, and bake two hours. Serve hot.

FANCY METHOD OF TARRING FENCES.—Having added to the tar some whitening, with coloring powder in accordance to the color required, heat the whole together in a cauldron after the usual manner, and apply it with a large paint-brush. It looks very well for outhouses and yard fences, and is a great preservative to the wood. Venetian red and french yellow are very good for the purpose of coloring. For roofs no color is required, as the white is preferable, reflecting the heat of the sun. For this purpose it is well to sprinkle the roof over with whitening before the tar is cold.

TO TAKE RUST OUT OF STEEL.—Cover the steel well with sweet-oil, and let it remain there for two or three days; then use unslacked lime finely powdered, and rub with it till all the rust disappears.

WASHING CHINTZES.—These should always be washed in dry weather, but if it is very cold it is better to dry them by the fire than risk spoiling the colors from freezing in the open air. It is better, if possible, to defer their washing till the weather is suitable.

A VERY SUPERIOR CEMENT for joining wood may be made by soaking isinglass or gelatine in water until it swells. The water then should be drained off, and spirit poured on it, and the vessel placed in a pan of hot water until the isinglass is dissolved. This cement must then be kept in a well-stoppered bottle.

WEDDING OR CHRISTENING CAKE.—Take three pounds of butter, four and a half pounds of flour, three pounds of sugar, six pounds of currants, one and a half pounds of candied lemon, half a pound of almonds, half a pound of citron, thirty eggs, a pint of brandy, and a pint of milk. LEMON CREAM.—Peel three lemons, and squeeze out the juice into a quart of good milk; add the peel cut in pieces, and cover the vessel for a few hours. Then add some eggs beaten up, and a pint of water well sweetened. Strain the milk, and simmer it over a gentle fire until it becomes of the consistence of cream, and pour it into jelly-glasses.

HERBS.—When hung up to dry in loose bundles, herbs soon lose their odor; they should be thinly spread out, shaded from the sun, and when dried pressed together and put into paper bags. It is an excellent plan to strip off the leaves, rub them fine, put them separately into wide-mouthed bottles, and labeled. Thyme, when broad-leaved and common, is preferable, but the lemon thyme is preferable in certain dishes. Mint should be gathered when about six inches high.

TO DESTROY BED BUGS.—There are innumerable receipts for the destruction of this household pest. One of the best is the following:—Scald the bedsteads, and wipe them dry; mix ordinary lamp-oil with a little quick-silver, and apply this to the cracks with a feather.

VIENNA CREAM.—The whites of two eggs, two ounces of red current jelly, two ounces of raspberry jelly, one ounce of sifted loaf-sugar; put all into a bowl, and beat until it rises into a stiff froth; serve in a glassdish or in custard cups. Though of quite a dark shade of red when beginning to whip it, it becomes paler and paler as the froth rises, and when finished is a very pale shade of pink. Apricot jelly can be used also, but requires some drops of cochineal to give it a proper tint of color.

TO CLEAN LOOKING-GLASSES.—Having dusted the glass with a soft duster quite free from grit, in order not to scratch the glass, sponge it with diluted spirits of wine or gin, and dust over it a little very fine powder through a muslin bag; rub the glass, with a light hand, with the soft duster, and finish off with a soft piece of silk, or old handkerchief.

ARROWROOT BISCUITS OR DROPS.—Half a pound of butter, six eggs, half a pound of flour, six ounces of arrowroot, half a pound of pounded loaf-sugar. Beat the butter to a cream; whisk the eggs to a strong froth, add them to the butter, stir in the flour, a little at a time, and beat the mixture well. Break down all the lumps from the arrowroot, and add that with the sugar to the other ingredients. Mix all well together, drop the dough on a buttered tin, in pieces the size of a half crown, and bake the biscuits about a quarter of an hour in a slow oven.

Spirits, namely, Gin, Cordials, and Whiskey, imported into this Island at the Ports of Charlottetown, Georgetown, Summerside, and Souris, not exceeding the strength of proof by Syke's hydrometer, and so in proportion for any greater strength of proof, per gal. 72 cents and $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

Spirits, namely, Gin, Cordials, and Whiskey imported into this Island at any other Ports, for every gallon thereof of any strength under and not exceeding the strength of proof 28 by the bubble, 72 cents and $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

And for every bubble below 28 in number by the bubble, an additional 6 cents per gallon.

Rum or other distilled Spirituous Liquors, imported into this Island, not exceeding the strength of proof by Syke's hydrometer, and so in proportion for any greater strength than the strength of proof, and landed at the Ports of Charlottetown, Georgetown, Summerside, and Souris, per gallon, 40 cents and $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

Rum, or other distilled Spirituous Liquors, imported into this Island at any other Ports, for every gallon thereof of any strength under and not exceeding the strength of proof 28 by the bubble, 40 cents and $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

And for every bubble below 28 in number by the bubble an additional 4 cents per gallon.

Lemon Syrup, Shrub, Santa, and Gingerette per gallon, 17 cents, and $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

Tinctures, per gallon, 33 cents, and $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.

Spirituous Liquors, on all manufactured or distilled in this Island, 16 cents per gallon.

All articles in the full or colony whatsoever, and All articles imported by use.

Table of Exemptions.

All articles in the following table imported from any country or colony whatsoever, shall be exempt from duty, to wit:

All articles imported by the Lieutenant Governor, for his own use.

Baggage, apparel, household effects, working tools and implements used and in the use of persons or families arriving in this Island, if used abroad by them, and not intended for any other person or persons, or for sale.

Flour, (wheat) Rye, Corn and Cornmeal, imported from any country or colony whatsoever.

Organs, Bells, Heating Furnaces, imported expressly for any Church, Chapel, or Sacred Edifice, and intended to be placed therein.

Ordnance and Commissariat Stores or war munitions of any kind, or military baggage or clothing brought into this Island for the use of Her Majesty's Army or Navy.

Military Clothing and Accoutrements for the use of Her Majesty's Volunteer Corps in this Island shall in no case be liable to duty.

Blocks, Rigging and Sails, which may have been used to take new vessels from this Island to a market for sale, if such blocks, rigging and sails shall be returned forthwith after the sale of the vessel, direct to this Island by the exporter thereof, and shall have previously paid, and shall have been charged with the duties by law imposed thereon, on the first importation thereof into this Island.

All articles required for the construction of any Railways now under contract, or which may or shall be contracted for, by or with the Government, together with all locomotives, rolling stock, machinery, and all other articles of whatsoever nature and kind required for the completion thereof, and which shall be imported by the contractor or contractors thereof, for the construction of the same.

On the re-importation of any sails, rigging, blocks, cables or anchors, which may have been used in taking vessels to market, the person re-importing the same shall make oath before a Collector of Impost that such articles are the identical sails, rigging, blocks, cables, or anchors, as were so previously exported in any such vessel in manner aforesaid.

The several articles hereinafter enumerated, being the growth or production of the Dominion of Canada or of Newfoundland, shall be exempt from the duties hereby imposed upon them, and shall be admitted into this Island free of duty, when imported direct from the said Provinces or either of them, provided the same shall not pass through or be imported from any country not reciprocating with this Island, as long as the said articles are admitted into the Dominion of Canada and Newfoundland, or either of them, free of duty, namely—Grain and breadstuffs of all kinds, vegetables, fruits, seeds, hay and straw, animals, salted and fresh meats, butter, cheese, lard, tallow, hides, horns, wool, fish, undressed skins and furs of all kinds, ores of all kinds, iron, in pigs and blooms, copper, lead in pigs, grinding stones and all kinds of stones, earth, coal, lime, ochres, gypsum, ground and unground rock salt, wood, timber and lumber of all kinds, firewood, ashes, fish oil—namely, train oil, spermaceti oil, head matter blubber fins and skins, the produce of fish or creatures living in the water, poultry, eggs, pitch, tar, turpentine, rice, broom corn and bark, dye stuffs, flax, hemp and tow (unmanufactured) unmanufactured tobacco, rags, and cotton wool.
