MIDDLETON'S PLANING MILL.

One of Farmersville's Busy Hives of Productive Industry.

This week's illustration is a good reproduction of a sketch by our special artist, C. C. Slack, of Middleton's planing mill situated at the east end of the village, in what is commonly



called the "Flats" or "Gordontown." A stranger driving into the village from Brockville, Plum Hollow or Delta, would be very likely to think from appearances that Farmersville possessed no manufactures; but if he should come from Mallorytown, he would conclude that quite an extensive manufacturing town was before

him. The tall smoke stacks of Gordon's woolen mills, Middleton's wood working factory and Saunders' grist and saw mills, would bear evidence that there is an extensive manufacturing business carried on within our borders.

Nearly thirty years ago Horatio Robeson erected a stone building near the old grist mill. This was used for a number of years by Mr. Robeson and others, as a tannery, when it was converted into a shingle mill by Wm. J. Saunders, who in turn sold out to T. W. Bush, who for a time carried on an extensive manufactory of butter bowls and other turned ware. The business did not prove successful in hands of Mr. Bush, and the property was purchased by the present owner, Mr. Elijah Middleton.

Early in the year 1886 Mr. Middleton, finding that his rapidly increasing business called for more power, added a new annex, 30 x 22, and placed in position a fine 40-horse power engine, built by Black Bros., of Brockville. A line of shafting 56 feet in length transmits the power to the various machines in the building. In the south end of the annex is a large and powerful planing machine. Doors at each end of the room are directly in line with the bed of the machine, so that the longest strips of lumber can be readily passed through the

planer. The boiler room is made fireproof by being sheeted with tin. Adjoining the engine room is a large drying kiln, capable of holding over a thousand feet of lumber. By means of this kiln green lumber can be properly seasoned in a very short time.

Passing into the main building, we find a tongueing, grooving and moulding machine, manufactured by Cant, of Galt. A slitting saw and a turning lathe also occupy convenient positions in the lower story. The second floor contains a Goutley tenoning machine, a matcher and finisher, a sand-papering machine, a panel raiser, a mortising machine, a matcher and finisher and several smaller machines which are necessary adjuncts to the manufacturing carried on. There are usually from four to six hands employed, who, with the aid of the machinery, turn out a large amount of work daily.

Carpenters and builders have frequently stated in our hearing that Middleton's doors and sash are superior in many respects to those turned out by other manufacturers. Mr. Middleton insists upon the greatest attention being given to every detail of the manufacture, and that nothing shall be turned out which is not as near perfection as it possibly can be made.

GENERAL NEWS SUMMARY.

Official notice is given of a new election in Dorchester, the seat being re-elected vacant by the death of Mr. Duchesnay. In the Yorkmouth case the election has been declared void by the courts. The Quebec Government is unceasingly extending timber steals in the province by owners of limits and lumberers, who by means of fraudulent returns have been robbing the public domain for years. The highest price realized at the recent Oaklands Jersey sale was \$1,710. Grading on the Red River Valley R. R. was completed on the 30th ult. The injunction proceedings are still pending in the Courts. Browning, who sues for an injunction to restrain the building of the line across his lots, admitted on examination that he purchased the land for the express purpose of obstructing the road, but he declined to swear that the C. P. R. backed him up. On the 5th ult. two convicts escaped from Kingston penitentiary, and have so far eluded arrest. They had charge of the warden's yacht, and seeing an opportunity to escape, were not slow in taking advantage of it. They steamed out of the harbor at full speed, fired at by numerous guards whose shot did not take effect. There were no steamers at the dock, and consequently chase was impossible, until the convicts had secured ten miles of a start. The yacht was found scuttled on the beach near Oswego. The N. R. R. docks at Collingwood were destroyed by fire Thursday. Loss, \$18,000; insurance, \$10,000. There was a funny incident at Stratford last Wednesday. On the arrival of a train from the west a gentleman stepped out and was immediately embraced by two women, who each claimed him as her husband. The women then commenced a lively fight over the man. The true state of the peculiar case did not transpire. There is some talk of indicting Manager Hickson, of the Grand Trunk, for manslaughter, in connection with the accident on the 12th of July, by which two men were killed owing to the company's alleged negligence.

Heavy gales did serious damage in Great Britain last week. In the Ramsey election the Gladstonians nearly succeeded in gaining a victory. This constituency has generally elected a Conservative by acclamation. Current political events point to a re-

Mr. A. Coad, Toledo, has concluded a sale, at 12 3/16 cents, of the product of the Silver Creek, Robinson's Mills and Newbiss cheese factories, during the last three months of this season.

There was an interesting meeting in the Baptist Church, Brockville, the occasion being the bidding farewell to Miss Alexander, prior to her departure for India, whither she goes as a missionary.

A very promising two-year-old colt, of the Rysdik strain, passed through here on Monday. Its height is 15 hands 1 inch; weight, 815 pounds; color, a beautiful jet black. The colt is owned by Mr. D. McClarry, of McIntosh Mills.

Jerrold Arlington Cook, of New Orleans, the celebrated Temperance orator, will this evening lecture in the North Church, under the auspices of the W. C. T. U. Subject of Lecture: "Is Liquor Selling a Crime?" The chair will be taken punctually at eight o'clock.

A very serious accident happened at Greenhill yesterday (Monday). A number of persons were engaged in felling some trees on the grounds of the Methodist Church, at that place, to make room for some sheds that are about being removed to another position. Several persons were standing around, when an axe in the hands of Reuben Peav, jr., came off the handle and struck Omer Willoughby on the leg, near the knee, inflicting a serious and painful wound. Dr. Cornell was sent for, and dressed the wound.

The following, from the Montreal Gazette, will be read with interest by cheesemongers.—One of the largest transactions in cheese that has ever taken place on this market was accomplished on Saturday, when the balance of the make of the Allan-Grove combination, which comprises 66 factories, was bought by a Montreal firm. The quantity involved is about 25,000 boxes, and the price paid was 12 7/8 cents for August, and 18 cents for

September and October. To give an idea of the size of the transaction it is only necessary to state that the 25,000 boxes represent a value of about \$225,000.

The Rev. Mr. Emerson, of Westport, preached in the Baptist Church on Sunday evening. The congregation were impressed with the earnest and gifted eloquence of the preacher.

Messrs. Webster & Whelan, contractors for the portion of the B. & W. R. R. between Westport and Newboro, are advertising in Perth papers for 200 men to work on the line.

Yesterday afternoon a number of local sports assembled on the trotting track to witness an informal race between R. B. Alguire's "Little Mac" and Lew. Wiltse's "Belle," for stakes of \$10 a side. The pace was lively and the race exciting. "Little Mac" was the winner, taking two straight heats.

The Financial Meeting of the Brockville District of the Methodist Church will be held at Lyn, on Wednesday, 25th inst., beginning at 9.30 a. m. The Sunday School Convention in connection with the District will be held at the same place on the previous day. The exercises will comprise a children's meeting at 2.30 p. m., and a meeting in the evening for general discussion.

The Rev. Mr. Greener, of Lansday, occupied the pulpit of the Methodist church on Sunday morning. Mr. Greener is an old and much loved friend of the Rev. Mr. Rogers, and was a guest at the parsonage during his stay in Farmersville. Notwithstanding his advanced age, 75 years, Mr. Greener retains his mental faculties to a remarkable degree. For the last sixteen years he has been the financier for the Lindsay District, a post requiring first-class business tact and ability, and which he fills to the entire satisfaction of all concerned.

The regular monthly meeting of the Farmersville auxiliary of the Women's Foreign Missionary Society in connection with the Presbyterian Church, was held on Thursday afternoon (1st of Sept.) at the residence of the pastor. Since its formation some time ago, through the instrumentality of Mrs. Blair, of Prescott, the auxiliary has increased in interest and usefulness and at the meeting on Thursday last, three new members were received. The occasion was taken advantage of by the society to entertain their president (Mrs. Pullar) and family to tea, in what may be called the manse parlour, and with this object in view the visitors brought with them the materials for a recherche repast, which having found their way to the dining room table, presented a very rich and attractive appearance. The business of the auxiliary being concluded, the company sat down to tea, and enjoyed the good things so abundantly provided. The gathering was a most enjoyable one in every way, and it may be mentioned as an item of interest, that the china used on the occasion, some of which deserves to be described as antique, was brought by the President of the Society all the way from the metropolis of Scotland, and that amongst others, Mrs. Saunders, son, and Mrs. Dr. Addison were accorded the distinction of drinking tea last Thursday evening out of china cups over 200 years old.

The Presbyterian congregation, recently organized under the pastoral charge of the Rev. James Pullar celebrated their first sacramental communion on Sabbath the 28th ult. This being the first time such a service has been held here according to Presbyterian usage, the occasion was of more than ordinary interest to many. There was a large attendance, the church being completely filled. After the usual devotional exercises, the pastor delivered an appropriate discourse from Ex. xxiv. 11. "Also they saw God and did eat and drink." The elders elect (Messrs. Arch. Kincaid and Ed. Tennant), were then ordained to office by prayer and laying on of hands. These, with the minister, compose the session of the congregation. The roll of membership having been read, the audience joined in singing the communion hymn, (paraphrase xxxv.) during which the elders uncovered the sacred elements, and, with the minister took their place at the communion table. The intending communicants—upwards of fifty in number—including several members of other christian churches, (to whom a cordial invitation to participate in the sacred ordinance was extended) occupied the centre of the church. The Lord's supper was then observed in the simple but impressive form of the Presbyterian church, and after a brief address and the singing of a hymn, the solemn service was closed with the benediction. At the preparatory service held on the Thursday evening previous, the rite of baptism was administered to eight candidates for membership, who were afterwards received into full communion.
