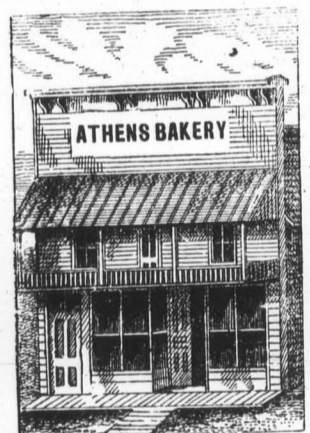

### THE ATHENS POST OFFICE INVESTIGATION.

Synopsis of the Evidence Taken Before Judge Wilkinson on the Charge of Political Partisanship Preferred Against Thos. Bernsey, Postmaster at Athens.

The investigation into the charges of political partisanship against the Postmaster of Athens was held last Wednesday, the 24th inst., in the township hall. The government was represented by A. E. Baker of Merrickville, while Mr. Bernsey's interests were looked after by Jas. Hutchison, of the firm of Hutchison & Fisher, Brockville.

Very little formality was used in the opening proceedings. Mr. Baker read over the names of some 25 or 30 witnesses that he would like to have excluded from the room while the evidence of Mr. Bernsey (who he proposed calling as the first witness) was taken. Mr. Hutchison strongly objected to Mr. Bernsey being called first, but the Judge ruled that all persons were competent witnesses and the prosecution were at liberty to call the witnesses as they saw fit.

Mr. Bernsey was accordingly sworn and said, in part, as follows: "I have held the position of postmaster for seven or eight years. During that time he had belonged to the Conservative party, but had not been a member of the local organization for the past year, and had paid no dues in the last year. Was a delegate to the last Dominion election convention at Delta, and was present when the voting for candidates took place. Was not a scrutineer there. Was at Frankville at the McCarthy meeting, saw Howison there—he was noisy and took him down stairs, was not fighting with him or others. Did not have talk with Roman, but often talked about remedial bill. Did not go to Roman that he was a fool to vote Grit on account of the remedial bill. Will not say that I did not argue with parties on the election. Went with Carroll to Henderson's. Pierce took J. F. Wood. Went to Henderson's to sell him buggy. Cannot say if I talked to Henderson on politics or not. Saw Frank Foley before the election. On election day he worked for me putting Paris green on potatoes and I gave him one dollar. Hon. J. F. Wood held a meeting in Athens. Went to station with others to meet him and drove in. I have discussed politics in my private office. I sometimes make up the post office books there. Made a bet with H. Taplin of \$10 that the Conservatives would get a majority in Ontario. I lost, and P. Bernsey, who held the money, paid it over to Taplin. Dr. Chamberlain and myself talked bet, but did not make any. Don't remember writing letters to absentee voters, but may have done so. Saw Geo. Cranson on the day before the election. Knew Sam Covey was away. Do not think I wrote to Covey. Heard through his boy that he was coming home to vote. The Dobbs Brothers had one of my negatives on election day and Geo. Gainford the other. Had Ab. Johnson's horse on that day and drove voters to the poll. Do not know how many polls I visited that day. Took Hollingsworth to the polls, also Thos. Foley, who asked me to take him. Went to Chas. Hull's to buy gooseberries. Hull

Roman broke in on conversation several times and Bernsey gave him some short answers. Heard Bernsey tell Roman he was a fool to bet on the Catholics separate schools in Manitoba.

N. J. Roman said he was at Armstrong House talking with Dr. Chamberlain when Bernsey came in. They talked on election matters. Bernsey said that if the Conservatives were returned to power they would give the Catholics separate schools in Manitoba.

The cross examination by Mr. Hutchison did not bring out anything different to that before stated.

Fred. Pierce said he held the stakes in the Bernsey-Taplin bet. The bet was made before election day and paid over some days after the election. Had nothing to do getting witnesses for or against at this trial. Was in Lombardy last week looking for a servant girl. Asked for Geo. Cranson, of Klynne, the hot-liquor, who did not know where he was but sent a boy out to enquire, who said Cranson was at Franktown. Told Klynne the chances were he would be wanted. Did not go for or send for him. Have no idea of the whereabouts of Cranson. Remembered Woot's meeting in Athens. Bernsey did not ask me to throw my bar open on that occasion.

Bernsey said you had better tell him he could go, and witness said that he was not electioneering for the Conservative party. Bernsey and S. A. Taplin often discussed politics in front of his store.

As K. Redmond saw Bernsey at the western poll on election day. Nich. Hollingsworth said he asked Bernsey to go with him to the western poll, where he voted, and he got in and went up and back with him. Wm. A. Lewis said he had a conversation with Bernsey in the post office on the evening of election day. Bet \$1 with him on the result.
