OIL AT LONG ISLAND.—Mr Kinsman Palmer, of Long Island, recently had a well dug near his barn for the purpose of watering his stock. He had it supplied with a first-class pump and it was yielding an abundance of beautiful, clear and pure water, when, lo to behold, one morning about Christmas time, as Mr Palmer went to pump water for his cattle, he noticed something unusual in the appearance of the water. Upon examination he found that his well, instead of producing beautiful, clear, cold water, was, instead, giving genuine kerosene oil. For a number of years past Mr Palmer had watered his stock at a watering trough adjacent to his premises which he has kept up pretty much at his own expense during these years and also looked after the cutting of the ice in the trough during the hard, freezing weather. Oftentimes after cutting the trough open and clearing out the ice numerous cattle from the neighboring farms would drink up the water before Mr Palmer could get his out of the barn. During the past summer Mr Palmer conceived the idea of digging a well nearer his premises than the before mentioned trough, so that he could water his stock when it pleased him without being annoyed with other cattle. During the cold snap about Christmas time the trough froze solidly over, and as Mr Palmer had no further use of his water, did not, as was his usual custom, cut open the ice one of these cold mornings, and consequently there was no water for the dairy cattle which frequented this trough until a grand rally was made by interested parties, who cut out the obnoxious ice. Strange to say, the next morning Mr Palmer's well gave him kerosene oil instead of water, but whether the allowing the trough to freeze up and remain so for a longer period than usual had anything to do with the production of the oil is an open question.
