THE TRIAL OF ALCOHOL, CHARGED WITH MURDER, ROBBERY, &c.
SUPERIOR COURT OF PUBLIC OPINION IN AND FOR THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

The People vs. Alcohol.
Present—Hon. R. CAMDOR, Chief Justice.

Att. Gen.—Have you ever known any one under the influence, and by the persuasion of the prisoner, set fire to a building, and destroy it?
Wit.—I have, sir, heard of several such instances, but never saw any one. That of a lad who had been much in the company of the prisoner, who repeatedly urged him to fire the barn of a person who had offended him. The boy refused for a time, but one night he and the prisoner were together, and the boy resolved to do it. He was arrested on suspicion, confessed the deed, and was sentenced to the state prison fourteen years.
Att. Gen.—I have done with the witness.
Cross-examination.
An. Ap.—Mr. Sobremind, you say you have once associated with my client, Mr. Alcohol, and that you were much attached to his society: did he not on all occasions conduct himself like a peaceable and orderly citizen, and did you see him engaged in any riots and broils, disturbing the public peace?
Wit.—I did not say, sir, that he was riotous or disorderly himself but that it was almost his universal practice to cause others to be so; and I did not say either that his manner and appearance were not unimpeachable, and calculated to please the fancy; for herein lies his great art lie, and because he is so pleasant and agreeable, and under a smiling face can hide a venomous heart, he is so much more dangerous—Had he come to me in a rough and boisterous manner, I should never have associated with him. I never knew him to appear to any one in his real character, but always in disguise with a promise of something he was never able to perform.
An. Ap.—Well, sir, you say that you and my client have once had a serious disagreement. Has the difficulty ever been settled?
Wit.—We had no disagreement, sir; that is what he would never do for me, and so I left it. He never so much as asked me the reason; neither did I think it necessary to tell him.
An. Ap.—You remarked that he had lost most of your property for you at cards; had you no hard words about that?
Wit.—Not say sir. By my own folly I put myself into his power, and when I saw what was done, I merely determined to leave him, and grow wiser from the past.
An. Ap.—Well, sir, you said that you had known the peace of many families destroyed by my client; what reason have you for charging family broils and contention upon him?
Wit.—The very best of reasons, sir; for before he came among them all was peace, but so soon as he was admitted, discord prevailed. And then I have seen the same families, which were ever at variance when he was present, live harmoniously when he was expelled. And, sir, I speak experimentally upon this subject, for till I associated with the prisoner, I never knew what it was to be angry with any of my family; but when that acquaintance was formed we hardly knew what peace was: I was always discontented, unhappy, peevish and fretful; everything went wrong, simply because I was wrong myself. As soon as I left associating with the prisoner, I lost those feelings, my natural cheerfulness returned, and now no man lives more pleasantly with his family than myself.
An. Ap.—Did not my client ever repay or compensate you for a part of all the property you say he lost for you?
Wit.—Not a cent, sir, not a cent.
An. Ap.—You can sit down, sir.
The next witness sworn, Dr. Rhabarb.
Att. Gen.—Dr. Rhabarb, are you acquainted with the prisoner at the bar?
Wit.—I am, sir; I have known him well for fifteen or twenty years, perhaps more.
Att. Gen.—Well, sir, please tell the court what you know of his course of life.
Wit.—I can say no good of him, sir. The first time I ever saw him, was in the house of one of my patients. He had been called in because the family had heard some of his friends say he was eminent for his medical powers. It was a severe case of inflammatory rheumatism, and he nearly killed the patient.
Att. Gen.—Do you consider him as possessed of any such powers?
Wit.—No sir; I do not think he ever cured a single individual; while I am sure he has killed thousands and hundreds of thousands.
Att. Gen.—Well, sir, please tell the court what is his serious and solemn opinion, that nineteen-twentieths of the diseases which afflict mankind, are first caused or greatly aggravated

by the different nostrums and prescriptions, which he assists in compounding.
Att. Gen.—Has not the prisoner a diploma from some college of physicians or medical board?
Wit.—I cannot tell; I never have seen or heard of any. He has some concern with several patents for bitters, medicaments, syrups, &c., all of which are so many deleterious nostrums, made to sell, not to heal.
Att. Gen.—Doctor, have you ever known that the prisoner investigated any one to the commission of murder or manslaughter?
Wit.—I never knew or heard of but few cases of either which he did not investigate; and I have been present at several public executions, and in every instance they charged the prisoner as persuading them to the commission of the crime for which they suffered.
Att. Gen.—Will you be so good as to state the diseases which in your opinion are caused by the nostrums of the prisoner?
Wit.—Dropsy, consumption, dyspepsia, apoplexy, gout, mania, and some others.
Att. Gen.—What would be the effect upon the practice of physicians, if the prisoner, Alcohol, should be removed from this country?
Wit.—Beneficial decidedly. It would be much to their comfort, as well as, in my opinion, to the interest and happiness of the community generally. There would not only be less sickness, but disease would be more easily cured. So far as my observation has extended, the physical and moral influence of the prisoner, is decidedly bad; and the evil is so very great as to call loudly for removal.
Att. Gen.—Have you ever known, Dr. R. any cases of disagreement in families, which you had reason to think were caused wholly or in part by the prisoner?
Wit.—I never knew any such instances, which were not owing in some degree at least, to his influence. His presence generally produces family disturbances sooner or later.
Att. Gen.—Have you ever known any instances of young men, who fall into the practices of gambling, dissipation, profaneness, &c., chiefly, or in part, by the seductions of the prisoner?
Wit.—I never have known a young man become a gambler, a jockey, a frequenter of low houses, a spendthrift, a counterfeiter, a forger, a thief, a robber, or a murderer, but I was able to trace his first departure from the paths of virtue, to an acquaintance with Alcohol, and a habit of frequenting his society. My observations on this point have been of many years continuance, and I presume I have on my books the names of three hundred persons of the above class, whom I have attended, some of them weak after week and month after month, and yet they never have paid me a cent, and I do not expect they ever will. An. Ap.—Sufficient, sir, you sit down.
John LITTLE, Esq., an eminent lawyer, was next called and sworn.
Att. Gen.—Mr. Coke, you will be so good as to tell this court what you know of the prisoner, and of the crimes and misdemeanors of which he is accused?
Wit.—Well, sir, in general, I must say as other witnesses have said, I know not any good of him. The things charged in the indictment are all true, and, if necessary, I can depose to the allegations of each and every count.
Att. Gen.—I suppose, Mr. Coke, that will be necessary, as the counsel for the defence will hardly be willing to admit general testimony without specifications.
Wit.—I will take the counts in their order, if you will permit me to refer to the indictment to enable me to do it.
Att. Gen.—There can be no objection.
Wit.—In regard to the first count then; I know the prisoner, Alcohol, to be a wretched of the worst description. There are a multitude of instances in which by representing himself, his business, and his qualification to others, he has induced them, by means of forgery, and almost every species of false pretence, to defraud honest men of their money and property, in order to squander it upon him. I can particularly many cases if his counsel desire it.
An. Ap.—It is unnecessary at present.
Wit.—As to the second count I know this to be true, for all my class in college, which was large, only one beside myself has escaped his seductions. The rest were led by him to the tavern, the dram-shop, the gaming table, the theatre, the booth, and the grave, and all this in early life. Some of them were young men of good families, and of distinguished talents. The last one died but a few months since, a poor, miserable outcast, a grief to his friends, and a disgrace to his country. The third count is true, for as an officer of justice, I have again and again been called upon to attend such places, either to keep the peace, or to investigate some breach of it; and I can solemnly declare that I never yet saw a horse race, or anything of that kind, where he was not present, and in some cases out of ten, he investigated some riot before he left the ground. My papers will show hundreds of cases of assaults and batteries, attempts to kill, breaches of the peace, &c., &c., at such places, which have come before me either as justice or attorney, and I have invariably found the prisoner at the bottom of the whole. I have a minute of more than a hundred such cases which I have tried in less than a year. The fourth count—I have seen many instances of his truth. Very many females have come before me, and entered complaint against their husbands

for neglect and abuse. And never has such a charge come before me but on investigation I found it true, so we alleged, that their neglect and abuse was caused by the investigations of the prisoner, and that he was generally, if not always, present, aiding and abetting. The fifth charge—I have been present at a great number of examinations in cases of assaults, and in each, as has appeared in testimony, the person was in habits of constant intercourse with the accused, and instigated by him to the commission of the deed. I will give to the court some. I have often seen him opening, and successfully, to persons masters and pilots of steamboats and others to neglect their duty, and even to run foul of other vessels. Sometimes I have seen him put a helmsman to sleep until it was too late to save a ship from sailing on a rock. I myself have witnessed several! If it is necessary I can be equally minute with the other counts of the bill.

GLORIOUS FROM LATE PAPERS.

THE RUSSIAN ROYAL FAMILY.—The Emperor has in the last five months grown older than in the preceding ten years, and wears an expression of haggard care both in his countenance and bearing. The late to the throne, Alexander, is in a rapid decline, and is at night afflicted with such heavy sweats that his bed-linen has frequently to be changed twice the same night. As he is known to be devoted to the present war, even to such an extent as to have prayed his father on his knees to assist, plenty of Russians are found who hint darkly at the singularity of his being attacked with symptoms dissimilar from any that his family have ever suffered from just at the very time when his known sentiments are so ardent with those of his family and the people. Delicate allusions to some antecedents in Russian history suffice to make the hint intelligible even to the most uneducated peasant.

HANNOVER AND THE RUSSIAN TROOPS.—By a letter with which we (Medical Times) have been favoured from Constantinople, dated June 15, we find that the whole force of infantry at Varua, Soutari, and Gallipoli is 21,865. Of these, 1821, or 8 1/2 per cent., are on the sick list. The force of artillery is 2108, 21 per cent. only being sick. Of the small force of cavalry arrived up to that date, 8 per cent. were sick, but mostly from slight accidents. The infantry force is distributed as follows: At Gallipoli, 5187, of whom 178 are sick; at Varua, 6005, 319 being sick. The remainder of the force is at Soutari. The first division of Guards and Highlanders, on embarking for Varua, left their sick in the General Hospital; these are included in the 821. The party, however, arrived, and is said to be very good, and received as a great boon. All the medical arrangements are now perfect. Tea and sugar are supplied to the troops much cheaper than they can be bought in the bazaars.

SUGAR IS THE LARGEST PRODUCER OF BEET SUGAR IN THE WORLD.—A favorable soil and climate and a rural and industrious population, contribute to the successful prosecution of the beet sugar manufacture. This manufacture originated during the reign of Napoleon Bonaparte.

THE HARVEST.—The Journal of Water publishes an elaborate report of the state of the crops in the north, by which it appears that for years past there has not been so hopeful a prospect of an abundant harvest as that which is now fast ripening to maturity. That is greatly improved, a vast change for the better, having taken place within a very brief period; and an equally satisfactory report is given of the state of the potato crop.

ARRIVAL OF THE HON. JOHN HENRY THOMAS MAYNARD, Esq., to be Lieutenant Governor of the Province of New Brunswick.
The St. John Morning Freeman complains that the high price of provisions and the consequent apprehensions of a panic and reaction tend to make business at present dull and unsatisfactory, in many of its branches.

A public meeting of the friends of the Maine Liquor Law was held in Dublin.
The Hon. Messrs. BRADSHAW, the immense screw and paddle-steamer, building at the yard of Messrs. Scott Russell, at Millwall, for the Eastern Steam Navigation Company, is to be completed in twelve months. Her hull has been laid down, and several of her bulkheads, or compartments are raised, and the works are proceeding with energy and expedition. A railroad has been laid down along the entire length of her way, to facilitate the conveyance of the materials from the factory to the different parts of the vessel. The exact dimensions of the ship are as follows:—Tonnage, builder's measurement 22,000 tons; tonnage burthen, 10,000 tons; extreme length, 600 feet; extreme breadth, 55 feet; extreme depth, 55 feet; power of engines (screw and paddle), 2,000 horse. Her engines are in the course of construction by Messrs. James Watt and Co., of Soho, and Messrs. Scott Russell, and will be fitted in the vessel before she is floated off. The hull will be entirely of iron, and of more than usual strength. From her keel up to six feet above the water-line is double, of a cellular

THE COLONIAL MAIL arrived last night, the following are the only items of news we notice:—

PROFESSORS have again been visited with a most disastrous fire. It broke out early yesterday morning in the work shop of Mr. Wiley, cabinet maker, and spread with frightful rapidity until the greater part of the blocks, between King Street and the River, and north of the Temperance Hall, were entirely consumed.—It is stated that there were 75 buildings destroyed, and of course much other valuable property. Very little insurance.

IT IS CONFIDENTLY stated, that Sir Edmund Head is about to be raised to the Peerage, and succeed Lord Elgin, as Governor General of British North America.

WILLIAM H. DRAPER, Esq., one of the Princes Judges of Canada West, Robert Balcan, Esq., and Edward Campbell, Esq., of Canada, have been appointed by the Queen to be ordinary members of the Civil Division of the third class or companies of the most honourable Order of the Bath.

THERE IS A falling off of £312,000 on the quarter's revenue, and half a million on the year. His Excellency addressed a large meeting at Glasgow on the 6th; resolution adopted to petition the Crown for re-establishment of Poland.

LETTERS from Italy say that alliance of Austria with France and Prussia has greatly diminished the prospects of the revolutionary party in Lombardy and the Roman States.

SHIP NEWS. On the night of Wednesday, the 12th inst., at 11 o'clock, the Schooner "Spirit" of P. E. Island, Angus McDonald, Master, while off Cape North, Cape Breton, on a voyage from Bristol to Burgess Island, Newfoundland, with a general cargo of fish, was run down by a ship unknown. The night being quite thick and foggy, and the ship having no light, she was not seen until the collision. She appears not to have seen the Schooner's light, but struck her forward, completely cutting her down, killing the Cook who was below in his birth-cabin, the Master, Crew and Passenger,—at 8 o'clock—had barely time to escape in a small boat when the Schooner immediately went down. The ship passed on and took no notice of the catastrophe whatever. The survivors made the Magdalen Islands, the residence of John F. Money, Esq., on Friday, in a desolate and starving condition. Mr. Money, kindly assisted them every condition, and having procured for them some provisions, he conveyed them to their homes on this Island, where they arrived on Friday last. They state that had it not been for Mr. Money's humane assistance they must have perished, as they had been refused assistance by others, from the scarcity of provisions, and as they had no means of getting away from the Magdalen Islands, their situation was rendered perilous. The Schooner was owned by General Campbell, Esq.
