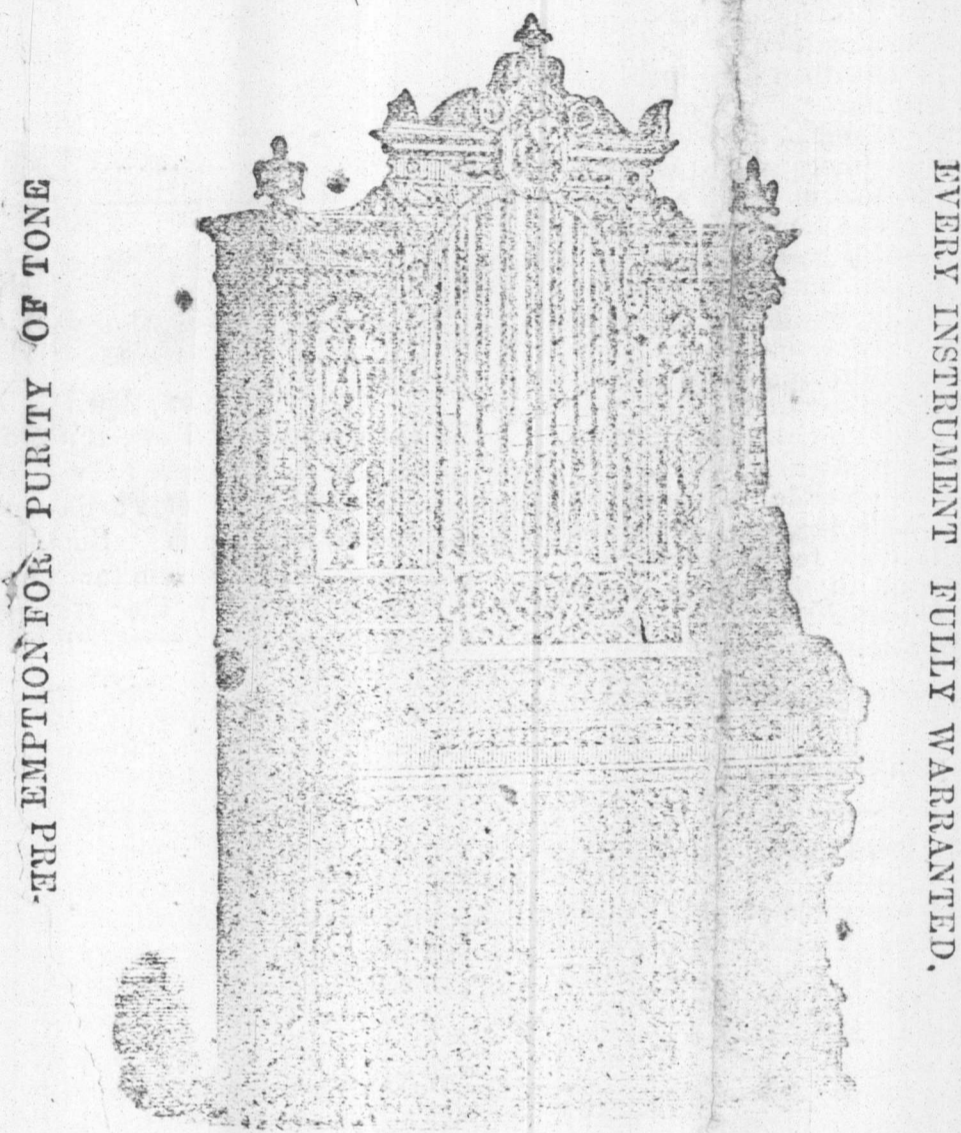

First and by no means the least important of the many beneficial acts which have occupied the minds of our statesmen during the sittings of the House the past Session is the raising the salaries of several of the government officials. There are many, however, who are engaged in the service of the country, and who are equally entitled to an advance on their present salary, who have been passed over as insignificant and not worth their notice, when this action of the Legislature was ratified and carried out. We see no reason whatever why those who were justly entitled to the same consideration, where passed by unheeded. We could mention many of our respected townsmen, who, by their long term of official duties, fulfilled at all times in the most satisfactory manner, alike creditable to themselves and to the town in which they reside, entirely ignored and disregarded. For example we will mention the case of our old and respected friend Dr. Allan. This gentleman has been a resident in this community for a long period of time, and in the exercise of his professional duties, particularly amongst the destitute and poorer classes, he has ever been at all times ready and willing to render assistance whenever called upon; and in consideration for his valuable services as District Surgeon a very paltry sum is granted indeed. Why not recompense

those who are best entitled to consideration, and whose services could not be dispensed with on any account whatever. No! these men are not worth noticing. We could point to many in like circumstances. We like to see fair play at last, and particularly to the members of this community, in whom we are at all times most deeply interested. It is with pleasure we notice the favorable reception of the petition of J. J. Roddick, Esq., Principal of the Harbor Grace Grammar School. Mr. R., has laboured hard in this community for upwards of thirty years and we think he has just claims on the government, many of whom, received their early training at the above institution. We know of no other men who have a greater claim on the government of the country than Dr. Allan and Mr. Roddick, and we are confident that no obstacle will put forward to retard the adoption of a retiring allowance to the aged petitioner. The petition was presented by Mr. Shea and seconded by Mr. Rorke, and ably supported by members of the Opposition. We copy an extract from the North Star having reference to Mr. Roddick's petition:

Among other petitions brought before the House on Thursday last was one for the retiring allowance, from J. J. Roddick, Esq., who has filled the position of master of the academy at Harbor Grace with such excellent results for so long a time past, somewhere over thirty years we believe. The petition was presented by the Hon A. Shea, who spoke very warmly in favour of the memorial. Mr. Shea stated that Mr. Roddick had occupied the position of master of the Harbor Grace academy for about thirty years and during that time owing to the high character of his instruction he had turned out many young gentlemen from his establishment who have since given promise of eminence in the several professions to which they had given their attention. He objected to the objection which might be raised to the petition that it created a precedent, because it was simply a precedent which established itself, and because it was essential that gentlemen who had given such untiring energy to the higher education of our youth should at least feel when the time arrived that age or other disability incapacitated them from the continuance of their labors, that they had entitled them selves to the benevolent consideration of the Government. In the case of Mr. Roddick there was but one opinion. That gentleman had fully met the requirements of the community in which he resided with the most marked educational success from first to last. He had now arrived at a time of life when age and declining health incapacitated him from continuing the duties which he had so long discharged with such assiduity and success, and it was his (Mr. Shea's) intention to move an address to His Excellency upon the subject of the memorial should be of such a character as would convey very fully and clearly to His Excellency the sense of the Legislature in regard to it.

Mr Rorke seconded the petition which was also cordially sustained by members of the opposition, several of whom including Messrs. Conroy, Bennett, Dearin Fenelon, &c. spoke in highest terms of the gentleman to whom it had reference.

We are glad to have it in our power to congratulate our Anti-Confederate friends on the entitment to their cause of the Telegraph newspaper. It seems that the Telegraph came down pretty hard on that political blockhead, the Receiver General. The government has now succeeded in its principle object, that of lessening the power of the Church of England people. The Telegraph has always been the organ of that body. The following notice we take from the Courier:

We congratulate the Opposition on the acquisition of the Telegraph newspaper to the ranks of the anti-Government party. Nothing shows more convincingly that the Government is corrupt than the withdrawal of the Telegraph from the list of Government champions. Though we have generally been at issue with the Telegraph on political questions, yet we are now happy to find that there are subjects on which we can agree, and on no matter are we more in accord with our honest contemporary than upon the utter incapacity of the

Government and the ignorant administration of affairs by the present Executive. The present Government hold Mr. Bennett responsible for the acts of those associated with him in the late administration, and we maintain that the present Government are responsible for the blundering of their officials, particularly when those officials are members of the Executive Council. We shall not be too severe upon the well flagellated Receiver General, but hope that he will come out of this ordeal for the sake of the country, "a wiser and better man." From all we know the Receiver General is desirous of advancing the interests of his native country and we feel quite certain that his anomalous position as a colleague of some of the most anti-progressive men of the day has to a very great extent unfitted him for the responsibilities of office. Let the Receiver General attach himself to the party of the venerable experimenter, Mr. Bennett, and we shall see him himself again, a man of progress, enthusiastically engaged in devising salutary measures calculated to elevate his country in the scale of intelligence and prosperity.

The following extracts, affecting the trade to Spanish West Indies, has been handed to us by the Spanish Vice Consul for general information: "No vessel of less than one hundred and twenty (120) tons Spanish measurement, shall carry merchandise from transshipment; and only merchandise so transhipped must be put on board a vessel of not less than one hundred and twenty (120) tons Spanish measurement. "The consignee must notify the Customs authorities in writing at the port of call within twenty-four hours after passing entries, and the transhipment shall take place without delay so that the vessel may depart for her new destination within forty-eight hours after such notification. Should it not be possible to effect the transhipment within the time specified the merchandise so to be transhipped shall be deposited in the stores of the Custom House under the usual regulations." [Chronicle.

Soft Woven Rags 6 to 8 cents per pound, subject to a prohibitive duty of 12 cents per pound. Old worn out rope, from 2 to 4 cents per pound. Old nets 1/2 cent per pound. Shavings 1 cent per pound. Old scraps Wrought Iron \$1.35 per cwt., subject to a duty of \$8 per ton. Old nails and other light wrought iron 1/2 of a cent per pound; duty on it \$8 per ton. Old broken Stoves 1/2 of a cent per pound subject to a duty of \$6 per ton. Old Copper 18 cents American currency subject to a duty of 4 cents per pound. Old Brass and Composition 13 cents per pound, American currency, subject to a duty of 15 per cent. This latter, (the old Brass and Composition) includes old worn out Brass Oil Cocks. The attention of our zealous and worthy Chief, and His Honor who sits in judgment on the rostrum in our glorious Temple of Justice on the Hill, are respectfully called to the above notice that at the next Quarter Session they may be in a position to remove from the minds of the Judges of Harbor Grace the false impressions which certain reports, said to have been authoritatively proclaimed at the last Quarter Sessions that old Brass and Composition is worth two shillings per pound and old broken and worn out Brass Oil Tank Cocks, are worth about £5 each, and which reports were calculated at least if not intended, to injure the reputation, and bring into disrepute the characters of two or three individuals, who have been in business in Harbor Grace for over 30 years past, and whose reputation for honesty and fair dealings during the whole of that long time stand second to none in the community, and is well known and appreciated by the people of the town and neighborhood generally.

LONDON, April 8. In Commons to-day Fawcett's Bill allowing unmarried women to vote at elections for Member of Parliament received lengthy discussion. Smollett said agitation emanated from turbulent women in America, and the Bill, if passed, would enfranchise women who gained a living by immorality. Motion for second reading lost by 187 to 152. Divided voted with minority. New York 8.—Gold 114.

OTTAWA, 8. Parliament prorogued to-day. Lord Dufferin in his speech congratulated Commons on speedy termination of laborious session, and assented to all bills except Peterson divorce, and Copyright bills.

LONDON, 10. Conflict between the University of Madrid and Government becoming serious. More Professors exiled. Quarrel may result in fall of ministry. Concha has been officially invited to leave Spain.

Cardinal Manning opened Catholic College yesterday. In his address he regarded himself as entrusted with a Commission of warfare; and he blessed the church as approaching a crisis, the most fiery for 300 years.

Sydney C. C. 10.—Thermometer Zero. New York, 10. First passenger train passed through Hoosac tunnel yesterday. Havana letter states Patriots victorious in Camaguey district. Gold 115.

LONDON, 12. Bismarck will visit the Isle of Wight soon for his health. Courbet's pictures have been seized in Paris, and will be sold to defray the cost of the Column of Vendome. German Prince Imperial will go to Italy as announced, but the official visit to Victor Emmanuel has been abandoned by the advice of Bismarck.

Paul Boyton successfully crossed the Channel in his new life saving apparatus. 'Maitre' declares that France is unanimous for peace.

Disraeli, in answer, said, should Belgium's neutrality be really threatened Her Majesty's Government were ready to do their duty to the Sovereign, and would not fear to meet the Parliament.

On Friday night last about half past 12 o'clock the house of Mrs Dohney on Gower Street, east of Prescott was entered by a man named Cushin through a window in the rear of the dwelling. Mrs. Dohney had retired for the night and was disturbed by the noise of some one walking about the shop. In descending to ascertain who was in the house she found the shop door open and supposing that the party who opened it had gone, shut the door and was going into the back room, when she saw a man crouched behind the counter. Being a woman of firm mind and strong arm, she seized hold of Cushin and called for help, and her son and son-in-law came to her aid and secured the 'lad' until the arrival of the night police who had been sent for. Cushin escaped from them and hid in his mother's dwelling, from which the police had some difficulty in extracting him. The matter will probably be brought before the Supreme Court. [Ledger.

On Sunday morning last, two prisoners, the one named Taylor who had been imprisoned for stealing a pair of boots, and the other named Lynch for

stealing some goods from on board of a Ferryland boat, through means of sheets let themselves through Signal Hill prison windows, and escaped. The mounted Police Force scoured the country for them on Sunday, but their search was futile. The next question to be asked is, with whom does the fault of not taking precaution against such escape rest? We have been informed that other prisoners of notorious and character might have escaped if they would at the time. [Chronicle

The steamer 'Greyhound' owned by Newman & Co., Harbor Briton, arrived at St. Peter's on Tuesday eighteen days from London. This vessel went to England last fall, under canvas, making a quick run, and had her machinery altered and overhauled. It was intended to employ her for the protection of the herring fishery, but she arrived too late to be put on that service. [Ibid. An alarm of fire proceeded from Maggotty Cove on yesterday evening, which proved to be nothing more serious than a dirty chimney blazing out. [Ibid.

We are happy to learn that the barque 'Era' Capt. Fahey, has safely arrived in Trepassey, and in company with the 'Fruit Girl' awaits a time home. [Ibid.

On Saturday last a horse belonging to a poor man from Outer Cove perished with hunger whilst drawing a load of hay to town.

Advices from Newfoundland, reports a shocking tragedy at Labrador, three families murdered by Esquimaux, at Venison Island.—(New York Sun.

EARNEST ORTWEIN HANGED.

Ernest Ortwein the murderer of the Hammet family was hanged in the jail yard at noon to-day. The crime for which he suffered was committed on the night of April 29, 1874, near Homestead a village on the Pictou, Virginia and Charleston Railroad, six miles above this city. His victims were John Hammet, a well-to-do farmer; his wife Agnes, two daughters named Ida and Emma, and a young boy named Robert Smith. The murder was discovered early next morning. The burning of the house attracting the attention of the neighbors, and during the day the remains of the unfortunate family were taken from the ruins. At the time of the murder Ortwein was engaged as a farm hand on the estate of Hammet, as one of the family he is a native of German, and has been in this country a-out two year. After his arrest he made a confession and has since expressed himself willing and ready to pay the penalty of his crime. His spiritual adviser who has been in constant attendance, left him last night at midnight Ortwein then requested to be called at 6 o'clock and retired. He slept soundly until 6 o'clock this morning, and he partook of a hearty breakfast shortly before 7. The final religious services were held in his cell a little after 9 a.m.

At precisely 12 o'clock Ortwein was conducted to the jail yard. Sheriff Healey headed the solemn procession, while Deputy Sheriff Culey brought up the rear. The Rev. Messrs. Heitzberger and Pier with the prisoners between them, were praying aloud. The sheriff halted at the scaffold steps, and the elegyman offered up a prayer, Ortwein kneeling with his hand bound behind and the fatal noose about his neck. At the conclusion of the prayer, Ortwein exclaimed in German, "Int' my hand, O God I commit my spirit!" He then arose and ascended the steps of the scaffold accompanied by the clergyman. His extraordinary nerve did not desert him at the last moment and as the fatal cap, "A white one," was being placed over his head he bade those near him a pleasant "good by." Then in a loud firm voice he said: "What I have to say is this, I committed the murder. I am ready and will not to die. I must heartily bid for the kindnes shown me. May God have mercy on my soul. O, father into thy hands I comend my spirit.

At three minutes after two the drop fell. As the noose tightened about Ortwein's neck the white cap was lifted, revealing his face just as the first shock of death was felt. It was a sickening spectacle. The eyes started from their sockets, the tongue shot out, and the face first flushed crimson, then turned black, or at least seemed to do so. The fall evidently broke his neck, as there was but a slight convulsion of the limbs. He was a powerfully built man however in prime health, and his chest continued to heave thro' at least five minutes. His heart ceased to beat at about seven and a half minutes after he fell. He was left hanging for some twenty minutes longer when the body was cut down and delivered to Mr. Devore, the undertaker. It is understood that it will be taken to Dr. Dickson's hospital for a post-mortem examination.

Ortwein made a will before his death in which he left all his claim to property in Germany to his relatives. He also made a full confession, and among his latest requests was that it should not be published until some days after his burial.

We cannot of course find fault with those who simply dislike BEER from a natural aversion of the bitter principle of the hops, with which it is more abundantly provided than other BEERS. This may be the reason that many people prefer Ale; but we ought to suggest that in order to have the full benefit of the moderately stimulating and nutritious qualities of any kind of BEER, it must not be drunk at improper hours, as then really good BEER may be quite unpalatable. The best time is at dinner during the use of Beef, Mutton, Pork, etc., to which it is a very desirable addition.

It is a common observation that the desires in regard to food and drink are, in many individuals, undergoing a change in the course of years. This is simply caused by the modified wants of the system. A young, vigorous person does not need the stimulus of BEER or WINE at the table, which appears to become a necessity for others when they become older. The wisest plan is to follow simply the natural desires as they best indicate the wants of the system, provided these desires are not provented by the unnatural habits of smoking or chewing tobacco, using an excess of condiments, especially pepper, or the habit of distilled drinks, which nobody should use, except largely diluted, as is the case with wine, the strongest qualities of which contain alcohol in as high a proportion as it ever should be introduced in a human stomach.

The inconsistency of temperance people in general is, among other things shown in the fact that they allow the use of fermented Cider, which contain about as much alcohol as Rhine wine. The latter is often dispensed in New York under the name of German Cider, many of whom we have heard certify that the German Cider is much better than the American article. A curious observation has also been made by dealers in Soda Water; they find that the ginger Syrup, which is the most pungent and stimulating of all, and also contains some alcohol, of which the other syrups are free, is generally preferred by temperance people, who invariably ask for the hot ginger Syrup, while the wine and Beer-drinkers take the refreshing syrup of lemon, or some other fruit.

As it thus appears that most people need some stimulus, it may be well to acknowledge this fact, and to allow them to indulge in one which is not only harmless but beneficial, instead of requiring a total abstinence and, in which many are unable to persist, who breaking their pledges, lose their self-respect in so far as to indulge in the most pernicious of all habits—the use of the intoxicating distilled liquors.

It is for reason of the above consideration that we have recommended to all who have a chance to obtain this good beverage in their neighborhood, to do so instead of keeping a "Brandy bottle in the house"—New York Paper.

DIRECTIONS. 1.—The bottled Beer ought immediately after landing to be unpacked from the barrels or boxes and it possible be placed in an erect position in a cool place.

2.—In receiving the casks with Beer, Ale or Porter, put them on good solid stand in a cellar, keep them 6 days on the stand before opened, and the bung or vent hole must be opened before the tap is put in, a sufficient quantity of clean good bottles is required when drawing of the Beer etc., and as quick as possible be corked with good corks.

3.—In returning the empty casks and bottles the name or initials of the person who send them, ought to be marked on the head of the casks or barrels.

4.—The goods to be shipped at the debit and risk of the Purchasers, and any remarks against the article, etc., ought to be made immediately on receipt of goods if any notice will be taken of the same.
