



If Henry Ford caries out his inthe famous manufacturer is on sure ground, for he speaks of investigations by his representatives into the alleged shortage of coal, and of the 'holdup" tactics of the coal brokers. And if there is profiteering in coal it will probably be due to the manipulations of these brokers who in the past have not hestitated to make exorbitant gains out of the combinaon of a scarcity of fuel and a big public demand.

It would be unwise to say that the coal brokers have enormous supplies on hand, as Mr. Ford does, before more evidence is forthcoming; nor would it be fair to say that profiteering is going on. But in the summer of 1920, the coal brokers' methods were exposed and their huge profits revealed. By securing in some mysterious way car-loads of coal at the mines, the coal specula tors would send them towards ports or cities where a shortage was be they had "spot" coal for sale. To keep their plants going, many firms had to submit to the brokers and buy the spot cargoes or go without As may be guessed the prices were by the time anywhere from 100 to 300 per cent. greater than the regu-

If it is, and Mr. Ford shows convincing evidence of its existence, he should receive the widest public sup port, in Canada as well as in the United States. The time has come when unscrupuous speculators should be treated as criminals, when so vital a necessity as fuel is concerned.
