

A Disastrous Gyolone

One of the greatest disasters of recent years overwhelmed the city of St. Louis, Missouri, Wednesday night last, in the shape of a cyclone, which began shortly after five o'clock, and for over thirty minutes tore its awfel thirty minutes tore its awful way through the city with a velocity of over eighty miles an hour. Reports from there were at the time very meagre, owing to the almost total destruction of the telegraph wires. The city hospital, which fortunately survived the storm, was filled to overflowing with mangled men, women and children, and the morgue within two hours after the end of the storm was so full of corpses that it was necessary to provide other quarchallenged the qualification of nine jurors before the court to-day. 
