FOUND DEAD IN HER BED

HAMILTON, Feb. 19.—Margaret Pazius was found dead in her bed at 3 o'clock this morning by her husband. According to his own story, Pazius at this time saw his wife for the first time since the day before. He states that he was so badly under the influence of liquor the night before that he has no remembrance of when his wife came into the house or whether she was in the house when he reached home. He tumbled into bed in this intoxicated state, and only became aware of her presence in the manner stated. The deceased was about 50 years of age and unfortunately was almost as addicted to liquor as her husband. There is little doubt the terrible habit was the cause of her death. The couple did not make free with the few neighbors around, and consequently little is known of their doings. No marks of violence were found on deceased's body. After enquiring into the circumstances of Mrs. Pazius' death Coroner Woolverton concluded that they did not demand an inquest, but yielding to the desires of deceased's rela-

tives for a full investigation he determined At about 61/2 o'clock this morning Edward Hall, a patient in the male ward of the City Hospital, who is suffering from a severe attack of typhoid fever and who is delirous therefrom, was left alone for a moment by the nurse who was attending him. As soon as the sick man discovered that he was not watched he rose from his bed and, walking over to a window, opened it and stepped out on to the balcony which runs along a portion of the east ward. The apparition of a man clad only in a night shirt, whooping like a flend, caused the passers-by on the street to pause. The delirious man gazed for a moment at the ground some fifteen or twenty feet below him, then without a moment's warning he jumped and landed on the frozen sod in a heap. He did not move for a moment or two, and those who saw him take the leap thought he was killed. Two patients who had witnessed Hall's mad jump ran out and carried into the ward he recovered, and re-gaining his feet, began to fight with all the desperate fury of a madman. He pounded one of his rescuers in a savage manner, but was finally overpowered and taken back to his bed. When examined it was found that no bones were broken, but serious results are anticipated from the effects of the fall and exposure to the cold.





Finding that they were running short of provis-ions, one of them accordingly started for the nearest mill, the one at Goderich, for three barrels of flour, one barrel being considered a fair allowance for a small family for a year. On arriving at Goderich he found the mill shut down for repairs, and was forced to cross Lake Huron, by boat, to Saginaw, where he secured his three barrels of flour. He returned to Goderich, and started for home with his team (which happened to be oxen), where he safely arrived after many weeks' travel. Even fty years has made quice a change in going to mill, and also shows as to how the country has prospered and developed. This is no fancy sketch but a fact furnished by no less a personage than the popular reeve of our township, who lives Biddulph. 


