
Drowned Lad Interred.



A heavy toll in human life is being , danger they ran. How they escaped paid to the eagerness of young men from his embrace they do not know, and boys to go swimming in the ponds near the city. Three deaths in almost as many days from drowning is a fearful thing to contemplate, and the sacrifice of these valuable human lives must surely be the result of careless ness or negligence on the part of some person or persons in authority. One thing is certain that if the boys be not prevented in some way from going to suburban ponds to bathe, accidents will frequently occur.

The feelings and sympathies of citizens were again profoundly stirred last evening when it became known that William Joyce, aged 17 years, who resided at No. 150 Gower Street, had met his death by drowning in Long Pond.

The unfortunate lad who worked in the Hardware Department of Ayre & Sons, Ltd., was the only support of a widowed mother, his father, the late George Joyce, having died in March last. The facts of this very sad drowning accident are as follows:-

Yesterday afternoon being fine and warm the deceased lad -William Joyce, his brother, Walter, and J. W. Smith, a companion, left the home of the victim at 4 p.m. to go to Long his friend the body was placed in the Pond to have a bath. They crossed the bridge at the foot of the pond and went up the north side but would not go out in Sandy Bottom as too many boys were already there. They procccded up towards the head, and undressing went out there. Both Smith and Walter, the brother of the deccased, could swim a few strokes, and immediately they entered the water the drowned lad started to dip his head and bathe it. . The Smith boy jocosely asked him if he liked bathing his head, to which he replied "that is about all I can do in the water." He now passed his two young friends and walked farther out in the pond, dipping his head in the water the while. They paid no particular attention to him afterwards so engrossed were they in the pleasures of bathing, until suddenly Smith saw him put both hands to his eyes and brush the water from them and from his hair. Telling him that he was a regular water dog, Smith ed to get no answer, and

Yesterday Mr. H. W. LeMessurier Assistant Collector of Customs, received the following message from but they did, and frightened they scrambled ashore. Smith was the first to reach the bank, and for a few seconds thought both brothers were gone until he saw Walter wading towards him. Both were exhausted as the result of their struggles in getting ashore, and looking to the spot where William had disappeared they could see bubbles rise to the surface, and they screamed loudly for help. Two young men were in a boat at some

distance down the pond and hearing their cries rowed for the scene. Up the river which runs into the head of the pond they saw a man fishing, and Smith running up to him and telling him what had occurred, he grasped the rod he used and ran back to the pond

and tried with the implement to raise the body, but could not do so. Those in the boat had by this time arrived, and one of the two young men in her, Tilley, by name, 'called to some young chaps who had assembled, told them he could not swim, and asked any of them who could to try and get the boy off bottom. Getting no answer he


