But the quick eye of the colonel in charge of the regiment followed with admiration and regret and love until it disappears, and, following it, notices a curious movement in the hovering crowds of Cossacks in the distance, who are putting themselves in rapid motion.

He divines the object. "The Emperor is in danger. Soldiers! follow me!"

At the words the drooping and dispirited horsemen brighten up. The old rush of courage is in their hearts. The Emperor in danger! Sacre! and sword-blades lying in their sheaths!

The wearied horses are quickly in motion. Something of the returning spirit of their riders seems to have communicated itself to them, for they trot swiftly over the frozen snow.

Dunois was at Lepsic and at Waterloo, and with his guards performed prodigies of valour, yet escaped unhurt; and to this day his grand-children hold prominent positions in the French army, and the name stands highest in the roll of honour.

Now, the acacias act to a considerable extent as host plants to the harmless species which has been mentioned in connection with the tree. These little creatures make a small entrance-hole into the thorns of the acacia, and carefully hollow out the soft interior, which, as it happens, is very good food-material for the ants.

In these little homes the insects live and rear their young, and in the wet season an observer has stated that he found every thorn on the acacias inhabited, whilst hundreds of the ants were running about over the foliage of the plain. The acacia goes even further than this, and at the end of some of its leaves produces small yellowish masses, which have been called "food-bodies."

In this way the acacia enlists in its service a standing army that will always fight with an enthusiasm which the defence of a home always inspires. Browsing animals are attacked with great vigour by the resident ants, but the most dangerous enemy of the tree is the leaf-cutter species previously mentioned. Almost always the marauders are repulsed, and the tree escapes without injury. Just occasionally acacias have been found without the bodyguard of ants, and it is seen that these suffer severely from the foraging insects. It is only during the wet season, when the trees are making their new foliage, that all these provisions are made for the ants.

As soon as the rains cease, the food-bodies disappear and the sweet-glands dry up.

It is now believed that these alliances between insects and plants are a good deal more common than was supposed a few years ago. A Soudan acacia entertains ants in its specially swollen thorns. Only last year, too, the authorities at Kew discovered a Central American orchid which has hopes in its pseudo-bulb for the accommodation of ants.—"Illustrated London News."

By this morning's train the new pastor-elect for Cochrane Street Methodist Church, the Rev. C.A. Whitmarsh, M.A., B.D., arrived in the city. The reverend gentleman is a Newfoundland, is quite a young man, is an energetic worker and an esteemed Pastor. He graduated at Mount Allison University, Sackville, N.B., and later attended the Drew Seminary at Boston, taking the degree of B.D. Mr. Whitmarsh was ordained some four years ago and has just closed a most successful pastorate at Bay Roberts. The Telegram welcomes the reverend gentleman to the city, and wishes him continued success in his new sphere of labor at Cochrane Street Church.

Western Fishery Report.

Letters received in town yesterday from a resident of Placentia interested in the fishery, and who has been up as far as Fortune Bay, gave the following summary of the fishery to date: On the whole the Bank fishery is better than last year, but the shore fishery from Flat Islands, P.B., to Point May, at the entrance to Fortune Bay, is a blank. At Lowries traps and boats have not an average of 3 qts. ashore to date. From Odein down to Isle Valen, "bummers" average 15 qts. ashore, and the best trap has 65 qts. under salt, while many do not report for a cod's tail. On the west side of Placentia Bay, from Isle Valen to Sound Islands, the "bummers" do not average 10 qts. landed. The Cape St. Mary's fleet are even to date with last year's catch for trawls, and the traps have done a shade better than last season, averaging about 160 qts. landed to date. In St. Mary's Bay, from Cape English into St. Mary's, traps average 280 qts. and there are 42 traps out on that stretch of coast. From Cape English out to Gull Island, Holyhood and Peter's River included, there are 54 traps in the water and these average to date 300 qts. under salt, with fish fairly plentiful all round.

Obituary.

There passed away quietly at the General Hospital yesterday William Cantwell, a former employee of the Free Press Office. Deceased was 22 years of age and a son of the late Patrick and Elizabeth Cantwell. Some weeks ago he was stricken with heart trouble and Sunday evening last the attack came with increased violence, and from then up to the time of his death was unconscious. Deceased was well known in athletic circles, being a prominent footballer and skater. His funeral takes place to-morrow afternoon from the residence of Mr. N. J. Vinnicombe.

Strawaways Picked Up

On Tuesday the banker George Rose got into Burin with her third catch and reported having picked up two men who had strayed from the banking schooner Paster Kirby. The names of the fishermen could not be ascertained from our informant, but they belonged to the port where they were brought. They had a trying experience and are none the better of it since. When rescued they were much exhausted, being two days alone in an open boat, drifting about.

Hay Fever.

 Hay fever is a moist and industrious ailment which attacks a man just when his last handkerchief has gone to the laundry. It is a very sociable and tenacious disease, and never lets go until it is pried loose by a hard frost. It assaults both sexes in a vicious and unprincipled manner about the time the fragrant rag weed begins to breathe its healing balm upon man and beast. Hay fever is never mistaken for a hard cold by anybody who has encountered it when it is in good form. It is usually introduced by a series of synoptical sneezes which sound like feeding dynamite caps to a goat, and is accompanied by lame back, pains in the chest, hardening of the arteries, water on the knee joint, and extreme lassitude everywhere except in the nose and the territory abutting thereon. Hay fever has a very discouraging effect upon the sense of smell, and lowers a man's vitality until he can't distinguish the odor of heliotrope extract from the rich perfume of the boiled cabbage. Like Christmas, hay fever comes but once a year, but if it came any often-er the hemstitched handkerchief industry would have to put on three shifts.

"Bad Tactics."

SIR EDWARD MORRIS HAD TO INCREASE THE UNDERWRITING COMMISSION FIFTY PER CENT. IN ORDER TO INDUCE THE MARKET TO GUARANTEE THE ISSUE OF THE 1912 RAILWAY LOAN.

"Bad Tactics" is the way the Montreal Financial Times of Saturday last sums up Sir Edward Morris's conduct of the loan he recently negotiated.

This headline appears over a paragraph of financial news cabled from London to the New York Post by its London correspondent. Here it is in part:—

"Some recent borrowers, notably Newfoundland and the city of Edmonton, had to increase the underwriting commission from 1 to 1½ per cent. in order to induce the market to guarantee the issues. Such a policy cannot long continue, as the knowledge that such high terms are offered will restrain the public from subscribing, investors knowing full well that they will be able to buy the securities at a discount later on."

It will be remembered that on Monday last we asked the Premier if he had floated the bonds for the railway loan provided for last session; and if so, why he had been so silent about it. On Tuesday the Premier gave an answer. He said the issue of new bonds had been arranged, and that the price was 93. No answer to this query has been furnished. Now comes the news of extra inducements being given to the underwriters in the way

of commission. No wonder the Premier was so glum and silent about his latest adventure in the money market, and had not a word to say until it was forced out of him.

Sagona Here.

The s.s. Sagona, Capt. Parsons, arrived here at 12.30 p.m. to-day. The ship went to Holton, which she reached on the 13th, and had bad weather with N. E. winds and fog all the time going north. She met a heavy field of loose ice from Belle Isle in the Straits down to George's Island, and from that north a close pack of heavy Arctic ice. It is impossible to do any fishing owing to the presence of the floe. At Bolster's Rock traps had from 20 to 70 qts. and if the people could keep their twine in the water they would do good work as cod is plentiful. From Long Island north there is no sign yet. They got a couple of barrels of fish at Long Island when the ship was there. No sign at Wolf Islands, Indian Tickle or anywhere north of that. Coming south the ship met the Straits fleet of schooners. A S. W. wind was then blowing which Capt. Parsons says will clear the coast. He thinks that by this time the people can keep their twine out. Her passengers were Capt. O'Brien, Messrs. Grant and Loder and 4 steerage.

Attempted Suicide on the Sagona.

Abraham Burgess, a messroom steward on the Sagona, while the ship was at Dead Island, twice attempted suicide by drowning. He was about to leap over the rail when caught by the men, and next morning at 6 he left his room and jumped overboard. He would have drowned but that his uncle jumped after him with a rope about his waist, and swimming to the man, who sank repeatedly, he grasped him and was drawn aboard by stewards Whitty and Hutchings. The man then became violently insane and was landed here in a straight jacket.

S.U.F. Outing.

The annual outing of the S. U. F. was held yesterday afternoon. A special train left town at 2.30 with a party of 300 on board for Kelligrewa. Games were indulged in during the evening and all entered into the fun with great zest. At night a dance was held and terminated at 2.30 a.m., when return to town was made.

Big Fire at Bell Island

FOUR BUSINESS PLACES AND PRIVATE HOUSES WIPED OUT.

Early yesterday morning a disastrous fire broke out at Bell Island, and in a couple of hours the houses and business places of Messrs. Hearne and Kent, Patrick O'Brien and Abraham Coen were a mass of ruins. The people who lost their homes are domiciled with neighbors.

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A Result of the Governor's Verdict in the Morison Scandal.

People Look for Pardon When Ignorance of the Law is Pleaded.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir.—The Governor's verdict in the Morison land scandal has been the topic here excluding all other questions of a public character since it was published. The people are shocked to find that the representative of the Crown can continue his confidence to a man who has forfeited public confidence. God gave this land for the people, and the people placed Mr. Morison in the position of a guardian of their rights. Instead of guarding their rights, he joined with a few others in grabbing from the public domain an area of timber equal to one third of the whole island of Newfoundland, securing for himself an interest therein of one hundred thousand shares at a dollar each. The Governor seems to have overlooked this important point, but the people have not. Mr. Morison's ignorance of the law in respect to the cutting of timber from off ungranted Crown Lands so staggered His Excellency that it would seem he completely lost sight of the more important matter so far as the general public are concerned.

The discovery that the man intrusted with the Administration of the law should be so ignorant or forgetful of its provisions as to suggest to one of his partners in a timber deal the stealing of timber from the lands adjoining, staggered more than His Excellency the Governor. The only difference in effect is that when the people recovered from the staggers they determined that Morison shall be punished for his betrayal of trust, while on His Excellency's recovery from the shock he determined that it was impossible to conceive that a Minister of Justice and an ex-judge could "connive at such a monstrous piece of rascality," accepted his plea of forgetfulness or ignorance of the law and pardoned the offence. The people must charitably assume that the Governor had not recovered from the shock when he gave his judgment. I read the letter from "An Outport Man" which appeared in your paper last Friday, and it appealed to me to write a few lines on behalf of some poor men of this district who have had to suffer severely because of their ignorance of the law. If ignorance of the law is excusable in the case of Mr. Morison, our present Minister of Justice, surely it is in the case of our fishermen, and especially of the fishermen on this West Coast, who up to a comparatively recent date, were without the administration of the law and the benefit of education. Early in May Oliver Benoit, of Main Gut, and three other of our hardy toilers went to work as they had for years, and as their fathers and grandfathers had done before them, and set their salmon nets inside the Main Gut where the tide rises and falls. You will please understand that inside the Gut is an arm of the sea, seven miles in length and three miles wide. No fisherman could be made believe that that is a river, and Benoit and his three companions inadvertently had no knowledge of offending against the law by fishing in those waters. However, a Government official came along one day and seized the salmon nets, the men were brought before the Magistrate and fined and their nets confiscated. Now here is a case of real hardship, one that should not stagger His Excellency the Governor as Mr. Morison's case did, and these men like the poor fishermen of Trinity Bay who "an outboard man" wrote to you about, are well worthy of that clemency which His Excellency has so generously extended to Mr. Morison.

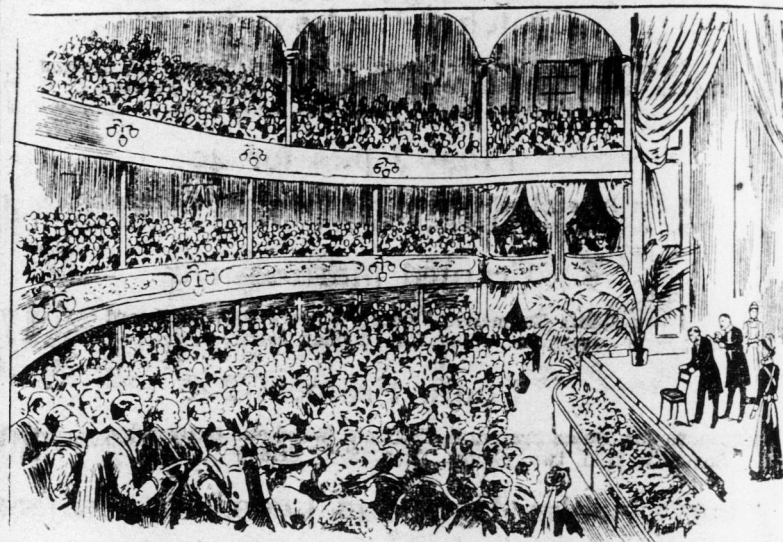

Sagona's Lab- rador Report.

The S. S. Sagona arrived at Twillingate from the Labrador coast, at 9.30 Tuesday night and got to Harbor Grace at 7.45 this morning. Her report is as follows:—

"Arrived at Holton, the 13th. Prevailing winds from south to southwest, and weather cold and foggy the whole trip north. Slack ice from Battle Hr. to Holton. No sign of fish from Holton to Pack's Hr. From Long Island to Scandy Islands to Battle Harbor, but very little done owing to ice interfering with trawling. Returning south had fine weather. Ice clear of coast. All the 'floaters' have gone north. The Stella Maris has gone north to Holton. Cachalot operating at Hawk Harbor has one whale."

Successful Garden Parties.

One of the most successful Garden Parties held this season was that which took place yesterday afternoon at the new Bowling Park. Fully 1,400 people were present, and the grounds were tastefully decorated with bunting. The weather looked threatening but except for one or two slight showers nothing occurred to mar the pleasure of the concourse in attendance. It was cool and pleasant and the people thoroughly enjoyed the affair which was held in aid of St. Patrick's Church Building Fund. Fifteen or more tables had been erected on the green, and the ladies of the committee with their gentlemen friends were kept busy serving teas, ice creams, drinks, etc. The band of the Total Abstinence Society enlivened the proceedings by discoursing many excellent airs; a dancing platform was well patronized and football fives and other games interested many admirers of manly sports. After tea there was dancing and games, and the most of the people returned at 8 and 9.30 p.m. There were present on the grounds during the afternoon His Grace Archbishop Howley, Monsignor Roche, Rev. Frs. St. John, McDermott, Pippy, Kelly, Sheehan, Ashley, Dr. Greene, several of the Christian Bros., the Premier, Mayor Ellis and other prominent personages. Financially the fete was most satisfactory to its promoters, and the energetic Chairman, Inspector Bambrick of the Municipal Council, and his aides deserve congratulation.

The sale of work and garden party held at St. Thomas's Rectory grounds yesterday afternoon proved a great success, and the attendance was larger than expected. The grounds were nicely prepared and the stalls were artistically decorated. They contained various sorts of fancy and plain articles, which were disposed of very quickly. The ladies in charge of the candy and flower tables did a brisk business. Praise is due to the ladies who served the delicious teas. The C. L. B. band was present, discoursed sweet music and helped to make the garden party enjoyable.

The Passing Of Miss Day.

Yesterday morning Miss Day died at the General Hospital as a result of burns she received while protecting a child during the fatal avalanche at Tilt Cove. It will be remembered that an avalanche swept down on the residence of the Manager, which is situated at the base of a steep incline, and buried it. Several fatalities ensued. Emily Day took up a child of Mr. and Mrs. Cunningham and protected it as best she could. She, however, was pinned to the hot stove and severely burned; so severely that after months of suffering she has at last given up her life as the price of her heroic conduct. Emily Day is a native of Trinity, and 27 years old, and she leaves behind her aged parents in Trinity, whose chief consolation must be the heroism of her who gave her life for the child left in her charge.

Good Fare.

The Lena Mand, Capt. Fudge, arrived from the Grand Banks last evening with 900 qtls. of codfish on board after only four days' operations. Fish were found plentiful. The Lena Mand is a new vessel and her commander is late of the Grace Tibbo, which was lost halibut fetching off Rose Blanche last winter. This is the third voyage of the Lena Mand, roughly aggregating 2,500 qtls. in salt bulk to date. The vessel came here for a supply of ice and provisions, and leaves port again to-morrow to resume operations, first going to Torbay to get a baiting.

TRAP BERTH TROUBLE.—A Petty Harbor fisherman named Crowe arrived here yesterday to settle a dispute about trap berths. Parties have placed their traps nearer his than the law permits and the matter will be referred to the court for adjustment.

The Turkish Cabinet resigned today in consequence of a revolt in the army against the methods of the Committee of Union and Progress.

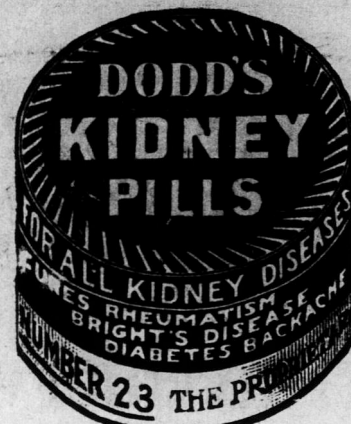

LONDON, July 17.
The Government is making another effort to get the London Dock Strike settled. The chief Liberal Whip, the Master of Elibank, called a conference which met at midnight in Premier Asquith's offices. The Premier, Lord Devonport, representing the Port authorities, and representatives of the men took part. The conference broke up at 4.30 a.m., without result. Another conference was held to-day.

Special Evening Telegram.
LONDON, July 17.
Premier Asquith is now on his way to Dublin, playing hide-and-seek with the suffragettes. He left his official residence this afternoon and appeared at Wolverhampton, accompanied by his daughter. There they entered a motor car, which has since been lost sight of. This is all the suffragettes have been permitted to know, and they are not likely to learn anything further until he arrives at Dublin to-morrow evening, where a great demonstration awaits him.

LONDON, July 17.
Dyke Acland, Under Secretary for Foreign Affairs, in reply to questions in the House of Commons on the subject of the Usumayo Rubber atrocities, stated that the British Government had been throughout in close communication with the United States Government. He assured the House that whenever American sympathy and support would be helpful they would readily be forthcoming. Acland hoped that the publication of the Blue Book by the Foreign Office would stimulate private enterprise, and establish missionary help for the victimized Indians.

Special to Evening Telegram.
WASHINGTON, July 17.
The formal British protest against the Panama Canal Bill will reach Washington on Thursday. As the State Department has already decided that under present conditions the subject is not one admitting diplomatic treatment, the protest will be merely acknowledged and immediately transmitted to the Senate House, probably accompanied by a special message from the President. Some officials believe that if Congress would content itself with action upon so much for the creation of an operating force for the waterway, the subject



may be divested of the urgency which now attaches to it, and the broad question of discrimination be left for subsequent adjustment. Representative Moore has discovered a way to meet the British objections. He has introduced a bill to neutralize the Canal, and give all nations an opportunity to pay a portion of its cost, which he states will approximate \$325,000,000. The annual maintenance will be about \$25,000,000.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, July 17.
Amid prolonged applause, Premier Borden declared in the Court Room of the House of Parliament last night, that in time of peril he believed every Dominion would give a response not less earnest than that of the Motherland. The occasion was a dinner of the Empire Parliamentary Association, to Mr. Borden. Rt. Hon. Alfred Lyttleton presided. Borden said that when Canada began to take a part in Imperial defence, conditions would change, and the overseas dominions would necessarily be summoned to the councils of the Central authority in Foreign and Naval matters. The time was at hand, he said, when the Dominions could be called upon to take a reasonable and legitimate share in maintaining the security of the Empire's defences.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, July 17.
Conferences between the British Government and Canadian ministers, yesterday, were informal. Canadian topics are uppermost and reflected in financial circles, where Canadian, and principally Western enterprises, are featured. Borden's speech at the Colonial Institute stimulated investment, and has, moreover, had an electrical effect in naval circles. Many naval officers declare they will go to Canada when retiring on Reserve, both because of its national prosperity, and to view the expansion of the Empire in the overseas territory. The London Chambers of Commerce will entertain Premier Borden at a banquet to-night, when the Governor of the Bank of England and many prominent financiers will be present.

England won the Kolapore cup, South Africa, 750; Canada, 746; Guernsey, 725; India, 724.

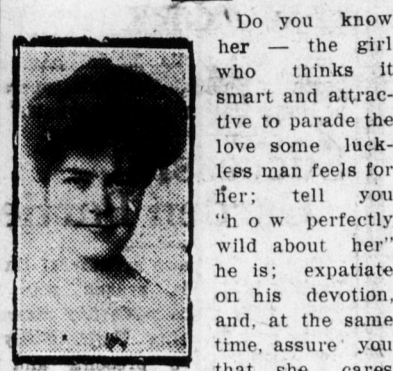
A Foolish Pose.

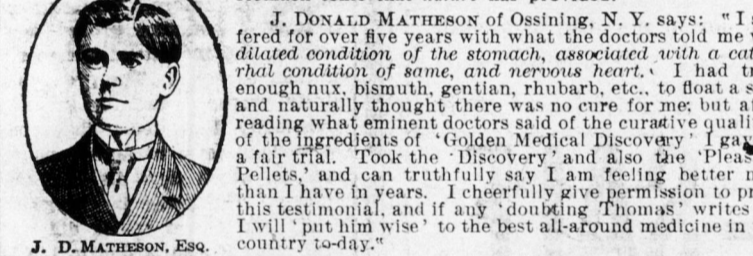
