

BRITISH BOMBARD EL ARISH.

LONDON, May 19. British warships and aeroplanes have bombarded the town of Pales-tine, and are believed to have destroyed the fort there, it was announced officially to-day. El Arish is on the Turkish line of communication from Syria to Egypt.

ALLIES DETERMINED TO HOLD

NEW YORK, May 19. A News Agency despatch from Petrograd to-day says that the Allies stand solid for a fight to a finish. They intend to break Germany's heavy sword; they owe this to the unborn generation. This answer to the peace talk made in Berlin was made to-day by Rene Vivani, former French Prime Minister, now Minister of Justice in the French Cabinet. He has been making extensive visits to England and Russia. At the French Embassy he gave the second interview he ha anted since the war began. I am ot qualified to speak on Germany' intentions, continued the French Cab-inet official, but our alliance is more compact than at any time since the war began and is growing stronger. The Allies continue to grow stronger in ammunition and meh. They will force her to make full reparation for what she has done. There will be no separate peace. The Allies are as one. They have devised an economic entente, and after peace the world will find that the Allies are equally unified. He expressed the greatest pleasure at the results of his visit to ngland and Russia.

ITALIANS EVACUATE ZEGNATOR-

ROME, May 19. The Italian official communication issued here to-day admits the evacuation by the Italians of Zegnatorta and also of the line from Monte Maggio to Sagliodaspio between Tarragnolo Valley and Upper Astico, southeast of Trent, following several days of violent artillery bombardment.

WILL NOT RELAX PRESSURE.

LONDON, May 19. Re the German suggestion that Britain respond to a change of the German submarine campaign, should modify their food blockade, Lord Robert Cecil informed the Associated Press to-day that there was not the remotest possibility that British economic pressure on the Central Powers would be relaxed. He said, we main tain the blockade fully legal under the international law and its reprisal character is merely incidental called forth by the German use of submarines, but by rigid enforcement of the blockade and merely the extension of our rights which we had hitherto found it expedient to use.

NO ONE SAVED.

MARSEILLES, May 19. the French coasting steamer Mira was saved when the ship was sunk as the result of torpedo attack in the Mediterranean on May 16th. Sinking of the steamer Mira was announced by Lloyds in London on Thursday, but no details of the disaster were given. She was a vessel of 3,000 tons, and owned at Marseilles.

TENSION SLAGKENS.

LONDON, May 19. It is learned from the Foreign Office that the tension between Sweden and the Entente Allies had been ended ,although no official statement i forthcoming at this time. Lord Robert Cecil, Minister of War Trade, told the Associated Press that an agreement had been reached to-day, bu would give no details. He indicated that the controversy between Sweden and Russia over the Aland Island: was fictitious, saying that Russia nev er intended to fortify the Islands.

After unkindly reminding us that Wilhelm was for many years-almost indeed, until the bubble burst in August 1914-the idol of the unthinking crowd throughout the world, and casting doubt on the united devotion which the German people are still upposed to feel towards their "glor ous Waiser." the writer records a conersation which he had with Count Herbert Bismark a quarter of a century ago, when the Count, more in prow than in anger, drew his attention to the change which was coming over German thought and affecting the German position in the world owing to the definite mental peciliaries of the Emperor:-

According to Herbert Bismarck, the wo greatest dangers awaiting the erman Emperor, and with him the uture of the German Empire sprang rom his irrepressible, restless, nervimpressionable temperament, which, while it enabled him to seize quickly the surface aspect of every imaginable subject which came before him at the same time constituted an effectual bar against his ever penetrating into the soul of anything. A further handicap, almost as ominou was that, although-the Emperor was endowed with an exceptional amount of cunning, he was never a reader of character. He possessed little or no insight into the depths of the human heart, and thus was more than likely to bestow his confidence on people utterly unworthy of it.



DECIMAL COINAGE.

Plans for a scheme of decimal coin age adapted to the present currency in this country have just been drawn up by the Decimal Association. The Committee propose to make the florin, which is a tenth part of a sovereign, the unit coin. The florin is a satisfactory unit in that its adoption would cause little change in the gold With the banner of Christ over them and silver coinage of the country. nickel or bronze, there being 10 and 5 cent nickel pieces of the approximate and 4 cent pieces corresponding to the present penny, 2 cents and 1 cent half-sovereign would be retained as Press, but lacks the power of those 10-florin and 5-florin pieces. The florin would be the unit or 100-cent piece, the shilling the 1/2-florin, and the sixpence the 4-florin. Such a system of currency, the Decimal Association argue, would not disturb our present coinage, and would be in ac cordance with the standard adopted in most of the European countries, as well as in America and Canada.

EASTER FLOWERS.

The floral hall at Covent Garden London's fruit and vegetable market will be a bower of bloom this week St George's day on April 23rd happening to fall within the period of the Easter flower demand, which is always very great. Usually the daffodils or Lent lilies come from the Channel Islands and the sunny Scilly Isles, but Easter being late these supplies are practically over, and the growers in the Home Counties and in Lincolnshire will chiefly benefit.
