TINNED GOODS. With respect to the last class what may be called staple foodstuffs, hat is to say, tinned meats and such ike, we find that, contrary to con non belief, the prices of these good in stock have not been unduly ad vanced from time to time, but that, in the main, the rates charged hav been the normal ones proper for the successive shipments of these goods advances not being made except such as warranted by the increasing prices goods actually purchased of the

ene oil, etc., as follows:

This is true also of tinned fruit, and imilar articles which are also import ed extensively. As a matter of fact, the prices of all these articles have advanced several times since the war began, and are now very considerably higher than three years ago. Dealers in the Colony have, as these advances have occurred, had to pay the ncreased rate, and then have natur ally had to advance their price in or der to secure their fair profit.

KEROSENE OIL We find that the prices charged fo erosene oil in this Colony to-day, owing to competition between the two



In Memoriam JAMES CARROLL. Within the past month the Reaper whose name is Death has been busy n carrying to the Great Beyond some of our best citizens. This is particuarly true of James Carroll, who up to a year ago had been Treasurer of the Star of the Sea Association for a number of years as well as ne of the founders and Vice-Presients thereof. The subject of this ote was born at Holyrood in 1860. nd died there on the 30th of August, 1917, aged 57 years. In early life he pursued the avocation of fishermanarmer. Later he emigrated to the U.S.A. where he engaged at carpentering on State work in the city of Boston. In later years he returned to Newfoundland and entered on a career of mercantile business which he pursued with great activity and success almost to the day of his death, building p quite a large trade and leaving a oing concern to be developed still urther by his two active and energetic sons. Mr. Carroll took a prom nent part in the public life of our town, and was always the leading spirit and central figure in societies, lubs, schools and church organizaions. Up to January last he possessed good health, but alarming sympoms compelled him then to seek treatnent in the hospital, and he returned ncurable from that institution. He had also the treatment of some of the best medical skill of the city, but all efforts proved fruitless to arrest the progress of the fatal malady. Rev. W. . Finn was in constant attendance on the sick man, and fortunately happened along at the moment when the angel of death was hovering over the ed, and administered the last Sacranents. The funeral appointments were in charge of Undertaker Dunphy who had the remains enclosed in a handsome polished oak casket. 

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
