



Dear Sir,-It would appear from certain comments in the press anent business depression, that some of the writers are at sea as to the cause of the chaotic state into which we find ourselves. Some complain that no one has stated the cause of the trouble, but this may be due to the fact that the complainer is not familiar enough with economics to recognize the cause when stated. If some one says that morality, personality, etc., can only be explained in terms of positive and regative electrons, this would not be clear to a Veddah, but it would be clear to the modern physicist. It may not be elucidative to those whose psychoplasm is bent askew from the effect of frothy literature, but it will be understood by the student of economics, when it is said that the present state of business is due to the incompatibility of titles to money with only enough actual money for the payment and circulation of mere wages, or, try it this way: paper money, book keeping money, titles to money, money of account, have increased about 30 times faster than real money. A most momentous fact -this money increased at a furious rate during the war. All the loans we heard of were not loans at all. It was simply writing some ones name down for so much money which did not exist. Now the title holders to this money are looking for it, but there is none forthcoming. Capitalism has arrived at a stage when it needs new capital to carry on production, but this money is not to be had. Hence the world wide depression. But you say, why do not the banks lend the needed money to the individual Capitalists? 

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
