

This is a fateful week for the industries of this country, miners, railwaymen, and engineers being all engaged in conferences with a view to discov ering a way out of the economic diffi culties which had beset them. Thei several troubles are not unrelated The inability of coal exporters to commineral traffic that the railway comfor compensating economies in working while the high price of coal and transport charges have no small share in placing out shipyards and engineer ing works on a par with our collierie ding the arrange ding t take a reasonable view of the position. As matters have gradually grown worse, and the eagerly-looked-for turn of the tide has been so frequently promised only to add as frequently to our cup of disappointment-if not of actual despair-masters and men alike have been impressed with the gravity to-day much less of the spirit of beland much more of the necessary spirit of mutual accommodation and compromise. Therein lies our only hope. There are, of course, men who are anxious to exploit the existing situa-

tion for political ends-and even Mr.

Ramsay MacDonald, forgetting his own Government's inability to produce from a hat the rabbits which they had assured us were there, could not deny himself the pleasure of moving a vote of censure on the Government for failing to grapple with unemployment -but the hard facts are such as to prevent the level-headed working man from being made a party to such shameless exploitation. Mr. Cook would, if he could, lead the miners a sorry dance in the interests of nationalisation-and the miners' recent demand for higher wages to meet the increased cost of living shows us what that would mean. It would mean, to start with, a loss of £30,000,000 a year, which would require to be made up by the taxpayer-and, after all, the industry would remain where it is! The real problem is how to reduce our pithead cost of 13s a ton to something like France's and Germany's 7s 6d, and this, of course, means a reduction in our overhead charges somewhere. Dr. W. A. Potts, M.A., in a lecture at Birmingham, which is reported in the Lancet, has some straight remarks o make to parents. Amongst other things he said:-

"We ought to do all we can to make early marriage possible. The father should help his son to marry early, and not present the pitiable spectacle of a manager past his best, still directing the business, which is going down-hill, while the son, who could do more effective work, has to remain a subordinate, and year after year tell his girl that father still hangs on, and so makes marriage for hem impossible.

Parents often say there is no lefinite taste; this frequently means that the boy has a call to some work such as a minister, or farmer, an acor or a soldier, which the parents either despise as a calling or regard as too unremunerative for their wonderful offspring.






