The country is overstocked with the former animals; a very good saddle beast can be bought for £6 or £7, and draught horses at from £20 to £30 cach. Mr. Wm. Gray, of Paisley Block, has received a letter from his son, in-law, Mr. J Dickie, who, together with his with and family, formed members of a small party who left this section of country last Fall to seek new homes beneath the genial skies of New Zealand. I went on to Turikani, where we procured the services of a carrier to take us up to our place. My father of course gave us a parental greeting. We have got a very nice farm of 500 acres, as fine land as I ever saw. The soil is a deep loam, and there are no stones to render agriculture difficult. There are about 40 acres of it wooded and well watered, and we have imade an offer for 80 acres more which lie contiguous, and I think we will get them. With this exception the place is fern land and very easily cleared. Uncle William has bought 50 acres of bush land for the sake of the firewood, and will purchase the place next ours if he can strike a bargain. If he can, he will have a very nice farm of 450 acres.

Cruelty to Animals.

Sir John A. Macdonald has introduced a bill on this subject which has long been needed in Canada. It provides that "whoseever wantonly, cruelly, or unnecessarily beats, binds, illtreats abuses on tortures any horse, mare, gelding, bull, ox, cow, heifer, steer, calf, mule, ass, sheep, lamb, pig, or other cattle, or any poultry, or any dog, or domestic animal or bird, or whoseever driving any cattle or other animal, is by negligence or illusage in the driving thereof, the means whereby any mischief, damage or injury is done by any such cattle or other animal," shall upon being convicted of any or either of the said offences, forefeit and pay a sum not exceeding ten nor less than one dollar, with costs, over and above the amount of the damage or injury if it can be determined. In default of payment the offender may be committed to the common jail or house of correction for any period not exceeding fourteen days. Prosecutions under the act are not to affect any civil remedy or recourse; nor are the restrictions as to binding of animals to apply to those being conveyed to any market at a distance not exceeding fifteen miles from the owner's house or premises, but such animals shall not remain so bound for a longer space than lalf an hour after their arrival at such premises, but such animals shall not re-main so bound for a longer space than half an hour after their arrival at such market. Offenders may be apprehended on view, or upon information to any peace officer, and without authority or peace officer, and without authority awarrant be conveyed before a Justice of the Peace who shall at once hear evidence and deal with the case. The Abyssinian Victory.

The Abyssinian Victory.

In the House of Commons, on the 27th of April, after some remarks by Mr. Layard, the Prime Minister said:—I rise to say a few words on this subject, which we can approach with unmixed satisfaction. Her Majesty's Government took the most extensive means in their power yesterday to make the success of our arms known as widely as possible; but I think I express the unanimous opinion of my colleagues when I assume that it may be more respectful to this House that I should communicate the intelligence in a more formal manner, and confirm its authenticity. It will hereafter be my duty to propose a motion, by command of duty to propose a motion, by comma Her Majesty, and will give hono members every opportunity of expret their opinions. I will, therefore, not duty to propose a motion, by command of Her Majesty, and will give honorable members every opportunity of expressing their opinions. I will, therefore, not venture to make any further observations, as there is no motion before us; but I will merely congratulate the House upon the great events that have occurred in Abyssinia. I am sure the house will agree with me that as a feat of arms it would have been impossible for it to have been more complete or successful. The troops engaged in the operation and the great leader who directed them are equally entitled to the credit which I am sure the house will accord to them. (Cheers.) I will read a passage which I copied from a letter from Sir Robert Napler just before his last advance. Writing on the 23rd of last month he says; "The troops are well. I have found in them the most admirable spirit of emulation, and a desire to advance the interests of the expedition. Officers and men alike deserve every praise." (Cheers.) Such is the character of the troops. But what shall be said of the general himself? On another occasion we may perhaps have an opportunity of touching upon his career, which has been in so many respects so eminent; but, with reference to the present expedition, I must say that, when we consider its character—the march of four hundred miles through an unknown country, and the prudence, the sagacity, the patience, and above all, the firmness of the commander—it resembles more than any other event in history, the advance of Cortez into Mexico. But there has been this difference between the Abyssinian expedition and the great invasion of Mexico. We did not enter Abyssinia to destroy the innocent, but we entered it in support of justice, humanity, religion and civilization; and we are about to evacuate the country in a manner that will prove the purity of our motives. (Loud cheers.)

NATURALISATION IN CANADA.—
The new naturalisation law of Canada permits foreigners, after one year's residence in the country, to acquire, upon suitable application, all the rights of citizenship. This law is even more liberal than that of the United States, so that the matter of ready naturalisation should be no bar against Europeans and other immigrants settling in Canada. At one time, objections were urged, more particularly by Germans settling in Western Canada, which the new law will definitively remove; and it is to be hoped that this and other mely made facilities for settling in Canada will have a speedy effect in promoting an increase of population.

D'ARCY MeGEE'S LAST LETTER.

HIS OPINION OF THE FENIANS.

The Dublin Nation publishes the fol-wing letter from the Hon. Thomas D'-roy McGee, M. P. for Montreal, to the ight Hon. the Earl of Mayo. It was ritten on the Sunday evening preceding

the assassination:—
House of Commons, Ottawa, Canada,
April 4th, 1868.

My Lord,—During the Irish debate in
the Imperial Parliament, on the 10th day
of last month, the report of which has
just reached us, you did me the high
honor to refer to my public position in
this country, and to point your testimony
to the loyalty of the Irish inhabitants of
Canada, by the use of my humble name.
I am, my lord, deeply assable of the

I am, my lord, deeply sensible of the very handsome manner in which you then spoke of myself personally; and of the just tribute you paid to the class of colonists to which I have the honor to belong; and I trust your lordship will not feel that I take an ill way of showing my gratitude by inflicting on you this letter.

letter.

It has forced itself on my mind that I owe it to your lordship, as an eminent Irishman in the Imperial service, as well as to dear old Ireland, and in some degree to Canada also, to explain in a few sentences the sense in which alone I could receive the high personal compliment you have paid me, with unmixed satisfaction.

Our countrymen, my lord, in the Dominion of Canada, with their descendants, are a full third of the four millions of her Majesty's North American subjects. In religion they are nearly half and half, Protestant and Catholic. Though few can be called wealthy, the majority of both creeds are proprietors in town or country. In the city I represent (Montrea); their aggregate property, acquired mostly in this generation, is valued at many millions of dollars. In the rural parts there are literally thousands of them who possess their holdings in fee, and unincumbered. The best specimens of both classes are among the most meritorious members of Canadian society. Property has made them conservative in the truest sense—conservative of character, and zealous to uphold the law. The generous national temperament, shrivelled and cankered by hopeless penury at home, has renewed its youth with us, and keeps putting forth fruits of public and private good, to the great satisfaction of every lover o' this country. Without having acquired the feverish thirst for riches, the love of empty show, or the illumderstood democratic notions of so many of the Irish in the neighboring republic, our settlers here will be admitted by all who know equally well both sides of the boundary line to be as warmly interested in the good repute and good government of their beloved fatherland as any set of men can be, at home or abroad.

As a general rule—an almost unexceptional rule—both classes, in town and country, while ardently and unmistakeably Irish, are, at the same time, as loyal to British American institutions, as thoroughly content with the government of this country for some years past, I have felt it to be my first duty to strengthen and extend this patriotic spirit, for their own good and the good of our adopted country; and in doing so I felt bound necessarily to resist and combat the invidious and incessant efforts to the contrary of the secret Irish societies established during the civil war at New York. When those societies have giv

Our countrymen in Canada, my lord, o not so much regard the American aders as the enemies of England, but leaders as the enemics of England, but rather as enemies of Canada and enemies of Ireland. We see in them not so much regulators of Irish wrongs, as impediments to Ireland's reconstruction Those of us, who are Catholics, living in and by our holy faith, add to this political hostility towards Fenianism, a rooted horror to all secret societies, so frequently condemned and anathematised by the Knowing moreover, what manner of men the American organizers usually are—seeing the wanton misery they have caued their dupes 'at home—and the dishonor they have brought on the Irish name everywhere—the sound of Fenianism is detested with us, save and except by a few characterless desperadoes among the floating population of our principal cities.

the Irish name everywhere—the sound of Fenianism is detested with us, save and except by a few characterless desperadoes among the floating population of our principal cities.

But I cannot conceal from your lordship that no lay advocacy, and no ecclesiastical influence, could have kept our countymen here loyal and at peace, if this country were governed as Ireland has been for the sixy-eight years of her legislative union with Great Britain. Everything our emigrants find in Canada is very unlike everything they left behind them in Ireland. We have here no Established Church, no system of tenancy at will, no Poor Laws, nor any need of them. We have instead a complete religious equality among all our churches, a general acquisition of property as the reward of well directed industry, the fullest local control of our own resources and revenues: our collegiate and primary education; our public works; our militia, marine and courts of justice. Therefore, it is my lord, we are all loyal to the Queen in Canada, and well content, as well we may be, with the government of this country.

It is not for me, at this distanc from Ireland, and in the absence of recent Irish experience, to make the application of this example, or so much of it as can be applied to the very different condition of Ireland. I but state the facts of the Irish position in these provinces, for your lordship's meditation as an Imperial adviser of the Crown, as I have already had the honor to do more fully, last year while in London, to your illustrious late leader, the Earl of Derby; and in 1865 when in Dublin, to Lord Kimberley—then Lord-Lieutenant.

I must not, however, assume that the passing notice with which your lordship honored me in the late debate, can justify farther intrusion on your valuable time but I fe't; on all the grounds above stated, a strong prompting to explain frankly to your lordship the true secret of Irish-Canadian loyalty. We are loyal because our equal civil, social and religious rights are respected by this government, in



A New SWINDLING DODGE.—The Canadien warms his readers against the operations of a new order of pediars, who have succeeded in robbing the country people to a large extent already:—'We learn that some individuals have lately travelled through our parishes, offering for sale all kinds of goods at fabulous prices. The cunning tactics used by these industrious persons induced many to purchase largely. One goes first with a load of varied goods, which he offers from house to house in a most fascinating manner. He divides his goods in lots of different value, and offers them by the lot at a stated price, but promising to add to each lot a proportion of silk at 12 cents a yard, and cotton at five cents—a privilege enjoyed only by those who buy the lots first offered. He says that the silks and cotton are in charge of a pediar who will pass through the place the next day. He takes promisory notes in payment for the purchases thus made. It is useless to add that the silks and cheap muslins do not make their appearance. Some persons to our knowledge have been taken in for \$200, others for \$300. When the notes become due, an unknown person calls upon the signers for payment. The fear of trouble, prosecution, law expenses induces the people to pay, and the trick is performed."

The machine is intended to print 46,000 sheets or 23,000 perfect copies per hour, which is a greater number than has evere been accomplished; and it also cuts the paper into sheets, folds them, and records the number printed.
