Those Who Talk of War-Explana LONDON, March 13 .- In the house of commons this afternoon Mr. Gladstone announced that an agreement had been arrived at between Russia and England by which neither the Russians nor the Afghans would advance any further on either side of the frontier.

Sir Stafford Northcote asked whether the agreement was permanent? Mr. Gladstone replied that the agreement was to last as long as there was occasion for it. (Laughter). The agreement, he said, pro-vides against the rupture of friendly relations between the two governments in the event of a collision between the Afghan

and Russian outposts.

Mr. Forster asked whether the agreement was a new one or one which had been supposed to be in force for some time. Mr. Gladstone replied that it was a new

agreement, one that had grown out of recent correspondence and the new circum stances. He said he was unable to answer questions regarding the positions assumed by the Afghans. Mr. Onslow (conservative) asked whether the ameer of Afghanistan had

Mr. Gladstone made no reply.

The Marquis of Hartington stated that there was still cause for great anxiety regarding the relations between Great Britain and Russia.



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
