

### THE ESSEX LIBERALS SPLIT. A WALK-OVER FOR THE CONSERVATIVES PROBABLE.

Whisky at the Bottom of the Trouble.—The Ottawa City Freeman, the Ottawa Citizen and the Ottawa Journal, in their issue of Monday, April 14, have published the following account of the Essex Liberal split:

The Ontario Liberal Party in Essex County has split into two factions. The one faction, headed by Mr. J. H. G. Macdonald, is known as the 'Old Guard' and the other as the 'New Guard'. The 'Old Guard' is composed of the old members of the party, while the 'New Guard' is composed of the new members who have joined since the last election.

The split occurred at a meeting of the Essex Liberal Association held on Monday evening last. At this meeting, Mr. Macdonald proposed that the party should be reorganized on a new basis. His proposal was opposed by the 'Old Guard' members, who felt that the party should remain as it was.

The result of the meeting was a deadlock. The 'Old Guard' members refused to accept the proposals of the 'New Guard' members. Consequently, the party is now in a state of division.

It is believed that the Conservative Party will walk over the divided Liberals in the next election. The Conservatives are well organized and have a strong following in Essex County.

### DAVID LAWRIE OF TORONTO THE DUNNILL MURDER AT LAST IDENTIFIED.

New York, April 14.—The body of a man was found in a barrel on the east side of the Hudson river, in New York City, on Monday morning. The body was identified as that of David Lawrie of Toronto, who was murdered in the Dunhill Hotel in New York City on the night of March 27.

The body was found floating in the Hudson river. It was discovered by a fisherman who was out with his net. The body was brought to the morgue and examined by a coroner.

The coroner's report states that the man was about 35 years of age, of medium build, and had dark hair. He was wearing a dark suit and a white shirt. The cause of death was asphyxiation, caused by a ligature around his neck.

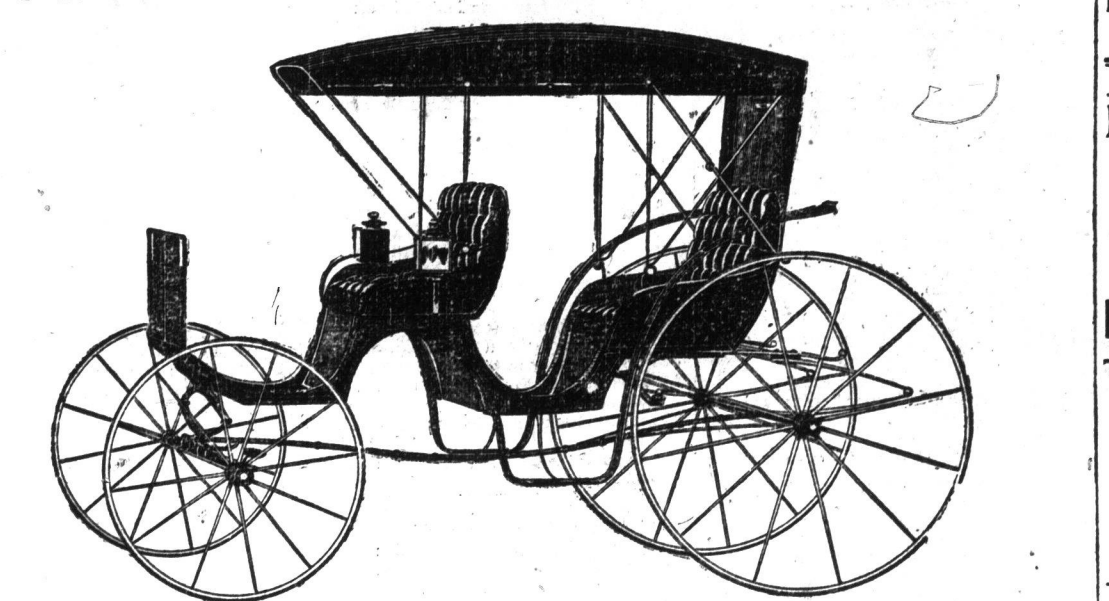
