# PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNAPOLIS COUNTY MUNICIPAL COUNCIL.

ANNAPOLIS, S. S.

In the Municipal Council, Jan. 30, 1880.  
The first meeting of the Council convened at the Court House on Tuesday the 13th January.  
At 10.30 a. m., the Sheriff called the meeting to order and proceeded to examine the Poll Books, after which the oath of allegiance and of office were administered to the following Councilors by Ed. Barreau, Esq., viz:

After which the Sheriff vacated the chair and Geo. Kennedy, Esq., Councilor for Ward No. 6 was appointed chairman.

It was ordered, That the election of officers be by ballot, whereupon a ballot being taken for the office of Warden, Geo. Kennedy, Esq., Councilor for Ward No. 6 was declared unanimously elected Warden of the Municipality, and was thereupon sworn into office by Councilor W. H. Young.

It was ordered, That the salary of the Clerk of the Municipality be \$300 per year, after which, on motion, the Council proceeded to ballot for that officer for the ensuing year; resulting in the election of G. H. Parker as Clerk, who was thereupon sworn into office by the Warden.

It was ordered, That the salary of the Treasurer of the Municipality be \$200 per year, after which, on motion, the Council proceeded to ballot for that officer for the ensuing year, resulting in the election of W. Y. Foster as Treasurer, who was thereupon sworn into office by the Warden.

It is ordered by the Council, That the list of County and Township officers as presented at the October Term of General Sessions, 1879, and confirmed by the Court, be and the same is hereby adopted with the exception of the appointments of Collectors of County and Railway rates; the Council nevertheless reserving to themselves the right of making such additions to the already existing appointments as may be necessary.

It is ordered by the Council, That Printed Hand Bills be posted in three of the most public places in each Ward of the Municipality calling for tenders for the collection of County and Railway rates, which tenders shall be received at the office of the Clerk of the Municipality not later than the last Tuesday of February, 1880, said tenders to be signed by the party tendering and to state the rate per cent. for collecting, and the names and residences of the sureties he proposes to offer as bondsmen for the due fulfillment of the duties of his office and the payment of the amount of his Rate Roll over to the Treasurer in accordance with the terms of the By-Laws regulating such payments which such tenders, when so received, shall, on the day mentioned, be submitted to the Committee on Tenders and Public Property for their determination, who, after examination, shall report to the Clerk the name of the party determined upon as collector for each ward.

It is ordered, That the Council resolve itself into Committee of the whole on By-Laws, in accordance with Chapter 84 of the Incorporation Act.

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It is ordered, That the Printing of the Municipality be put up to Tender and Contract.

It is ordered, That the Clerk be empowered by the Council to draw from the from the Treasury out of moneys now on hand the sum of fifteen dollars with which to purchase a seal for the Municipality agreeable to a By-law on that subject.

It is ordered, That the Printing, Postage, and Stationery Bills be paid out of the Contingent Fund, the same having been previously audited by the Auditors appointed for this Municipality.

It is ordered, That the Clerk be authorized to purchase a new set of books suitable and requisite for the Municipality, and to draw from the Treasury out of funds now on hand a sum sufficient for that purpose.

It is ordered, That Poor District No. 4, in the Township of Annapolis be empowered by this Council to assess upon the rateable inhabitants of said poor district the sum of \$375.00 for poor purposes agreeably to the report of the Overseers of the Poor for said District.

It is ordered, That the Poor District of Mattland be empowered by this Council to assess upon the rateable inhabitants of said Poor District the sum of \$40.00 for poor purposes agreeably to the report of the Overseers of the Poor for said District.

Upon reading the petition of the Overseers of the Poor of the marsh known as the Stony Beach Marsh or Queen Annie's Marsh. It is ordered, That the petition be placed on file, and that further consideration of the prayer of said petition be deferred until the ensuing semi-annual meeting of this Council, and that, in the meantime, the provisions contained in Chapter 48, B. S., Fourth Series, be complied with.

Upon reading and considering the petition of Stephen McCaul and upwards of twenty others, freeholders of the County, praying for the alteration of a road leading from, at or near Goat Island in Granville, to Delaps Cove on the Bay of Fundy shore. It is ordered, That the prayer of said petition be granted, and that a Committee be appointed to inquire into the propriety and necessity of said alteration as prayed for and if necessary and proper, to lay out said alteration according to law. Committee, William Armstrong.

Upon reading and considering the petition of David B. Phinney and upwards of twenty others, freeholders of the County, praying the Council to adopt such measures as will relieve the Municipality of taxation for the right of way on an alteration of the road leading from the Chute road westward to the Phinney road, it is ordered, That the prayer of said petition be not granted—the matter not being legally before the Council.

Upon reading and considering the petition of Jacob Dukeshire in reference to cattle running at large in Litchfield School Section, it is ordered, That further consideration of this petition be deferred.

It is ordered, That no cattle run at large in the Municipality during the ensuing year.

It is ordered, That in addition to the ordinary duties of Clerks of Poor Districts as defined by Statute, they shall also furnish Secretaries of School Districts within the bounds of their respective Poor Districts with certified lists of the rateable inhabitants in each school section, together with the amount for which each is assessed.

Also to furnish Surveyors of Highways with all persons liable to perform Statute labor, and the number of days each is liable to perform. Fee for certifying each School Roll, 25c. Remuneration for the last named service, a deduction of two days' Statute labor from the amount for which said clerk is liable.

It is ordered, That the name of Wm. Simmons be struck off the list and that of Alex. Campbell retained as Surveyor of Highways for Road District No. 3, Ward 2.

It is ordered, That 200 copies of the By-Laws be published and that the cost of printing the same be paid out of the Contingent Fund.

It is ordered, That the County Treasurer furnish each Councilor at the Annual Meeting of the Council in January with an abstract of his accounts—25 copies to be furnished.

It is ordered, That the Surveyor of Highways for Ward No. 9 be relieved from applying to the Poor Clerk of Clements for Statute labor lists, and that D. J. Morse be appointed to prepare said lists, and that the Clerk of the Municipality forward the Statute labor blanks for said ward to the said D. J. Morse.

It is ordered, That the Warden and Councilors receive the amount of remuneration mentioned in the Incorporation Act.

It is ordered, That the name of John Bery be amended so as to read John Burney, as Surveyor of Roads for District No. 53, Granville.

It is ordered, That the semi-annual meeting of the Council shall be held at Bridgetown.

It is ordered, That the Government be memorialized at the ensuing session of the Legislature, to change the time of holding the semi-annual meeting from the first Tuesday in May to the third Tuesday in April with a view thereby the better to conserve the leading interests of the Municipality.

It is ordered, That the Councilors for the various wards be paid out of the funds of the Municipality in the same manner as Grand Jurors were heretofore paid for attendance upon the Court of Sessions.

It is ordered, That the amount of Returning Officers' and Clerks' bills as provided for by Statute, be paid out of the funds of the Municipality, and that the amount actually paid for the use of polling booths be paid out of the same funds upon the Presiding Officers filing with the Clerk a certificate stating the amount actually paid by him.

Upon reading and considering the various money bills, as reported by the Committee on Finance, it is ordered, That the same be added to the General Presentment and assessed levied

and collected in the same manner as County Rates are assessed, levied and collected.

Upon motion the Council adjourned until the second Tuesday of February, 1880, at 10 o'clock a. m.

The Council met at the Court House, Annapolis, on Tuesday, 10th day of February, 1880, at ten o'clock, a. m., pursuant to adjournment.

Present:—The Warden; Councilors McGregor, Roach, Leonard, Vidito, Young, Thorne, Roop, Miller, Corbett, Bent, Longley, Ford, Buckler.

Councilor Corbett who was absent in England at the first meeting, being present, was sworn into office, after which the minutes of the former meeting were read and adopted.

It is ordered, That the name of Corey Odell be erased as a Commissioner of Ferry Slips agreeably to the request of that gentleman.

It is ordered, That Hon. W. B. Troop be appointed to make out Statute labor lists and certify school rolls for Ward No. 5.

It is ordered, That John E. Bath be appointed Surveyor of Highways for District No. 9 in the Township of Granville—the party appointed by the Sessions being over 60 years of age.

It is ordered, That all parties filing out Statute labor lists be relieved of two days' Statute labor.

It is ordered, That Hugh M. Irvine be appointed to fill out lists for Statute Labor and certify to School Rolls for Ward No. 6.

Upon reading and considering the petition of William Croscup and others, in reference to cattle running at large, it is ordered, That the portion of Granville comprised by Ward No. 7, be exempt from the operation of the order prohibiting cattle from running at large.

Upon reading and considering the dedication of a certain portion of land to the Commissioners of Streets for the Town of Annapolis Royal by Edward Barreau, John Harris and Edward Ryerson, it is ordered, That the same be confirmed.

The Council then adjourned and went into Committee on the whole By-Laws, to meet again on Wednesday, at 10 o'clock, a. m.

WEDNESDAY.  
The Council opened at 10 o'clock, a. m. Present:—The Warden; Councilors McGregor, Roach, Leonard, Vidito, Young, Thorne, Roop, Miller, Corbett, Bent, Longley, Ford, Buckler.

The minutes of the former day were read and adopted.

It is ordered, That the name of John A. Wright be substituted as Cattle Reeve for Ward No. 8, in place of Obed Cross.

It is ordered, That Councilors receive no remuneration for their services in the laying out and distribution of Provincial road and bridge service moneys.

It is ordered, That the Tenders for Printing shall state the rate per hundred or fifty of each class of circulars, hand bills and headings separately, and the rate per hundred for by-laws separately, defining the price of each.

Upon reading and considering the petition of Joseph Clark and others in reference to a road from the Phinney road to the Chute road, it is ordered, That the said petition be laid over until the semi-annual meeting, and that in the meantime all proceedings be stayed, and that a committee of three be appointed to examine said road in the meantime, and that a copy of this order be mailed to proprietors of soil on the line of said road.

Committee—Alfred Bay, Oliver Ruffe and Wm. Muir.

It is ordered, That a committee of five Councilors be appointed to examine into the condition of the lunatics chargeable to this Municipality and now confined in the Hospital for the Insane, with full powers upon receiving the report of the travelling certificate of the committee.

The said committee are further empowered to examine into and report to the semi-annual meeting of this Council all facts and circumstances connected with any property held by or in trust for any insane pauper, chargeable to this Municipality.

Committee—Councilors Longley, Leonard, Bent, Corbett and Roach.

It is ordered, That the expenses of lighting the bridges at Bridgetown and Lawrentown cease to be a County charge after the 31st October next.

It is ordered, That the bond of Mr. David Ingle be returned to him, and that he be requested to prepare and file a bond in double the amount of license money, with sufficient securities conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties as prescribed by by-law for the Municipal year, ending Dec. 31st, 1880.

It is ordered, That a Committee consisting of the Warden, and Couns. Corbett and Thorne be appointed to examine into the condition of the ferry between Annapolis and Granville, with a view of improving the accommodation for the travelling public: the said committee to report at the semi-annual meeting.

It is ordered, That the Treasurer of the Municipality be requested to furnish to the Council at the semi-annual meeting, next ensuing, a statement, extending back as far as authentic documents in his possession reach, showing the amount of money assessed upon each Ward for county purposes, and the loss sustained in the collection of rates for each ward during the like period.

Councilor Corbett moved the following resolution, viz: That this Council do appoint three general assessors for the Municipality, whose duty it shall be to equalize the assessments rateably over the entire Municipality; that after the total amount of assessment for the County shall have been ascertained, it shall be the duty of the Council to divide the County into Districts for the purpose of taxation, and the different districts so divided shall be taxed *pro rata* according to their respective assessments.

Upon motion of Councilor McGregor, the above resolution was ordered to lie over until the semi-annual meeting ensuing.

Councilor Corbett gave notice that at the ensuing semi-annual meeting he would move a resolution providing for the better support and maintenance of the Poor in this Municipality.

Councilor Roop gave notice that at the next ensuing semi-annual meeting he would move a resolution to exempt the Township of Clements from the operation of any regulation or order that may then be made for the general support of the poor.

The various by-laws as passed in Committee were subsequently adopted by the Council.

The Percheron and Norman Horse

From the earliest times to the present day it has been a great mistake to look to mankind that so little attention has been paid to the breeding and rearing of a more perfect and powerful race of horses for heavy farm and road work...

A numerous society, composed of noblemen, the landed gentry, and farmers of Scotland, has recently been formed for the purpose of procuring a breed of their larger sort of horses. This society takes the name of Clydesdale, and that distinguished nobleman Earl Dunlop has been devoting a considerable part of his time during the past two years to editing a Stud Book of their horses, classed also as Clydesdale.

Within the past three years 200 to 1000 guineas (\$1000 to \$5000) has been the common price in Great Britain for select heavy horses for breeding purposes, and even 1500 guineas (\$7500) has been refused for a few of the very choicest, while 50 to 80 guineas (\$2500 to \$4000) is the ordinary price of those for farm and heavy work alone.

The Percheron and Norman in America a Stud Book was published in 1877, by Mr. J. H. Sanders of Chicago, Illinois. A revised edition followed the next year of 212 large octavo pages, handsomely got up, with numerous fine engravings. The object of this Stud Book is to preserve an accurate record of the males and females imported from France and their full blood descendants, so that the public may not be imposed upon hereafter by unprincipled dealers palming off their inferior grades for full blood.

The Percheron horse is undoubtedly the most symmetrical and powerful for his size, and possesses the finest action and greatest endurance of all the large breeds in Europe. His general type is also the most ancient of any of which we have record or tradition, and this is the principal reason why he is more respected than others in transmitting his superior qualities to his offspring.

Head clean, bony, and small for the size of the head; ears short, mobile, erect, and fine-pointed; eyes bright, clear, large, and prominent; forehead broad, nostrils large, open, and bright red within; muzzle wide; chin fine; teeth white, teeth sound and even.

gravelly shagging out from the crown of the head in the full forehead.

Legs flat and wide, standing square and firm, and well under the body, with part, clean lines, and extra large strong joints, corolla and tendons; hoofs foreign hocks and knees down; pasterns upright; fetlocks thick; hoofs full size, solid, open, strong, and well set up at the heels.

Action bold, square, free and easy, neither overreaching nor interfering, the walk four to five miles per hour, the trot six to eight, on a dry and moderately level road, but capable of being pushed much faster on the latter gait when required.

Temper kind; disposition docile, but energetic and vigorous; hardy, enduring and long-lived; precocious; able to be put to light work at eighteen to twenty-four months old; possessing immense power for his size; never tiring or refusing to draw at a dead pull; stylish, elegant, and attractive in appearance; easy, elastic, and graceful in motion.

No tendency to disease of any sort, and especially free from diseases of the legs and feet, such as spavin, splint, ring-bone, grease, and founder.

With rather less size than the horse, the points and qualities of the mare should be essentially the same, with the exception of possessing a finer head, mane, and tail, and a considerably thinner neck.

When in foal, able to work moderately in winter in a few days of giving milk, and a short time after, able to resume her work.

A careful nurse, and good milkster. Of the Normans, one of the best descriptions I have met of them by a writer who was given by a celebrated writer on horses, the late Mr. Appleby, of England, while travelling in France about the year 1830.

Tradition asserts that the first great improvement in refining the large horses of France was made by Barb stallions captured from the Moors. In 1731 they crossed the Pyrenees from Spain to France with a countless cavalry host, led by the fiery Abd-el-Rahman.

The following year they advanced to the broad plains between Tours and Poitiers. Here they were met by the sturdy Charles Martel, well surnamed the Hammer, at the head of his French horse, which being so much heavier than those of the Moors, he was able to ride down the latter in repeated charges, and thus completely overwhelmed them.

Some contend that horses of so great size and such harmonious proportions could not be produced by the crossing of the Arabian and the Barb. But these Moorish Barbs were doubtless a somewhat stouter and heavier race than the Arabs. They probably bore a strong resemblance to the portrait of the famous Barb that appeared after years of service in Earl Godolphin's stud at Cog Magog Hill, about four miles from the metropolis, and which probably a type of many horses that had been imported in his time from Northern Gaul into Italy as better able to perform the harder and heavier work of the Romans than any of their own native and lighter breeds:

Argutissime caput, brevis alvus, obsequae terga; Luxuriantia toris animosus pectus... Dena julis, et dextra tacta recumbit in armo; Ad duplex agitur per lumbos spina; cavatque; Tellurem, et solido graviter sonat ungula curvam; This may be freely translated: Fine in the head, and lofty in the crest; Short in back, and broad and deep the breast; Strong in body, with thick flowing mane; Tossed to the wind his shoulder right to gain; A double spine, and solid hoofs that spin; And powerful beat the earth at every turn.
