An important conference between representatives of the governments of Newfoundland and Canada has just been brought to a close in the city of Halifax. The primary object of the conference was to settle and re-adjust on a permanent basis, certain long-standing matters in dispute between the two countries. It is, however, generally supposed that out of it, and as a matter of more important result than the settlement of certain fisheries matters, may come the entrance of Newfoundland into the Canadian dominion, and the final consolidation of all the provinces of British North America. Whichever option the people of the province may eventually exercise, the ability of taking Newfoundland into the Dominion, all will, we feel assured, admit that there ought not to be any war of tactics between the two countries. A year ago there was a sort of commercial and industrial war between us, one country doing that which would most cripple and injure the trade of the other. In this quarrel there seems little doubt but that Newfoundland was wholly in the wrong. Over one hundred acres have been planted in the township of Annapolis. One company owns 25 acres, and another 25 acres, and as high as twelve acres. It is possible that there is little labor after the first year, and that the yield is immense, one hundred barrels to the acre being only a moderate return.
