THOMAS MAY & Co., have commenced an action against a Toronto retailer for reporting them as about to liquidate.

THE Montreal and Ottawa railway is to be extended from Rigaud, its present terminus, to Hawkesbury, about sixteen miles. The work is to be completed this season.

INFLUENTIAL delegates from the Mennonite settlement in Kansas are en route to the Northwest with a view to the location of several large colonies of their countrymen there.

A FIRE took place at Ottawa on the 23rd at a building containing Mr. Murphy's boot and shoe store, and a grocery store occupied by Mr. Wall. The stocks in both places were badly damaged.

THE Lake of the Woods Milling Co. has decided to erect a new mill at Portage la Prairie which is to be one of the finest mills on the continent. It will have a capacity of about 600 barrels per day.

The roadways of this city are up in so many places that one needs a chart to navigate a carriage very far without being stopped. The storekeepers suffer heavily by these interminable interference with traffic.

Mr. Dyke, the Emigration agent of Canada at Liverpool, has written to the Department of Agriculture strongly urging the necessity of eggs being better packed, and no butter being sent unless of a good quality.

Poor's Manual for the past year estimates the gross earnings of the railroads of the United States for 1890 at \$1,080,000,000; which shows that the annual cost of rail transportation to each inhabitant of the country averages about \$18.

A DISEASE said to be hog cholera has broken out in these animals at Toronto. Dr. Allen, health inspector, severely condemns the practice of feeding swine on offal as dangerous, and the cause of much of sickness peculiar to animals.

Two small fires occurred at Peterboro on 23rd and 24th by one the grocery stock of Mr. G. W. Hall was damaged and by the other a frame house owned by Mr. Guerin was destroyed as well as the tenant's furniture. No insurance on the house.

In the twenty-two years ended with 1890 the fire insurance companies doing business in Canada received 112.6 millions of dollars in premiums and paid 77.6 millions in losses. Their total income in the same field in the same period was 115.1 millions and their total disbursements 1098 millions.

J. BERT. POLLEY, grocer, of St. Stephen, has assigned. He started with one Morris in the spring of last year. A few weeks later they dissolved and Morris continued alone. In the fall Polley had bought him out, but he had but little experience and still less capital, and with such keen competition as he had to face it was never likely that he would prove a success.

The failure of A. D. Cameron, general storokeeper of Bridgetown, N.S., seems to have been the result of dry rot. He started business in 1879 and seems to have run behind gradually ever since. His assets are nearly all in book debts and notes, but his liabilities are small and the creditors should suffer but little loss, although his books have been so poorly kept that it will be some time before they find out exactly how he stands.

upon the Premier on the 26th. The delegation urged on Mr. Abbott the necessity of having certain improvements, of which the estimated cost is \$80,000, made in the harbour of Three Rivers. Premier Abbott assured the deputation that its representations would receive the careful attention of the Government.

The trouble with Martin Simpson, fancy goods dealer of Berlin, seems to have been that he was inclined to launch out more heavily than his means would warrant. This is the only explanation that can be given of his assignment. His liabilities are \$3,700 and his assets are nominally worth \$5,000, but it is doubtful if a forced realization would bring in one-third of their supposed value.

A. B. Canning, fancy goods dealer, of North Bay, has assigned. He is offering a settlement to his creditors at fifty cents in the dollar which will in all probability be accepted. He started there in April 1890; but unfortunately his stand was a very poor one, and, as his creditors seem to have looked upon him from the start as not altogether a reliable risk, his ultimate success was always a doubtful factor.

REFORTS of buildings collapsing came from all quarters. By one such terrible disaster at New York 65 persons were killed. At Toronto an unfinished house fell and carried with it the wall of an adjoining one. At Quebec on the 24th the huge tower or chimney in the Seminary yard for electric light and heating purposes came down with a crash. The tower was 130 feet high, within ten feet of completion, and there are only about ten feet





now left standing. Damage about \$8,000. Building inspectors seem needed everywhere to prevent the criminal negligence or ignorance of architects and builders.

One very important cause of deterioration in boilers is due to their becoming too small to do the work without forcing, so that the pulsations of the engine cause a well marked succession of shocks on the boiler, which result in the weakening of the material. By placing one's hand on the head or shell of the boiler, the vibrations of the metal can be felt similar to the rising and falling of a man's chest while breathing.

John Goodmurrhy, general storekeeper, of Gore Bay, has succeeded in effecting a settlement with his creditors on the basis of 75 cents in the dollar, but only after considerable wrangling. He is shoemaker by trade and has been in the general store business some eleven years. It is said he had \$3,000 in cash in his pocket when he met his creditors, and that, in spite of his arguments, they were reluctant to see why they could not be paid in full.

A RECUTE for an application for removing old paint and varnish from woodwork is given in the Bayerische Gewerbezeitung. Two parts of ammonia are shaken up with one part of spirits of turpentine, forming a permanent emulsion, which is applied to the paint to be removed. In a few minutes the paint will be softened, so that it can be scraped or rubbed away. This application is said to have been successful in removing old paint which had resisted the action of strong lye.

The Post-office Department has been officially informed by post-office authorities in London of the determination to send a weekly mail to Canada by the direct Canadian boats, and it is likely that a similar arrangement will be made by the Dominion authorities with the Allans for the despatch of a weekly mail by their line to Liverpool. No contract will be entered into, the rate paid being according to weight, 50 cents per pound. This arrangement will not enable the department to reduce the rates on newspapers mailed direct from the office of publication to subscribers in Great Britain.

Next he moved to Braeford where he stayed six or eight months, and then he moved to Arthur. In none of these places does he seem to have been a success, and finally we hear of his assignment. As to his liabilities, no figures are yet obtainable, but they are estimated in the vicinity of \$5,000.

Dame Marie Belanger and T. David, man and wife, general storekeepers, of St. Vincent de Paul, have both assigned. David himself failed in the Townships, but he was started again in his wife's name, by his brothers, in order to give him another chance. The chance did not eventuate. The business was only a small and trifling one, and never likely to be a success. For a time he ran along all right, and then he commenced to run behind until now their combined liabilities may be placed at \$2,500.

JACOB SCHBAR & Co., who started the "Bassinet" on St. Lawrence Main Street last April in order to sell white wear and underclothing, have assigned. He is the father of J. M. and F. J. Scheak, and was supposed to bring a capital of \$2,000 with him when he left Hamilton for this city, as well as to have the support of his two sons. Still his stand was on the wrong side of the street, and it is doubtful whether, in any case, a purely white wear business can be a success in this city. As yet the record is against them, and Jacob Scheak has proved no exception to the general rule. His stock has been sold by auction and brought 42 cents in the dollar, cash.

Toronto has a scandal all to itself in its harbor works. The Mail has been investigating this affair with the result of discovering that not only have the specifications been ignored, but the business of inspection has been a mere farce, and a costly staff is maintained who, it declares, measure quantities through a looking glass, charge for meals during months of absence, and generally have a good time at the public expense. It is needless to say that this is another case of political influence overriding public interests.

BUSTIN & JOHNSON, furniture dealers, of Moncton, N.B., have assigned with liabilities of \$4,700. Of these \$1,500 are preferred, and, as their assets are only valued at \$2,800, it is easy to predict that the dividend paid by the estate will be a small one. Bustin was a clerk, and was supposed to have the experience, while Johnson was a sailor and supplied only a capital of \$2,000. The business was small from the start and never increased. The firm lived simply upon the capital Johnson put in, and, when that was expended, the end was not far off.

J. F. Mowar, mens' furnishings and boots and shoes, of Regina, N.W.T., has assigned. He claimed \$1,000 capital when he started. He was burnt out in March 1890 and then secured a settlement from his creditors at 40 cents in the dollar. was to be paid 10 cents in cash and the balance in 4, 7 and 10 months, unsecured and without interest. This kept his nose down to the grindstone, and, last May, he obtained an extension of 18 months, payable quarterly and without interest. This he has not been able to meet, although he claims a nominal surplus, and the result is that he has to make an assignment.

A CHEESE export says: One of the most noticeable traits in the character of the Yankee cheese salesman is that he lets his cheese go every time at the best offer he can get, and it seems to me, upon the whole, he does considerably better than Canadians who hold: he avoids shrinkage, deterioration in quality, his patrons get, their money quickly and regularly, which is a considerable benefit to them, and above all he avoids the risk of a falling market. This applies equally to wheat, the best policy is to sell, not to store.

The returns of the recent census just submitted to Parliament show a population in the Dominion of 4,823,344, an increase of 498,534, or 11.52 per cent during the decade.

In our issue of the 7th ulto we stated that C. W. Brownell, dry goods merchant, of Cornwall, had put his affairs in the hands of his creditors. He w s then about to attempt a settlement at 50 cents in the dollar; but this has apparently fallen through as he has just made an assignment with liabilities of \$13,330. His assets are estimated at \$12,000.

THE Brantford Furniture Company, which has just assigned, was originally started by Louis F. Heyd, a barrister, in 1888. In 1890 a stock company was formed with a capital of \$25,000 in 500 \$50 shares, to buy out the older concern. In this company Louis F. Hoyd held 496 shares out of the 500, so that it was practically his own business still. Mr. Heyd is undoubtedly a very clever man; but he was already interested in every local venture going. He is described as careless in money matters, and, since most of his ventures required very careful nursing to put them on a paying basis, it is little wonder that one of them has fallen through.

### THE SPANISH WEST INDIAN TRADE.

The movement made by the United States to shut out Canada from the trade of the Spanish West Indies is one of those aggressive steps, which, like other forms of ambition, will probably o'erleap itself and fall on the other side. America seems bent upon displaying the hugest system of national selfishness, the most colossal development of trade monopoly, ever seen on earth.

The policy is avowed to be, the grasping of the entire trade of entire sections of the world, so that certain nations, or their dependencies, shall have but one customer for all they export, and that customer shall buy all they import, that one customer to be the United States. We have in the history of trade not a few records of actions inspired by the same spirit. Indeed mercantile enterprise in past times was ever reaching after monopolies, and jealousy has dictated most of the treaties affecting international trade. The policy of isolation and monopoly of certain markets, gave rise to the larger part of the conflicts which trace their story on the pages of trade history in the last two centuries by a line of blood. The mercantile policy of the U.S. seems to have been modelled on the navigation law of 1651. It is identical with that which brought about such complications and disputes between the maritime powers of Europe that the only possible solution of these difficulties was appeal to brnte force, appeals which stripped several of the nations that were most bent on this policy, of their possessions and prestige. In one respect the U.S. stands in a better position to carry on the isolating system than that ever occupied by another country. Its productions and its needs are so varied, so extensive, that in competition with any other nation as either a buyer or seller of foreign goods, it has enormous natural and acquired advantages. pushing its policy of trade monopoly, it can offer to other countries what no competitor can offer, for there is nothing grown or made by man, or needed by him, which the States cannot supply, or purchase freely. But while we see the strength of the vantage ground occupied by the U.S., in this respect, we are not thereby to be driven out of the field of competition, either by its crafty diplomacy, or its legitimate commercial enterprise. With the Spanish West Indies we do a trade of about 3 millions yearly, the main part of which business is enjoyed by Nova. Scotia. The U. S., has made a move to seize this by a Treaty which aims at excluding us from those regions. tion is an exceedingly grave one for Canada. It would have been the great topic of public interest but for the miserable scandals that have provided lovers thereof with a prolonged diet of carrion, the charm of which has diverted attention from the serious peril to one of our important branches of trade. By the terms of the new treaty between Spain and the United States, the latter will admit sugars, molasses, coffees, tea, skins, and hides into the United States free of duty, and on and after September 1st, Cuba and Porto Rico will admit a

long list of the products and manufactures of the United States free or at a low rate of duty. this in detail on a later page. These articles include everything that is saleable in a tropical market. This treaty would, if carried out to the letter, go far to exclude our staple exports of fish, lumber and potatoes, which constitute a very large trade done by Nova Scotia with the Spanish West Indies. In the Cornwallis valley are 60,000 bushels of potatoes being raised for those markets. There is, however, a treaty in force between Great Britain and Spain which, we believe, will be regarded by the home government as fully equal to the need of Canada for protection against the exclusive action of the U.S. That treaty engages Spain to give England and her colonies.

"Most favored nation treatment in all that concerns "commerce, navigation and consular rights and pri-"vileges in Spain, and in the Spanish colonies and "foreign possessions, co-extensive in amount of bene-"fit with that accorded to France and Germany under "the treaties of the 6th February, 1882, and the 12th "July, 1883." This treaty was negotiated at Madrid on April 26th, 1886, and was to remain in force until June 30th, 1892, and longer, unless one of the high contracting parties should give to the other twelve months notice of its discontinuance. What then are the conditions of those treaties? The Franco-Spanish one binds each party; "to accord to the other, every "favor, all privileges or reductions in the import and "export tariff of duties upon articles, whether men"tioned or not in the present treaty, which either has
"granted or may hereafter grant to a third power. The
"high contracting parties further engage not to estab-"lish the one against the other any import or export "duty or prohibition which shall or shall not at the "same time be applicable to all other nations." The ninth article of the German Spanish treaty declares that "Each of the two contracting parties binds itself "to grant to the other, in the import or export of "goods, whether specified or not in the present treaty "unconditionally, every favor, privilege or reduction in import or export duties which one of them has ex-"tended or shall hereafter extend to a third power." The same treaty likewise declares that "With regard to the amount of the import and export duties each "of the high contracting parties binds itself to let the other share in every favor, privilege, and reduction in the tariffs which either of them has extended to any other power. "Likewise should any future advantage or exemption "be granted by one of the contracting parties to a "third power it shall immediately, and uncondition- "ally be extended to the other."

There seems in such language no loophole for escape from this, that Spain by treaty in 1886 is pledged to give us "most favoured nation" treatment, such as she accords by other treaties to France and Germany,

which treatment ensures to us the same tariff privileges as have been accorded to the United States. A technical difficulty has been raised, that we do not receive certain articles from the Spanish West Indies on as easy terms as they enter the States, our sugar standard differs, and molasses is not free. But this seems an untenable interpretation of the treaty, in fact, is not in it at all, if the document is to be read and taken to mean only what it says. The Board of Trade, Halifax, has already passed a series of emphatic resolutions setting forth the facts and urgency of this matter, and calling upon the Government to make prompt representation to the Imperial government and invite their good offices in placing our trade with these islands on a satisfactory basis whereby our products may be admitted on as favorable terms as similar products from the United States.

One thing is clear, we cannot afford to see our trade cut away branch by branch by the diplomatic craft of a rival nation. Although in this instance the blow is aimed at one Province, the whole Dominion should at once, by its Boards of Trade, and through its representatives in Parliament, urge upon the Government, immediate, decided, and emphatic action in order not only to ward off this danger, but to bring our entire relations with the States and other countries under such conditions as will ensure Canada against attempts to isolate us, and will guarantee our traders a fair field for their enterprise in the world's markets. We are satisfied, however, that England will not suffer one of her treaties to be practically abrogated by the astuteness of a rival power, as her treaty with Spain will be if the U.S. is allowed to control the tariff of the West India possessions, for the loss of her prestige by such supineness would be disastrous. Nor can Spain allow her solemn pledges to be dissolved without endangering not her trade only, but her very possession of Cuba, which is openly threatened to be brought under the American flag.

### THE FAILURE OF THE RYE CROP.

The official ukase forbidding the export of rye from Russia on account of the failure of the harvest has less significance for Canada than for those countries where it forms the staple food product of the poorer classes. Still for the past two years we have been steadily increasing our imports of this cereal, and in the calendar year, just past, Canada figures as the fifth largest customer for American rye; the statistics standing as follows:—

Naturally, the unexpected elimination of so large an exporter as Russia has notably increased the demand for American rye, and prices have advanced commensurately. In fact, this year, the cereal which ordinarily returns to the farmer the least profit of any, promises to be one of the most remunerative of all.

Whether the high price of rye will diminish the volume of our imports remains to be seen. It is probable that it will. In the distillation of the so-called rye whiskey in this country it is now largely superseded by corn, and this substitution is more likely to be increased than diminished in the future. During the year 1890 there were used in this country for the distillation of 5,091,475 gallons of proof spirit 66,790,-

421 lbs. of corn, 4,290,312 lbs. of malt, 1,197,224 lbs. of oats, barley and wheat, and only 13,404,186 lbs. of rye. This year, with the growing use of rice and glucose, the proportion of rye can be still further reduced, and thus any increase in price will be offset by the reduction in the volume of consumption.

Canada will then be but little affected by the serious falling off in the Russian rye crops; but it is far otherwise with large consumers like Germany. Last year the yield of the European rye producing countries was as follows:—

From these figures it can be seen that Russia, produced 54 per cent of the entire crop of Europe, and that she produced over three times as much as her largest competitor Germany. Under these circumstances she was naturally also the largest exporter, and her sudden obliteration from the field of supply has therefore seriously affected those countries who have hitherto availed themselves of her surplus. This year Germany would require to import under normal conditions 28,800,000 bushels, Holland and Italy about eight millions each, Norway and Sweden about twelve millions and Belgium probably two and a half millions. This makes an aggregate of 59,300,000 bushels. Now the maximum rye crop of the United States has never exceeded 28,640,000 bushels, and will certainly fall under that figure this year. Hence to supply the deficiency in the Russian crops by imports from this continent is clearly out of the question.

No doubt there is abundance of wheat and corn. But wheat has always been considered too dear a food product for the great mass of continental peoples, and to corn there is a strong and deep rooted dislike. In most European nations its use has been confined almost entirely to the feeding of cattle. But this year it is to be hoped that stern necessity will compel its use for human consumption also. As a food product it is cheaper and just as nutritious as rye, and as soon as the unreasoning prejudice against its use can be eliminated, it will doubtless be readily accepted in its place. If it is, it seems to ensure an increased demand for American food products and a corresponding expansion in the national wealth. In any such expansion Canada must naturally share. Our geographical position and physical resemblance to the greater proportion of the cereal producing states of our great neighbor, involve a similarity in agricultural conditions, and hence in speaking of crop prospects and prices we can fairly use the word America in its broadest sense.

### THE PREMIER ON THE CATTLE TRADE.

A statement by the Hon. Mr. Abbott in the Senate on the 24th inst., is probably the most important announcement in regard to the cattle trade of Canada ever made affecting this business. This trade was declared by the Premier to have reached such proportions that it is one of the most important branches of the export business that we have. Not only so, but it has possibilities of being developed as the basis of manufactures to such great proportions as will render it one of the largest export industries of the country. In regard to the question of space allotted to animals

on board ship, the Government contemplates making special rules and regulations respecting it, by which the space to be occupied by the cattle will be regulated and by which rules will be made with reference to all contingencies which arise upon an ocean voyage in carrying cattle, and also, permanent arrangements for the proper ventilation of the spaces in which the cattle are placed, when from any cause those spaces are shut from the outer air, either temporarily or the whole voyage, as may be the case when they are placed below decks. The vessels carrying cattle will be inspected before sailing, and each case treated according to its circumstances, no hard and fast rule being laid down as to space, feeding arrangements, and ventilation. As the Government is working out the details of its Bill with the assistance of those most experienced in in the trade, no difficulties are anticipated in providing for their interests, which if served fully, will ensure humane treatment of the animals, and their attendants, as it is important for the trade that cattle be kept as healthy and in as good a condition as possible on the voyage. But, while the proposed legislation so far will be helpful, it merely enables an existing trade to be carried on more favorably. The new feature in the cattle trade bill relates to the passage of American cattle across our territory en route to Europe, and the licensing of a new business in slaughtering such cattle and the manufacture of their products on our soil. This transit requires that there shall be at some intermediate point within our own limits a quarantine yard or place where cattle are taken out of the cars and rested for a certain number of hours and watered and given exercise and air to enable them to be carried across the country with safety. It has been suggested that cattle might just as well, without any additional danger, be slaughtered at those places where they are taken out for rest or water, and a suggestion has been made by a company represented to have considerable capital, who are disposed to carry on the slaughter of cattle and the manufacture of their products on a large scale, to bring the animals to a point in the country which shall be fixed by the Government, and when taken out there to be permitted to slaughter them and manufacture them under rules and regulations which are to be determined upon by the Government of Canada. The permission to do that has not yet been finally accorded. The Premier, however announced that the proposed rules and regulations for that purpose have been submitted to the British Privy council and are perfectly satisfactory to them. The probability, therefore, is that with the precautions which are suggested, and which the Government will exact, and under rules and regulations which the Government shall fix, the manufactured of canned meats and other kinds of meat, and of the various articles which are manufactured from the refuse and offal from the cattle so slaughtered, will be permitted at some point and perhaps more than one point in this country. It is the opinion of those familiar with the trade that this proposal will not involve so much danger really to the country of infection to our cattle as the practice which has been going on with the entire approbation of the Imperial Privy council for the last 12 years. During that period our railways have been allowed to carry cattle from the American frontier on the one side to the American frontier at the other side; that is to say, from the Detroit river to the Niagara river across that section of our country. The precautions, which were to be taken in order to be able to make that tran-

sit in safety, were very numerous and very carefully considered and they were adopted with the entire consent of the Imperial authorities. The frank declaration by the Premier in regard to the cattle exporters having nothing to fear from the Government, but otherwise, that their interests were being anxiously watched over, has been received with much satisfaction. Now that the opportunity has been, or shortly will be provided for that vast industry being carried on in Canada which has enriched Chicago and other western cities, we have the liveliest hopes of its proving of enormous service to this Dominion. The Premier, who is usually most cautious in his statements, and not given to prophesy, said that this new enterprise, "will prove a source of considerable profit to our country, inasmuch as the people who are employed in the various manufactures, which are more numerous than hon. gentlemen may suppose, from cattle and their offal will be numerous, and a considerable amount of money will be expended to the benefit of the people at large.'

### THE BANK STATEMENT.

The official statement of the banks for 31st July is made out on the new form prescribed by the recent "Act respecting banks and banking." The change renders comparisons with former dates somewhat difficult, and in some instances very uncertain. We doubt whether the game is worth the candle. The variations do not furnish more enlightenment as to the business done, and the position of the banks than the old form. In several instances the change closes up a view into the working of the banks, and those new ones which are opened are merely the old aspect divided by an unmeaning fence, or dividing line. The distinction is abolished between government deposits on demand and on time. Also between loans and deposits between the banks secured and unsecured. These are improvements, as such distinctions have no public interest. We are supplied with a column showing, "Balances due to other banks in daily exchanges," which is an utterly superfluous and unmeaning item, its total for all the Ontario banks is only \$175,000 and for those of Such evanescent figures are not Quebec \$303,000. worth the cost of printing. Had we been given a total of bank exchanges for the month, the item might have formed a very interesting and instructive record. But to tell us what the mere exchange balances were on the last day of the month, is of no interest and no value. The failure to distinguish between Foreign balances as a whole and those owing by, or to U.S. banks or agencies, is a weak spot in the new form. That return would have had significance every month, while that of exchange balances has no more than would be a statement of the condition of the bank's inkpots. The separation of "Call Loans on Bonds and Stocks" is a well advised change, so also is that of, "Canadian, British and other railway securities." But it is much to be regretted, and ought to be remedied as soon as possible, that information as to loans to Municipal Corporations is now excluded from the returns. Just when special warnings have been given by prominent bankers against the extension of these loans, it is most unfortunate that information as to their extent should no longer be published. The column giving maximum circulation any time during the month is merely curious, and the space occupied might with infinite aduantage have been devoted to more instructive matter. The statement gives the various amounts paid by the

banks towards the circulation redemption fund. The banks with head offices in Toronto contributed \$279,-311, those in this City \$412,266, the Nova Scotia banks \$98,198, New Brunswick \$18,169, and others \$34,960, a total of \$842,904. A further call of 2½ per cent on amount of circulation will be payable on or before 15th July, 1892. The leading differences between June and July are, circulation reduced \$800,000, deposits increased one million, foreign, that is U.S. balances due to our banks increased \$1,500,000, and English ones \$800,000, and current loans increased \$6,400,000. The prospects point to there being a full supply of money. The English markets are easier, trade there is good, and the Even the cloud over harvest better than for years. Argentine finance shows signs of dispersion, so that the strain so acutely felt will be relaxed and probably there will soon commence a flow of gold to pay this The probabilities are continent for its food exports. that money will be seeking investments for some time at the lowest rates. This will inevitably stimulate speculation, and tend to the growth of new enterprises to absorb the capital that is out of employment. Poverty is a very safe harbour for bankers, it is when their sails are full, and the waves temptingly buoyant, that they are drawn out from safe anchorage. As funds begin to flow in, they need at such a time as tdis, take especial care that they are only are allowed to flow out into safe and controllable channels. We subjoin the usual comparative table.

### THE FUTURE OF MONEY.

At present all indications point to a continuance of the present easy money market and to an absence of the usual stringency during August and September arising from the demand from the interior of this continent in order to move the crops. It is true that one reason for this unexpected ease is the fact that trade and industry, both in the United States and this Dominion, are unusually quiet at the moment, and that the speculative fever is conspicuous by its absence. The demand, too, for money for crop purposes will not rise to its maximum for two or three weeks to come: but we must not forget that the mere abundance of the harvest may at any moment stimulate speculation not only in cereals but in general trade. In that case would the present volume of circulation suffice to supply commercial needs, or would it be necessary to call on Europe for gold and thus involve a greater or less degree of stringency in the money market? And if so to what extent?

Leaving to one side the demand from Germany, which is believed to be purely a temporary one, the two countries likely to draw gold from England this fall are the United States and Bussia. A few weeks ago it was predicted that the demand from Russia would be large; but it is already apparent that it will now be very much less than was anticipated. Russian government is compelled to maintain large balances at its credit in the financial centres of western Europe; partly to meet the maturing interest on its various loans, and partly for political purposes. Had the harvest been a good one the Russian minister of finance could have practically controlled the money market as, secure in the possession of wealth at home, he could have manipulated his withdrawals as he chose. But it now seems certain that the harvest will be a poor one, that Russia will have but little grain to export, and consequently that Mr. Vischnegradsky l

will be timorous of disturbing his balances lest they should prove insufficient to meet any sudden demand.

This leaves the United States as the sole power likely to withdraw gold from Europe, and, since the failure of the Russian harvest will concentrate the demand for wheat almost exclusively on this continent, the question of the extent of the American demand becomes of paramount importance, although the heavy decrease in the price of raw cotton will nearly, if not quite, offset the increase in value of the wheat to be exported. What then will be the position of the great European banks if such a demand sets in?

Apparently they will be unusually well fitted to supply it. Since the end of April they have increased their stocks of gold by \$65,000,000. It follows then that the requirements of America could be filled to this extent and still leave the three great banks in the same position as they were in five months ago; and it is hardly likely that anything like that sum will be required, since this would mean an increase within that period in the American currency of \$110,000,000. Taking, however, the extreme view, and allowing that from sixty to sixty-five millions of gold will be required for this continent, it looks as if western Europe could supply it without difficulty. The Bank of France is ready to part with fifty millions, and if necessary with ten millions more. This would leave only five to fifteen millions to be provided by the Bank of England and the Imperial Bank of Germany which they could easily spare, even if Russia should require ten or fifteen millions also. The assumption then is that, as the Russian harvest is poor, and consequently the demand for gold from that country cannot become inconveniently large, there is a certainty of easy money this fall no matter how heavy the demand from the United States may be.

### THE TAP ROOT OF CORRUPTION.

The Government has shown its wisdom in adopting two suggestions made in regard to the Civil Service by this journal. We urged that the hours of the Ottawa staff should be conformed to those customary in business firms; this reform has been effected. We also intimated that a thorough enquiry should be instituted into the workings of the Civil Service Act, for the purpose of eliciting practical suggestions for the reorganization of the service. To effect this a Royal Commission is to be appointed, and it is stated, that the oversignt and the general management of the Civil Service staff will be entrusted to a permanent official, selected because of his experience in the control of large bodies of officials. That is carrying out our idea, that the business of the government offices requires to be organized in the same manner as the business of large firms. To use a phrase more graphic than classical, "business is business, and politics is politics." The mixture of these makes bad business, and poor politics, as recent revelations prove. There has been a timely, although most revolting accusation made in the House of Commons, that a certain M.P. had corruptly bartered his influence for a money consideration to secure appointments for constitutents. true or not in the case alluded to, such venal bargaining is far too common for the House of Commons to be either much surprised or shocked at such a charge. One Member who has been exceedingly, conspicuously zealous in his examination of witnesses in the Tarte-McGreevy Committee, whose moral vehemence has led

him into making several unseemly demonstrations, displayed not long ago, very practically, his lofty ideas on public patronage. An appointment was vacant requiring for its occupant a special form of scientific education. A candidate whose exceptionally high qualifications were fully known to the M.P. in question, applied to him to ask his influence with the authorities in whose gift was this position. He was at once asked "What have you done for the party?" Now the applicant was known to have been a hard student, one too with a brilliant record at his College, he had never had either the time or taste for doing anything for any "party," his whole interest was in science. Yet because he had never done something for the "party" to which this M.P. belongs, that candidate for a public, scientific appointment, was plainly told by him that all his other qualifications were of no value! How in the teeth of a fact like that can the distribution of public patronage be properly entrusted to political zealots, to whom the interests of "party" are supreme? How can it be reasonably expected that officers of the Civil Service should be faithful servants of the country, when they know they were not appointed for their fitness, but solely because they or their friends had done "something for the party?" Take each one of the graver scandals that have shocked the country and it will be found on examination that the whole mischief arose from the necessity, according to the present system, of those seeking to be favored by government patronage, either having done, or engaging to do "something for the party." Unless then that tap root of corruption is killed it is useless to speak of reforming the Civil Service, or the administration of the spending Departments of Government. The Royal Commission should, and easily could accumulate evidence that would compel the country to abolish the system of distributing offices, or the granting of contracts, through party agents, either in, or outside the House of Commons. Its work should be to suggest the best mode of re-organizing public business on a business basis, and making party interests an unrecognised factor in all public affairs of a business character. It is understood that the whole Cabinet passes upon the contracts to be let by any one of the Departments. There is too much reason to fear that although the contracts are formally submitted by each Minister to his colleagues in Council that the ordeal is a mere form. We are disposed to think that all such matters involving expenditures over a certain amount, should be submitted to a small special committee, upon which the Opposition should be represented, so that no contract of moment could be given without such independent scrutiny as would go far to protect the country from its funds being made to do "something for the party." Political influence in matters devoid of a political bearing, except those of a corrupt nature, is the tap root of corruption. The Royal Commission must address itself to the formulation of some plan for exterminating this source of evil doing, and evil possibilities, if its labours are to be worth their cost.

### C. P. R. ADJOURNED MEETING.

The adjourned meeting of the shareholders of the Canadian Pacific Railway was held here on the 24th. The shares represented amounted to 329,075, out of a total of 650,000 shares. President W. C. Van Horne occupied the chair. A draftagreement was submitted between the C.P.R. and the Temiscamingue Railway and others by which the 17 miles of that road completed is to be

taken over by the C.P.R. The other 33 miles is to be built by the T. Railway which cedes to the C.P.R. all its lands, buildings, rolling stock, etc., certain specified proportions of subsidies voted by parliament and yet to be received, to be applied in reimbursing the Temiscamingue Company for the cost of the works completed and the remainder towards the construction of works The Canadian Pacific Railway also guarantees vet to be done. to furnish all the money necessary for the completion of the road outside of the government subsidies. The agreement was ratified by a unanimous vote. The chairman reported that arrangements for taking over the Calgary and Edmonton railroad were not completed. The meeting adjourned until the 12th Oct., to consider this matter. A special meeting was then held to obtain authorization to act upon the provisions of the act passed by the Dominion House, to amend the Canadian Pacific Railway Act of 1889, met in session. The act provides that the company, by a two thirds vote of the shareholders present or represented, at a meeting called for the purpose, may from time to time issue consolidated debenture stock for the purposes specified. The stock to be issued can only be used for the purpose either of satisfying or acquiring bonds which the company has issued in aid of the construction and equipment of the branch of its railway, known as the Souris Branch, as well as such additional line or lines as the board of directors may from time to time by resolution declare to be a portion or portions of the Souris branch of the Canada Pacific Railway Company. The issue of the bonds is to be limited to £4000 per mile, and to bear interest not exceeding 4 per cent per annum. Lord Mount Stephen moved that the company be authorized to issue the debentures, the resolution was carried unanimously.

### SUBSIDISED SERVICE TO WEST INDIES.

A motion introduced to the House of Commons for the purpose of censuring the Government because of its policy in providing steamship service for the West Indies elicited an interesting statement from the Finance Minister. To provide such boats as are suitable at a short notice is seldom possible, stocks of such costly articles are not kept on hand, as one speaker seemed to imply, waiting for customers like bales of dry goods. It was urged that a great wrong had been done because the only detect of a certain offer was the tonnage of the steamers, as though the tonnage of a boat was a mere detail, instead of being the main essential feature. The Government fixed 1000 tons as the size needed. As this condition could not at once be met, the nearest to it was accepted temporarily in order to avoid the enterprise collapsing in its initial stage. Nothing could be more discreditable to Canada than for picayune objections to be raised against assistance being given by Parliament to further the expansion of our foreign trade. The development of a country needs a somewhat different policy to that which is required for managing a corner store in a village. It our Members of Parliament cannot rise above that level, they are miserably equipped for the large and grave responsibilities of a legislator. While we are haggling over personalities, and carping about business details, for the mere display of party animosity, the United States is moving heaven and earth to seize markets as a monopoly for its people, in which we might do a very large trade, if we had their breadth of view, and states manlike enterprise. As the Finance Minister said: "Nothing was more apparent to him during his visit to the West Indies than that the advantage which the United States enjoyed over Canada in articles produced by both countries was due to the steady steamship connection between American and West Indian ports." response to an assertion based on no facts, that the subsidising of steamers to the West Indies was to counteract the injury done by the protective policy, Mr. Kenny made an effective reply. He said that trade between Canada and the West Indies had expanded during the past few years, which was a contradiction to the statement of the member for Yarmouth, that the National policy had acted detrimentally to that trade. He gave statistics showing the exports of farm produce from the United States to the West Indies, and pointed to the fact that in all these articles Canada was able to compete with the United States. Canada lacked to further increase its trade with the West Indies was better communication between these points. Since the Government aided the steamship service between the Dominion and the West Indies the trade had materially increased. We

have strongly urged the most energetic steps being taken to push our trade with the whole of the West Indies and southern America, and trust that the Government will not be deterred from pursuing its policy in this direction by criticisms which are a scandal to the House of Commons. In the commerce of these regions we must share, and Canada can well afford to pay well for the needed accommodation until the trade becomes independent of any government assistance.

Woods, ordinary manufactured into doors, frames, windows and shutters, without paint or varnish, and wooden houses, unmounted, without paint varnish. ### NEW PALACE CAR.

The rage for combined splendour and conveniences in palace cars has brought out a new style of vehicle which is the invention of Mr. Harris, and is being run on the C. P. R. The inside of the main body of the car is a magnificent apartment, 32 feet by 9 feet and nearly 10 feet feet clear in the centre, lighted by 10 of the largest windows ever put in a car. Three on each side are bay windows, the middle glass being 38 x 36 inches, while the side lights are of curved glass. The other windows are 44½ x 36 inches. The interior finish of this room is polished mahogany and the lamps and other metal trimmings are of oxydized silver. The porter in transforming this parlor into a sleeping apartment, bends down and turns up a six-foot section of the floor at a right angle with the side of the car. Then, taking hold of a similar trap-door under the former one he opens that up in the opposite direction, so that a small room is formed. Running up each end are two rack bars with a groove in the centre. The porter then inserts a crank in the centre of the front of the open space and, turning it, two berths or boxes are speedily run up into position. The two chairs belonging to that section of the floor are placed in the hole or pocket under the batths and your grippeak follows if designations. the berths, and your gripsack follows if desired, the berths, and your gripsack follows if desired. A trap door fastened up against the bottom of the lower berth is let down, forming a front to the pocket, and the weight of the berth resting on it fastens it so securely that nobody can confiscate your property without raising the berth. The upper berth is then run up a little higher, lids in the under berths are raised so that they support the upper one at each end, and similar lids on the upper berth are raised to form partitions above the berth are raised to form partitions above the sections of the floor. There are numerous novelties in the car, which greatly add to the comforts of travelling. For instance, in the stateroom is a very novel wash bowl. The bowl is of white metal, and when not in use is pushed up and back out of sight, emptying the water at the same time. Another feature is a dial in the observation room, which regis-

ters the number of miles travelled and the rate of speed at which the train is going. In every available space mirrors are inserted, which very materially add to the gorgeousness of the interior. There are over 60 mirrors in the whole car.

According to the Philadelphia papers, two new industries will be introduced in that city within the next few month, the inauguration ot which is a direct result of the McKinley tariff act. One of these will be the manufacture of lace curtains, and the other of linen or flax "velours." It is said that both industries together will give employment to nearly 800 people. The machinery for the former establishment is now being made in England, as it cannot be procured in the States. The manufacture of lace curtains in the U.S is made possible by the advance of the rate of duty from 40 to 60 ad valorem under the new tariff schedules. One of those interested in the enterprise is quoted as saying that the goods will all be made of cotton thread which is all manufactured in the States, with the excep-tion of some of the finer numbers, which will have to be imported, owing to the high price of local labor. It is also stated that the machinery required is very expensive, and the business will be opened on an extensive scale, the amount of money invested being very large. The flax velour goods are to be used for curtains, and the new establishment will amploy 500 or more hands.

### STEEL PIPES.

The Steel Pipe Company, of Kirkaldy, has done something toward showing the advantages possessed by steel over wrought iron pipes. It is stated by Mr. D. J. Russell Duncan, Assoc. M. Inst. C.E., that wrought iron or steel pipes can be produced at a less cost per unit of length than cast iron pipes. A pipe built of steel can be made at a less cost of labor than one of wrought iron, on account of the reduction in the number of plates and rivets, and, therefore, of calking and punching.

Being less liable to corrosion than pipes of wrought or cast iron, the durability of steel is insured. It is stated by one authority that the best precaution is to have the pipes galvanized, then coated with natural asphaltum or with a composition of pitch, tar, petroleum linseed oil and chalk. This solution is heated in a bath to a temperature of 250°, and the pipes immersed till they acquire the same temperature as the composition. The pipes should also be coated as they are laid in the trench. As regards strength, the steel pipe is much superior to glazed stoneware or cast iron, or about 3½ times stronger than the latter Mr. Duncan says: "As steel is on an average about ½ stronger than wrought iron, it is clear that for pipes of equal strength of plate, and allowing that the riveted or welded seams are of equal strength on both, the thickness of mild steel need only be about 0.77 of the thickness of wrought iron." This economy of material can be effected by using openhearth mill steel of the highest possible tensile strength.

MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS.

MONTREAL, THURSDAY EVENING, Aug. 27th, 1891.

The alarmist rumours as to the Manitoba crop which were current last week seem to have died out, Still there seems a lurking belief that some of the roseate telegrams published in the daily papers have been colored in transit, and merchants are slow to receive them in their entirety. About the Ontario crop there seems to be no doubt. Every report brought in by travellers is to the effect that the harvest is a most prosperous one, and as a consequence most of the dry goods houses are sending their men over their routes again. It is felt that retailers have purchased far too sparingly, and that now that the future of the harvest is set at rest they should be ready to buy up to their requirements. In groceries business is at a standstill, temporarily. The rush for sugar has died out and, with it, the demand for other goods. Only a quiet jobbing trade, for immediate requirements, is reported and it is said that certain French houses are cutting indiscriminately in sugars, molasses and rice. This, however, is a matter that will soon right itself providing other houses do not follow their lead. In iron and the heavy metals but little is doing and the tendency is in the direction of lower prices. Tin plates are firm. Fruit is in fair demand, although at low prices. Fish are active and well sold up. Hides unchanged. Leather slightly brisker. Butter and cheese are both strong; but business is checked by buyers and sellers being apart in their views. Coal oil is more active, and crude is strong. Oils are firmer and heavy chemicals are well held.

BUTTER AND CHEESE .- A strong market must still be reported for butter and in spite of high prices some export lots have been secured and shipped. One lot of a thousand packages Western dairy changed hands at 141/@15 cents and there have been renewed enquiries for creamery, In the meantime there is a steady grocery demand at full figures, and as it is believed holders will ease off a fraction in their ideas soon, there is no reason why a brisk overturn should not take place before long. English statistics are all favorable. The imports of butter at Liverpool from 6th to imports of butter at Liverpool from 6th to 12th of August, 1891, were 4,696 packages, and from the 1st October, 1890, to the same date, 103,536 packages, against 155,083 in 1890, a decrease of 50,000 odd. In cheese the situation remains firm, and although shippers are not in a fever to buy, the fact is unmistakeable that the factory men have the whiphand. Some 1500 hoves of Franch country. hand. Some 1800 boxes of French country cheese of varying quality sold in this city at 91 cents, although choice brands brought; 1, more and holders who asked 10 cents at the more and holders who asked 10 cents at the outset were glad enough to come down to these figures. At Belleville 395 boxes white realized 95 cents and 90 white at 9 13-16. Ten cents and 10 1-16 were bid freely for August, September and October makes; but very few sales were made. At Ingersoll 3,660 boxes of first half of August make were offered, and at Woodstock 3,405 boxes, but without sales, as buyers and sellers were apart. Mail sales, as buyers and sellers were apart. Mail advices from London to the 14th inst. say: In sympathy with the cables from the producing centres, sellers of Canadian and American are hardening their prices a little, and not pushing business under 45s@46s, at which prices the sale keeps steady. 

HEAVY CHEMICALS.—Very little can be said of this market. Caustic soda is steady at quotations and brimstone is slightly easier. HIDES AND TALLOW.—There is very little change to chronicle in the hide market. The demand during the week has been perceptibly brisker and stocks are not accumulating. In fact some dealers could have sold more hides had they had them in stock. For buff hides the demand has been especially brisk although heavy, hides have also moved off fairly. IRON AND HARDWARE.—The iron market is sick and duil. Makers prices in England have declined 6d@ls and there is every probability of a further decline. In this market there have been sales of Summerlee at \$21@\$21.50 in small lots. Carnbroe has also sold in ten ton lots at \$19.50, but for a round lot \$19, or even less would be gladly accepted. Canada plates are again weaker. In small lots they sell at \$2.75. For a round lot this price would be considerably shaded. In fact there would be little difficulty in placing an order for 500 boxes at \$2.65. Terne plates continue at \$8, and those of our traders who were victimized by Western men getting information of the customs decision twenty-four hours ahead of them, and buying out all they could get at

old prices, can only bite their thumbs and look pleasant. Tin plates are dearer in England. Very few comparatively are being turned out, owing to labor disputes, and it is becoming evident that the United States have very few of the common sizes in stock. There are stacks there of out sizes and culls, but few ordinary bread and butter lots and there is no prospect of any more reaching there for some time to come. American tin plate has been relegated to the limbo of exploded fads and American buyers are now in the Welsh market for staple plates. As a result the market here is a thought firmer and dearer, and even a round lot of coke could not be secured under our quotations. Wrought from pipe is weaker. We still adhere to 62½ per cent as the discount, but there are rumours, and on responsible authority, that 64 per cent has been accepted in this city. Bar iron is unchanged, Nails rule at any price, according whether the house makes them a leading line or not. But an average basis would be \$2.15 and this is the generally accepted rate. Copper, lead and antimony show no new features.

Charge in leather. In fact the sole feature of the week has been the sale of from 800 to 1000 dozen skins Dongola on private terms, but understood to be well within the range of our quotations. The general demand has been a little brisker, although not much so. Shoemen are now getting near to the bottom of their stock; but they evidently fear no rise in leather values as most of them express their determination to cut all the leather they have in hand before buying any fresh lots. The English market is dull and but little shipping is being done just now. During the season some 80,000 sides of sole have been shipped from this side. This has materially benefitted the market here, but it is doubtful whether it has brought in much profit to the exporters.

Oils, Paints, and Glass.—More is doing in oils this week, as stocks in many lines are down to hard pan owing to the steady demand from Europe. Seal oil is more enquired for
