





R, G. Dun & Co.'s Dally Bulletin says:
The volume of trade at Montreal shows no material increase since a week ago, though in one or two special lines there has been some improvement of demand in a moderate way. Sugars have recovered somewhat from their long continued dulness, and an advance of an eighth of a cent, has been established by refiners, who claim that their figures are still considerably below the New York level. Tens and other staple lines of groceries remain dull. Drygoods orders are reported moderately numerous, but are, as a rule, small in extent, and show that careful buying is being practised. Dealers in raw wool, are not apparently anxious to push sales, in view of the unsatisfactory state of woolen manufacturing interests, and a second cargo of Cape wool, for Montreal account, just arrived in Boston, is likely to go into store in that city. Boot and shoe manufacturers are now making active delivery of spring footwear, on orders booked during fall and winter, but are not large buyers of leather at the moment. Values in this latter line, however, tend to strengthen in sympathy with the general strong tone of the hidd market. Pig fron, bars, etc., still move slowly, but for plates of various kinds there is more enquiry, with considerable stiffening of prices; Canada plates have advanced 20 cents a box, and of certain sizes there is decided scarcity, coke tins and Terne plates are also in limited supply and dearer. Out nails have been reduced 15 cents a keg as a result of the manufacturers' meeting last week.

General business at Toronto is hardly as active at the present time as merchants had anticipated. In some lines there is reported an improvement, while in others the movement is limited. Dealers, however, are hopeful that the turn for the better will come soon. The number of business fallures is smaller than for several weeks, and the prevailing sentiment has improved.
