There was also a rumor on the floor that the French duty on wheat had been removed. The market was simply dead for two or three hours of the session, when the idea seemed to strike the crowd it was best to buy a little wheat, and they all wanted it right away, and betore half of them were satisfied they rain the market from 91½c to 92¼c, and closed it strong at ½2½c to 92¼c for May, and 1.00½c for December. This option has had a range of 2c to day, closing at top price. New York reported 28 loads of No. 2 red winter wheat and ten loads at outposts taken for export to-day. Clearances from the four ports, wheat and thour, 381,000, and for four days, 1,208,305 with shels. We think the long side is the safest, but do not advise buying on such sudden bulges as we had to-day.
