HEAT AT GREATEST COLD
HYDROGEN AND RADIUM

Prof. Curie Makes Another Discovery With the Newly Found Marvel.

London, Aug. 16.—Another discovery of the extraordinary property of radium was communicated last week to the French Physical Society by Prof. Curie. It was only in March last that eminent men of science refused to accept the statement so irreconcilable with scientific experience that radium possesses the property of maintaining a temperature at a point three degrees higher than that of its surroundings. But the fact that, in addition to the marvelous radio-active properties already described, radium has this unique and unprecedented power of the heat has been established beyond the possibility of question. Strenuous efforts have been made to obtain accurate measurements of this heat production and determine the effects of external conditions in promoting and retarding it.

Prof. Curie found that heat emission remains unchanged thru a very wide range of temperature, there being no perceptible variation in the temperature of a summer day, or that of liquid air, but if a long downward stride is taken from the temperature of liquid air to that of liquid hydrogen, radium shows that it is not always unaffected by the external temperature. And here comes the amazing new fact that the change in the rate of heat emission of radium within the comparatively short distance of absolute zero is in exactly the opposite direction to what might be expected in view of the effect of the temperature on the ordinary chemical action for the temperature of liquid hydrogen the heat emission of radium, instead of being reduced, is augmented.

In simple language, the substance which does not change its heat at all temperatures, from that of an ordinary room to that of liquid air, gives out a greater heat when subjected to the greatest cold that scientists have yet reached.

These experiments with liquid hydrogen have led to the curious discovery that freshly prepared salt solution of radium has a comparatively weak power of giving off heat at all temperatures, but the power steadily increases for about a month, when it reaches its maximum activity, which it then maintains apparently indefinitely. These remarkable results have failed to throw any light upon the process whereby radium maintains a constant emission of heat radio-activity.

KNIGHTS OF LABOR ON G.T.P.

District Assembly Passes Several Resolutions of General Interest. District Assembly, Knights of Labor, at their meeting on Saturday night, passed the following resolutions:

Resolved, That this assembly would have been glad to have seen the following rules adopted in the construction of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railroad:

- 1. The whole line to be built by the government and retained as a national highway.
- 2. Any company to have the right to use the same.
- 3. The rates to be fixed by the Railroad Commission.
- 4. The increased value of the land to be taken by taxation for the building and maintenance of the road.

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this assembly that strong efforts should be made by all the labor organizations to induce the Municipal Committee of the legislative assembly at their meeting to be held in October next to insert in their report a clause in favor of local option in taxation.

TO ESCAPE LYCHING.

Many Negroes of the South Seek Refuge in Canada. Ottawa, Aug. 16.—It would appear that the negro of the Southern States is beginning to turn his eyes toward Canada as the land for refuge and settlement, where he can escape the perils which menace him in his present home.

From the Southern portions of the United States negroes are reported to be coming to Canada in increasing numbers, and it may be that some day this country also will have an awkward problem to face.

A few days ago a party of healthy, well-developed negroes arrived at the Canadian Pacific railway station in Montreal. When questioned as to their home, they said they were seeking a home in Canada.

They said that they fear the negroes of the South were being driven North into Canada, where they had been told they would be safe from the terrors of lynch law.

It is said that large numbers of these negroes have found their way to this country during the last two or three months and are sending favorable reports back to the South.

These newcomers are seeking employment in different portions of the Dominion, and many will go to Western Canada, where work and good wages are readily obtainable.

Many Hundred New England Operatives Take Enforced Vacation.

Lawrence, Mass., Aug. 16.—The plant of the Washington cotton mills was shut down for two weeks to-day. The official announcement states that the shut-down is made to give the 6000 operatives a vacation and for repairs. The Pacific mills will shut down next Saturday for two weeks.

Dover, N.H., Aug. 15.—The Cocheo cotton mills held a day for two weeks. The print works connected with the mills will run next week and then suspend for two weeks.

Amesbury, Mass., Aug. 15.—The Hamilton cotton mills were shut down to-day because of the state of the cotton market. Eight hundred hands are employed.

West Warren, Mass., Aug. 15.—The mills nos. 1, 2 and 3 of the Warren Manufacturing Company were shut down to-day for one week, on account of the unfavorable cotton market. Several hundred hands are affected.

Chicopee, Mass., Aug. 15.—The cotton mills of the Chicopee Manufacturing Company have shut down, and will not resume before Aug. 24. About 1500 hands will be idle.

FATAL STABBING AT BUFFALO.

Buffalo, N.Y., Aug. 16.—Peter J. Burke, a brother of Assemblyman Burke, was stabbed and fatally wounded by an Italian at Casco Park Sunday afternoon. Contradictory stories are told regarding the cause of the attack upon Burke, who was nearly 2000 people on the grounds. They seized an Italian who, it was alleged, had wielded the knife, and cries of "Kill him" and "Lynch him" were heard on all sides. He was locked up. Burke's chances for recovery are slim.

A BAD OMEN.

Paris, Aug. 16.—The Antarctic expedition of Dr. Jean Charcot was to have sailed from Havre at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon, but a fatal accident occurred to a temporary postman, who was 2000 people lined the quays to see the expedition move off, amid the booming of cannon and the strains of "Marseillaise." When about a mile out the hawser of the steam tug which was towing the vessel parted, and the striking a sailor named Meignan, killing him instantly. The Francaise halted her colors and returned to her berth.

Pope's Blessing to Ireland.

Rome, Aug. 16.—The Holy See, through M.P., the delegate to the Papal curia, today received the following letter, relative to the audience he had with the Pope: "His Holiness has taken pleasure in expressing his heartfelt wishes for the faithful nation you represent. He is pleased to bless with all his heart yourself, your colleagues and the whole of Ireland."

Embodied \$40,000.

Red Bank, N.J., Aug. 16.—Enoch L. Cowart, cashier of the defunct Navisink National Bank, was arrested today on the charge of embezzling \$40,000 of the bank's funds. Cowart surrendered himself and furnished \$10,000 bail to await the action of the grand jury.

Burned to Death in Gasoline.

Dunkirk, N.Y., Aug. 16.—Two west-bound trains on the Nickel Plate came together in a rear-end collision near Ripley late Saturday afternoon. An unknown man who was stealing a ride was burned to death in gasoline from a wrecked tank car.

FARMERS PAY \$45 A MONTH WITHIN 5 MILES OF GALT

Galt Board of Trade Will Memorialize Governments to Change Policies.

Galt, Aug. 16.—At the last meeting of the Board of Trade, Andrew Elliott brought up the question of the scarcity of farm labor in Ontario.

"The most important question affecting industrial interests in the present generation is the labor question," was a statement made by Mr. Elliott. Mr. Elliott held that the subject was one not only of provincial but national importance, affecting chiefly and primarily the farming community, but ultimately injuring all classes of trade. He came to this that the farmers were now beginning to reduce their crop acreage as creatures of the necessities of the times. The agricultural output would be reduced. The income from agriculture would be lessened, and it was evident that the farmers would be forced to retract and the general business of the country would be lessened. It was plain that such a condition of things would hurt itself, but not until after the injury had been done. The factories would close or reduce the number of operatives, and labor would thus be turged from urban to rural channels and thus would be again the building of trade. But great efforts should be used to avoid this course.

Mr. Elliott, continuing, advocated a change in the methods now in vogue in the Immigration Department. It was the man from rural England and the man from rural Ireland who was wanted not for the west and not for New Ontario, but for Old Ontario where the number of operatives was WITHIN FIVE MILES OF GALT \$45 A MONTH. There was not a farm in Ontario that would afford a wage of \$45 a month. Mr. Elliott, moved, seconded by D. Murray, that the governments at Ottawa and Toronto be memorialized to change the immigration policy so that the rural population of Great Britain be thereby informed as to the desirability of Ontario as a field for farm labor. This was unanimously carried.

BUGGY STRUCK BY TRAIN.

Guelph, Aug. 15.—A man named Clarence McDonald, 60 years of age, postmaster, Shaw Station, C.P.R., met with what may be a fatal accident on crossing the G.T.R. at Gordon-street, when his buggy was struck by the 6 o'clock train. Mr. McDonald was thrown out, his leg broken and his arm and hand injured. He was taken to the General Hospital.

The vessel has been largely influenced by the desire to get all possible benefit from the trip for his little daughter, Lolla, the patient of Dr. Lorenz.

To Meet Canada Line Move.

Lima, Aug. 16.—The International Mercantile Marine Company will establish a Mediterranean service from Boston to Genoa, White Star Line boats for the purpose. The line will also be under the White Star management instead of under the Dominion Line. This act is due to the Cunard Company having established a Mediterranean-Boston service.

Wabash Railway's New Terminal.

Milwaukee, Wis., Aug. 15.—The announcement was made by officials of the Wabash line, who are in the city to-day, that Milwaukee is to be made the terminal of the Wabash Railway, thru a car ferry connection with Seneca Harbor, Mich. Terminal facilities will be installed to cost about \$500,000.

AUTOMATIC SUICIDE.

The Lancet Discusses an English Clergyman's Act.

London, Aug. 16.—The Lancet discusses an interesting problem in medico-legal psychology concerning the recent suicide of a clergyman 34 years of age. The suicide was apparently absolutely accountable. The writer in The Lancet suggests that the act was automatic and not voluntary. It seems that the clergyman had a fall from a bicycle. He got home, changed his clothes, took a revolver from a drawer, loaded it and shot himself. The Lancet concludes that the fall induced a form of cerebral concussion which permitted the sufferer to perform complex and apparently reasoned acts, possibly quite at variance with his usual behavior of which he would have retained no recollection had he recovered from the concussion.

The slight of the revolver, its image impinging on the retina, starts the idea motor, the sequence of which ended in his loading the revolver, placing it at his head and pulling the trigger, the act being automatic and not voluntary even as a sudden impulse, the mind not being in reality conscious.

The question remains why upon finding the pistol he should load it and place it at his own head? In order to answer this, the psychologist asks whether anything came recently within the range of the victim's mental experience to suggest the act. It is then found that earlier in the same week there had been a report in the newspapers of a clergyman shooting himself. The writer in The Lancet is pursued by this man. He had not commented upon the case, but it is not surprising that it fell to his lot upon his notice. He would naturally be impressed, being a clergyman himself.

CONRIED WANTS "PARSIFAL."

Will Give 5,000,000 Marks for Right to Produce It.

Vienna, Aug. 16.—The discussion over Mr. Conried's forthcoming production of "Parsifal" is still rife in musical circles on the continent. Mr. Conried declares that he bases his right to produce the opera in America on the fact that it was first produced in Bayreuth in 1882, whereas the copyright only dates from July 31, 1891, not having that earlier in the same year. The only thing to recognize and appreciate in my private capacity is the objection raised by the Wagner family, whose idealistic aims as regards "Parsifal" do not make money at all. "Parsifal" does not make money at all. It is a work of art, and I desire to do business with "Parsifal." I would be the first to approach them, and hereby declare publicly that I am willing to pay Frau Wagner five million marks if she grants me the right to the production of the opera in North America. For the Wagner family, there is no question of this coming to pass, but I am willing to be taken at my word."

A majority of the accused are young men who are studying Western sciences.

Canadian Patrol in Sight.

Erle, Pa., Aug. 16.—The contemplated case of Capt. Christopher S. Chau against the Canadian government for firing upon the fish tug Silver Spray Wednesday, when the vessel was alleged to have been in Canadian waters, will be dropped. Skipper Chau was advised by Collector of the Port Brown to ascertain the exact location of the time of the trouble before taking the matter to the United States authorities. He has done so, and tonight states that he was over the line. The statement is also made by one of the captains of the fishing fleet that nearly all of the tug was over the boundary, and that the Silver Spray was at least two miles beyond the American waters.

The former provincial treasurer at Sim-fu, who became notorious thru his blood-thirstiness at the time of the massacre there, has accused forty reformers of being traitors. A majority of the accused are young men who are studying Western sciences.


