PLACES RESTRICTIONS ON PARIS AMUSEMENTS

Government Officially Acts on the Matter of Costumes to Be Worn in Theatres.

The under-secretary of state for public instruction and fine arts, in agreement with the directors of the four subsidized theatres in Paris, has decided that until the end of the war the public will not be admitted, whatever the nature of the performance, except in ordinary day dress.

kinemas have decided to close their places of amusement for one day each week. The theatres will close on Fridays, concert-halls on Wednesdays, and kinemas on Tuesdays.

According to American statistics, 1,220 ships, with an aggregate gross tonnage of approximately 5,328,584, have been sunk by belligerent nations during the twenty-seven months of war ended November 1.

THE HUN HYPOCRITE BEMOANS AIR VICTIMS

Would Persuade French People That German Helpless Innocents Have Been Slaughtered.

BRITISH BARBARITY

Whines That English Are Responsible for Reprisals by Zepps on French Towns.

German hypocrisy can go no further than a recent attempt to persuade the French people by means of circulars dropped by airmen that French aviators are engaged in the pastime of murdering German innocents.

In a Berlin circular which has just come into our hands printed in French appear the following passages:

"Frenchmen! Your airmen with their bombs have killed during the last few weeks a great number of civilians, men, women and children, far behind the front in Germany. At Karlsruhe 48 killed included 30 children. In attacks on Mülheim, Frick, Kander, Holsen, Mappach and Heltersheim there were as many killed and wounded. None of these places are of the slightest military importance."

These Basp British. "Frenchmen! We know now without any doubt whatever that these crimes have been committed by the express order of your government. President Poincaré himself has given the order at the base investigation of the British."

"Germany makes war upon the French armed forces, not on the civil population of women and children. We hope that there will be no more barbarous attacks of this kind by French aviators, but if there is a repetition Germany will be compelled to take similar measures in defence."

"But you will know the Frenchmen, that that slave of England, M. Poincaré, will be responsible for the blood of innocent victims, and that it will be British barbarity which will have compelled us to plunge your towns, far away from the front, into mourning."

When one recalls the unprovoked zeppelin attacks upon centres of population both near Paris and in England which are not of the slightest military value, and the hundreds of non-combatant victims of all ages and sexes, the colossal effrontery of this circular is self-evident.

PUT BAN ON FOREIGNERS.

Hamilton, Saturday, Dec. 16.—No more restaurant licenses will be granted to foreigners and the residents living in the neighborhood demand them. This decision was made at a meeting of the police commissioners yesterday.

Hamilton, Saturday, Dec. 16.—Magistrate Jelfs yesterday fined Nishor and Jack Mooradian, grocers, at the corner of Gibson avenue and Prince street \$200 for having a case of gun in their store.

AWARDED HIGH HONOR.

Hamilton, Saturday, Dec. 16.—Word has been received here to the effect that Capt. Leeming Carr was awarded the Military Cross for taking stretcher-bearers into action under heavy fire. Capt. Carr is a son of Dr. Leeming Carr, school trustee, and is well-known here.

WORLD'S LARGEST SHIP IS OWNED IN ITALY

An Oil Steamer With Wonderful Contrivances for the Speedy Shifting of Cargoes.

The largest steamer ever built for cargo carrying is the Milazzo, a new Italian merchant ship. She is built as no other ship has ever been built in the history of the world. The prime idea of her construction was that she should be able to carry 14,000 tons of cargo and 4,500 tons of oil-fuel and discharge the cargo in forty-eight hours without manual labor. This she has actually accomplished.

On each side of the bottom of the vessel there runs a railway with two sets of lines in a tunnel with an inverted V-shaped roof. This leaves room for similar tunnels at the sides of the ship, into which the oil-fuel is poured, to be pumped out as required; and in the centre is a further tunnel, which contains the propeller shaft.

A Miniature Railway. The greatest novelty, however, is the inverted V-roofed railways, and other compartments mentioned. Doors, or hatches, open at regular intervals on the inside of the railway roofs, and as each is opened the cargo tumbles into a little railway car, until it is filled.

The deck of the Milazzo is covered with a series of tall discharging towers. Each has a well that goes right down to the railway line. The loaded car is run to the nearest of these wells, where its body is snatched off the wheels and hoisted up the well to a platform. Here it tips its contents into a monster chute, which conveys the coal or corn to a barge or railway truck for transport wherever necessary.

HELP CANADIAN BUFFS.

The women's auxiliary of the 166th Battalion (the Canadian Buffs) held its last meeting for 1916 yesterday afternoon in the school of the Central Methodist Church. Four large boxes of socks were packed and much work done. The women will continue their meetings after the New Year.

HYDRO GETS POWER.

Canadian Niagara Gives it Eleven Thousand Horse Power.

Hon. Wallace Nesbitt, K.C., president of the Canadian Niagara Power Company, stated yesterday that he had placed at the disposal of the Hydro 11,000 horse power, of the 15,000 horse power, which the commission claims to have promised to supply them this year. This is in addition to the 10,000 horse power recently cut off by the breakdown of a generator.

The hydro could have it as soon as they could link up. Officials of the hydro stated last night that they had received no official confirmation of this. Mr. Nesbitt said that he had been waited upon by members of the imperial munitions board and that their representations had carried weight. As for the 4,000 horse power remaining of the first 50,000 horse power demanded by the hydro, he expected to be able to turn that over in a very short time.

BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETS

Eighty-Nine Bylaws Are Adopted—Give Names of Incompetent Teachers.

At a meeting of the board of education that went merrily along until after ten o'clock before Trustees Steele turned up to make a quorum the by-laws were discussed and with few changes some eighty-nine adopted. Only thirty proof copies were printed and resentment has been expressed by many of the principals and teachers who were unable to see bylaws that might radically affect them. Chairman Houston, after the meeting, explained that there was no intention of secrecy only a shortage of copies. The principal change adopted by the meeting was that inspectors should report confidentially to the management committee the first of May and teachers the names of incompetent teachers who should not be re-engaged.

TORONTO MAN DIVORCED.

Detroit, Dec. 15.—A divorce decree has been granted here to Ross Clarke, 690 College street, Toronto, from his wife, Freyda Knoll Clarke, formerly of Fort Colborne. The couple were married New Year's Eve, 1915, in New York City.

COMMISSION RULE IN MONTREAL IN PROSPECT

Lord Shaughnessy Among Those Who Will Govern Affairs.

Montreal, Dec. 15.—The administration of the affairs of the City of Montreal will pass from the hands of the mayor, controllers and aldermen and be handed by a commission of which Lord Shaughnessy, Sir Alexander Lacote and Senator Beaubien are the more important members. It was announced by a prominent member of the reform element this morning.

The aldermen and controllers will be paid the balance of their salaries for their terms and be released. Mayor Martin is to be retained as ex-officio chairman of the commission as he cannot be deposed. No appropriations will be made for five years in an attempt to straighten out the city's financial tangle.

A special sub-commission, consisting of Senators Beaubien and Coadre and E. J. Cockburn, the last named official of the Bank of Montreal, will arrange the question of a new franchise for the Montreal Tramways Co.

WOULD RECRUIT HERE.

As General Legie has forwarded to Ottawa a complaint against the organization of the Maclean Highlanders in Toronto, those interested here met at luncheon in the St. Charles Hotel yesterday and passed a resolution setting forth their position in the matter and requesting that opposition expressed by local military officials be reconsidered and withdrawn, as it is felt that such opposition is unfair and injudicious at this stage of the committee's work and obligations.

SOLDIER UNDER ARREST.

On the authority of the sheriff of Mecklenburg County, N.C., U.S.A., Clement Leith, a member of a local battalion, was arrested yesterday afternoon by Detectives Lewis and Taylor on a charge of embezzling \$1548.

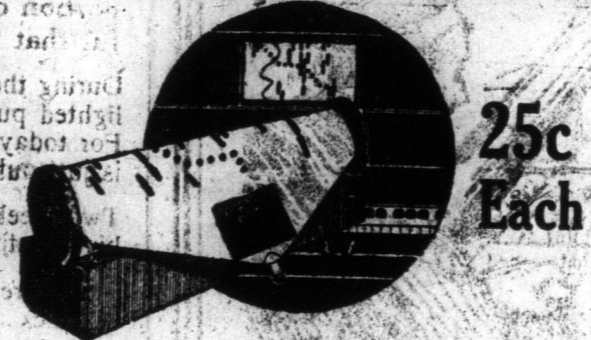

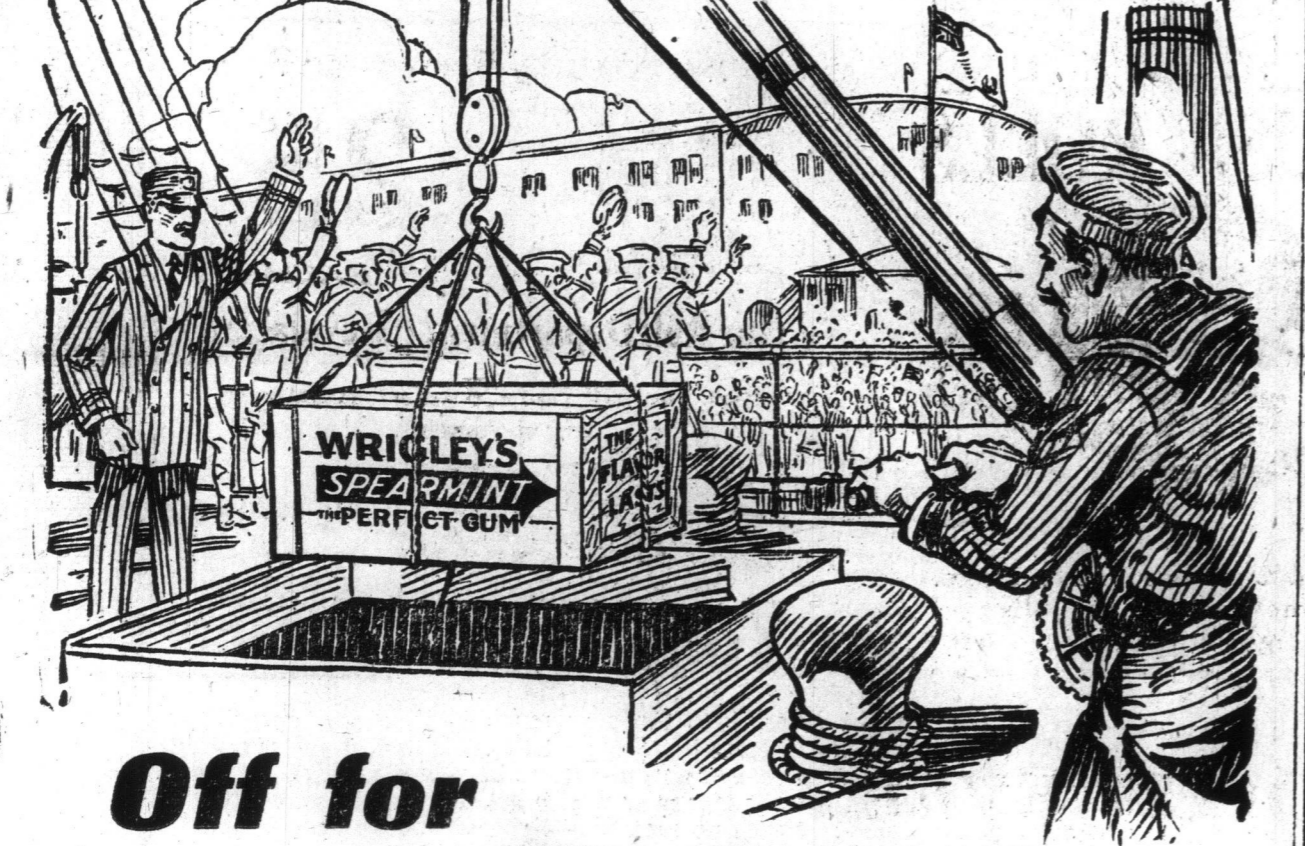

FIFTEEN TORONTO MEN IN THE CASUALTY LIST

Four Killed, Two Die of Wounds, One Prisoner, Four Wounded and Three Missing.

Fifteen Toronto men are named in the latest casualty reports. These include the names of two officers killed, one severely wounded, one an exchanged prisoner, two men killed in action, two died of wounds, one a prisoner of war, four wounded, and three missing.

Information received by friends in Toronto states that Major Furgerson, second son of F. A. Acland, deputy minister of labor, is more seriously injured than at first thought and that it will probably be many months before he is full recovered.

Lieut. Charles Glover, reported killed in action, was a former student at Wycliffe College and an undergraduate at Toronto University. He was a son of Wm. Glover, Southfield, England. He met his death while leading a charge over the parapet of the trenches.

Lieut. J. Harvey Douglas, son of W. M. Douglas, 59 Matland street, seriously wounded while with the 4th C. M. R. at Zillebeke, has been sent to Zurich, Switzerland, from a German prison camp. He went overseas with the 35th Battalion.

Lieut. Chas. G. Saunders, reported killed in action, held rank of captain in the 3rd Artillery Brigade, but went to the front as a lieutenant in the Canadian Mounted Rifles. He graduated from Toronto University in 1901.

Lieut. E. J. Searle, is reported killed in action, his death occurring about September 16. Before enlisting in Toronto he was with the Suburban Railway and resided at 1003 Keele street.

Pte. Alinger J. Davey is stated in the latest list as "believed killed in action." He formerly lived in Swansea.

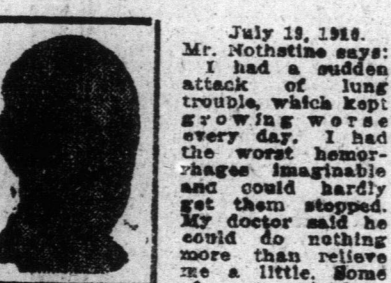

This new mill will take care of the same volume of ore as that which formerly went to the fifty-stamp mill, and is expected to result in a very material saving in the cost of labor and repair. The stamp mill will be cut out entirely. At present, underground work is centered largely in raising from the 400 ft. to the 250 ft. level. By the 15th of February these levels will be connected, and will permit ore to be hoisted from the 400 ft. direct to surface. The ball mill will probably be in operation early in February.

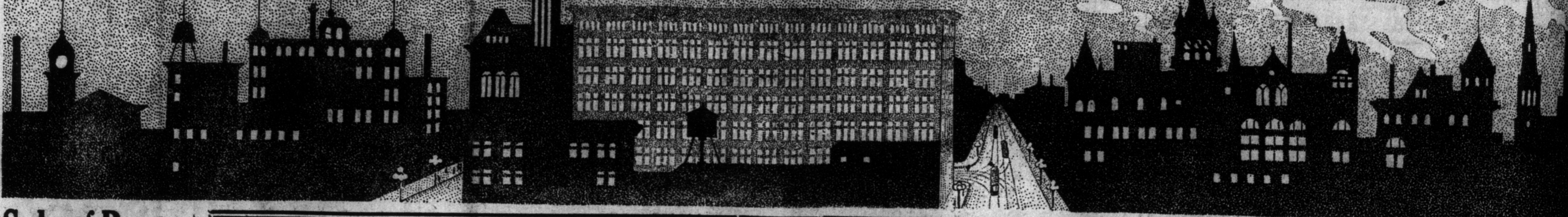
