POPULATION OF CANADA

It Has Increased Over 800,000 Since 1901 Census. Ottawa, Sept. 3.—(Special)—Canada's population is now considerably more than 6,000,000, having increased more than 800,000 since the 1901 census. This estimate is derived by the most careful computation in the census department here. Here is the statement: The natural increase of population in Canada in the twelve months of the last census year was at the rate of 12.70 per 1,000, the ratio of births having been 27.82 and of deaths 15.12. Computed at the same rate and adding the number of immigrants, the population on July 1 of each year should be as follows:

Then to Greece, Turkey and across into Arabia and the principal cities there. In Persia, he saw the tomb of the prophet, the Play at Oberammergau, where a realistic performance is put on every ten years. Through the Holy Land, Jerusalem, Jerusalem, Bethlehem, Damascus, went east from the latter place to friends home, visited here at \$100; there goods were valued at \$8.
