# MOST FAMOUS HERESY TRIAL OF MODERN TIMES IS THAT OF REV. DR. CRAPSEY

BATAVIA, N. Y., April 17—The first trial for heresy in years in the protest-ant episcopal church, is scheduled to begin here today, when the Rev. Algernon Sidney Crapsey, D. D., for 25 years rector of Saint Andrews church in Rochester, will be placed on trial before an ecclesistical court, charged with utterances from the pulpit of that church, and in print, which are alleged to be in violation of the tenets of the protestant episcopal faith. There is no dispute as to what Dr. Crapsey said. The question that mill be at issue upon the trial is whether or not his questioned preachings do or do not violate the doctrines of the church.



# PORTRAIT WILL BE PLACED IN PUBLIC

LIBRARY IN MAY

(Toronto Globe).

An oil portiait of more than ordinary interest is now on exhibition at Mackenzie's gallery, Yonge street, for a few days. It is that of the late Robert Sears, who was the first publisher and editor of Illustrated Biblica, and Historical Works in America. Mr. Sears was born in St. John (N. B.) June, 1810, the son of one of the Lovalists who founded that city John (N. B.) June, 1810, the son of one of the Loyalists who founded that city in 1783. He learned the art of printing in his native city, spending seven years in his apprenticeship. Among his fellowworkers at this time were two young men, Smith and Anderson, who afterwards founded the New York Herald, ma. famous later by Gordon Bennett.

Mr. Sears took passage in a vessel in 1830 to New York city, and started a small printing office on the exact site where the great World building now stands. Having accumulated some capita' in this business, he issued in 1839 his first important work, Illustrations of the Bible, of which 20,000 copies were sold in six months, an enormous sale at that the Bible, of which 20,000 copies were sold in six months, an enormous sale at that period. This was immediately followed by a History of the Bible, Bible Biography, Pictorial Sunday Book, Information for the People, Wonders of the World, and numerous other important religious and historical works.

He also published the first Pictorial Family Bible, containing nearly 1,000 illustrations, of which many thousands of conies were sold. These works were all profusely illustrated with the best wood engravings of the time, and Mr. Sears gave the earliest encouragement to that art in the United

In the year 1847 he presented a set o In the year 1847 he presented a set of his entire works, elegantly bound and inscribed, to Her Majesty the late Queen Victoria at Buckingham Palace, and received a letter, through Sir George Grey, then home secretary, conveying the queen personal thanks and gracious acceptance of the relumner.

Mr. Sears withdrew from business many years ago, and took up his residence in this city in 1874, and died here in 1892, in his 83rd year. The portrait was painted in New York in 1844, when Mr. Sears was most actively engaged in literary work in that city. The artist was Thomas Hicks, N.

A. D., then a very young man, in hist twentieth year, but who a few years later became one of the most celebrated porbecame one of the most celebrated portrait painters of the United States.

Mr. Sears' only surviving son, a well known resident of Toronto, is donating this portrait of his father to the New Brunswick Loyalist Society of St. John, where it will be deposited in the new public library, just erected in Mr. Sears' native city, on the 18th of May next, that day being celebrated as the 123rd anniversary of the landing of the Loyalists (1783).






