PUBLIC PLAYGROUNDS

The Times has received the following letter from Miss Mabel Peters, who is now in Detroit, and whose interest in the subject of public playgrounds for children is well known to the citizens of St. John.

Dear Sir, The women of the Local Council in St. John and others interested in the needs and welfare of children are glad to learn that yesterday there was formed in Washington, D. C., a National Playground Association.

The organization of this association is the most auspicious happening in playground matters since the movement for playgrounds took shape, and denotes that education has recognized the value of play, and assigned it a place in the curriculum.

Miss Peters writes also that she attended the meetings of the American National Council of Women in Toledo week before last, and heard glowing accounts of the vacation schools and playgrounds from all parts of the United States.

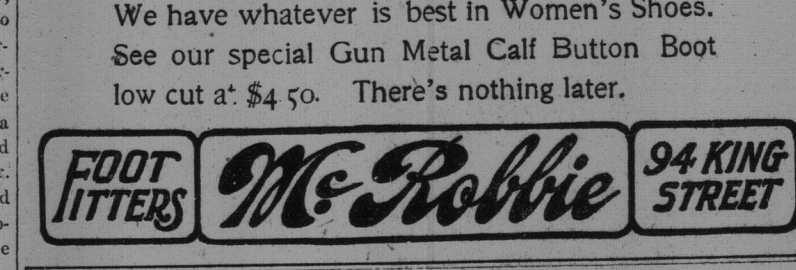

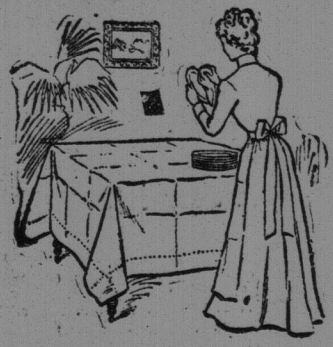

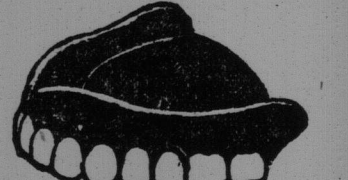
