Commander of Dominion Troops in England Warmly Seconds General Mewburn's Intention to Send 20,000 Soldiers at First of

London, Nov. 28-General Mewburn, the minister of militia for Canada, aving cabled that he had no time for electioneering, because he felt his suoreme duty was getting 20,000 men over seas, General Turner, V. C., commander

of the Canadian forces in England, has replied: "I cannot express to you the deep appreciation of all ranks overseas for our statement, that you are working day and night to secure us 20,000 reinorcements beginning this year. We know only too well over here that the fifth division will indeed be wiped off the slate in order to reinforce the divisions in France, if large fresh drafts are not immediately forthcoming. We, who are close to the fighting zone, know only too well the bitter struggle which the Canadian divisions are making to main tain their position. If the people of Canada would only realize that, in order to maintain our divisions at full strength, men who have been wounded have been rushed back as soon as they are fit. without the leave or rest to which they are entitled, I believe there is not a patriotic civilian in Canada who would not stand heart and soul behind you in your endeavors. Sir Robert Borden has given his pledge that he will not too, on the honor of our countrymen in Canada, to be true to themselves, and



DEATH RATE FROM TUBERCULOSIS IS HIGHER THIS YEAR

Annual Meeting of Society For Prevention

FIGURES FOR THE YEAR

Strong Demand For Medical Inspection in the Schools-Greater Public Financial Support For the Work Needed

The annual report of the St. John Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, submitted at the annual meeting this afternoon, was as follows: St. John, N. B., November, 1917.

The executive of the St. John Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis beg to present their report of the work done from November 1, 1916, to

November 1, 1917. The work has been steadily carried

The work has been steadily carried on during the year, the executive meeting every month with the exception of two summer months.

The dispensary at 74 Carmarthen street has been open 184 days during the year, sixty-eight for children and 116 for adults, that is every Monday and Wednesday for adults and every Friday for children. In addition to this Dr. Townshend and Dr. Farris hold clinics there and all who desire to be examined by them may present themexamined by them may present them-selves. On the other days our dispenserves. On the other days our dispersary physician, Dr. Logie, and our experienced nurse, Miss Brophy, are in attendance. Three hundred and thirtynine patients were examined by Dr. Townshend, sixty-five by Dr. Farris and

200 by Dr. Logie.

There were 607 attendants at the dis pensary during the year, 203 children, a slightly smaller number than last a slightly smaller number than last year, and 394 adults, an increase of sixteen. Each one of them has been examined or treated in some way or other and 300 prescriptions were filled. Some were recommended for River Glade, some for the County Hospital, some for dispensary treatment and a number dispersion of the county the results.

some for the County Hospital, some for dispensary treatment and a number discharged as non-tubercular.

The dispensary has become as it were a clearing house for all tubercular cases, and since the city has been paying for patients at River Glade who are unable to afford the expense themselves, all such applications must come through it. There have been thirteen such cases this year and the association sees that all are supplied with the warm clothing and all other necessities; in addition to which we have paid the expenses of two patients at River Glade. There have also been eleven patients who have paid their own expenses and one paid for by St. Andrew's Society. When the patients are discharged from River Glade they still attend the dispensary and are examined from time to time and kept under observation. At the beginning of the year we had thirty-one children patients and eighty-one adults, a total of 112, and there were sixty-four children and 122 adult new patients; thirty-three children were discharged and 105 adults, leaving sixty-two children and ninety-eight adults on the books on Nov. 1. It will be seen that there are a large number of children of school age as patients and this association cannot urge too strongly the there are a large number of children of school age as patients and this association cannot urge too strongly the medical inspection of schools, as much of the tuberculosis that exists in the city is due to the health of the children being undermined by such conditions as bad teeth, poor vision, adenoids and such conditions, which could be discovered and remedied by proper school inspection. A lady member of the board is in charge at the dispensary every month and it is her duty to look after all cases that are recommended for all cases that are recommended for River Glade and to make all the ar-rangements necessary for sending them

For the last ten years the death rate from tuberculosis in this city has been steadily decreasing, but this year for some unaccountable reason it has gone up again, which shows all the greater need for the work of this association. we are exceedingly fortunate in our nurse, Miss Brophy, who has done splendid work during the year, never sparing herself and bringing help and comfort to many a home. During the year she has made 1,476 visits. pread of the disease.
With regard to funds. Our aim for some years past has been to have 1,000 subscribers at \$1 a year, but we have fallen far short of that, having this year only 275 and the total amount collected only 275 and the total amount collected was \$520. For the last two years we have received a grant from the city of \$500, without which it would have been impossible to carry on the work, the increased price of living having necessitated an increase of salaries, etc. The running expenses of the dispensary were \$1,175, a detailed statement of which will be submitted later.

This is without money spent on milk which we have supplied to fourteen patients and the board of patients at River Glade. This fund is indebted to De Monts Chapter I. O. D. E. for \$100.

At Christmas last year, owing to the generosity of some citizens, we were enabled to send dinners to eight families who otherwise would have none and also fruit to all patients and at Easter all were supplied with eggs and fruit. In conclusion the executive beg to thank the following:



SANTA CLAUS PRACTICAL.

War Conditions to Change Character of Gifts Made by New York Police.

Santa Claus, in the blue uniform of a policeman, is going to be a little more utilitarian in his gifts this year. No candy, because sugar is scarce; preferably no toys, for clothing and food are necessities and toys must, rather regretfully, be described as luxuries. These are the recommendations made by Police Commissioner Woods to those who would contribute to the second Christmas given by and through the police to thousands of poor children who would not otherwise be reached. 





OUR LOSSES HEAVY THIS MONTH

Ottawa, Nov. 28-A statement issued today by the militia department shows that during the first fifteen days of the present month the total wastage in the Canadian expeditionary force exceeded the total number of recruits obtained by 9,150 men. The total wastage, consisting of casualties overseas and men discharged in England and Canada, is given as 11,211. The total number of recruits secured during the half month was 2,061.

Casualties overseas for the fifteen day period were very heavy, a total of 8,252 men being placed in this class. Of this number, 6,448 were infantrymen. The balance of the total wastage is made up as follows: Men discharged in Canada, 418; men returned to Canada for discharge, 2,420; men discharged in England, 121. The total wastage of infantrymen during the half month was

Of the 2,061 recruits secured in the lifteen days, 672 were obtained in the United States, 1,384 in Canada and five in England. A total of 896 men joined the ranks of the infantry; 455 became artillerymen; 245 joined the railway construction and forestry battalions, and 465 were drafted into miscellaneous

It is estimated in the statement that 45 per cent. of the total casualties will be fit for general service within a period of six months.

NEW CODE OF CANON LAW IN CATHOLIC CHURCH

Marriages in Lent and Adven Permissable — The Fasting Re-

(Montreal Gazette.)

In future marriages may be celebrated in Catholic churches in Lent and in Advent. This is one of the two important announcements conveyed by Archbishop Bruchesi in a circular letter read in Catholic churches yesterday. The second announcement concerns the research of the stomach, etc., all

On Advent.

In future we shall not have the customary fast-days of Advent, Fridays alone shall remain days of abstinence. Therefore, the weeks of Advent shall be like any ordinary week during the year, as far as fasting and abstinence are concerned, with the exception of Ember-week, during which the regular three days of fast and abstinence must be observed, as in the past.

The vigil of Christmas shall also remain a day of fast and abstinence, except when Christmas falls on a Monday, because the fasts of vigils are never anticipated.

Christmas day inclusively, and also from Ash Wednesday until Easter Sunday inclusively." But this change in the duration of forbidden time shall not go into effect until Pentecost.

From now on however, the Ordinaries may, for a serious reason, and conformably to the liturgical laws, permit the nuptial blessing at marriages, on days within the forbidden times. But on such occasions the parties must be notified to abtain from all pomp and display.
