Four Hundred Canadians Killed, 1000 Wounded and 300 Missing In 'Tank' Fight of Monday and Tuesday

Ottawa, Ont., Sept. 21.—(Special to Times) In the "Tank" fight on Monday and Tuesday Canadian casualties were 400 killed, 1000 wounded and 300 missing.

This brings the total Canadian casualties to about 40,000.

JAPAN'S GROWING TRADE

Washington, Sept. 19.—Consul General Skidmore at Yokohama, in a dispatch to the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, says that the export of cotton goods from Japan in the past six months has been unprecedented, the total being nearly twice that of the preceding half year. The increase went mainly to India and Siberia, these two markets now being largely cut off from the English supply, and depending on Japan.

The shipment of cotton goods to foreign markets for the first six months of 1916 amounts in value to \$28,415,000, or \$10,966,000 more than was exported for the corresponding six months of 1915. The expectation is that the export of cotton goods from Japan will practically double this year.

(Commercial and Financial World.) Japan is probably the most prosperous country in the world at present. Her war munition trade, compared with that of the United States, is small in total value, but every branch of business in Japan is making new records of prosperity.

Financially, Japan was never such a power in the world before. She has redeemed large quantities of Japanese bonds held in Great Britain and France and is preparing to take up \$50,000,000 worth of British Treasury bonds in the United States to help out her ally, and incidentally to obtain the five or perhaps six per cent, which England will pay in place of the one and a half per cent. by the Japanese federal banks.

The significant thing about the commercial prosperity of Japan is the way in which it is being used to lay the foundations of future business and Japan is going to be a much more formidable competitor after peace than she was before war.

The shipping companies, in particular, are piling up enormous reserve funds and increasing their fleets. The bulk of their profits are going into capital while the government subsidies secure their dividends as before.

Cotton spinning, the chief of Japan's internal industries, is in similar condition. Business is on record levels, and while profits and prices have gone up, the wages of the operators are stationary at almost the lowest mark in the world and their efficiency is growing. The increase of spindles is much greater than the increase of operators.

Another distinctive feature of industrial conditions is the number of new industries which have been created through the cessation of German exports. A recent investigation by the department of commerce showed nine new industries in existence as the result of the war. They are:

Dye stuffs (Aniline salts and black dyes); Chemicals (sulphate of bisulph, salicylic acid, antipyrin acetate of calcium and formalin); glass wares; celluloid, paper, pulp, phosphorus, potassium chloride, and soda.

In view of the enormous demands of the east of cotton clothing the spinning industry is likely to reach gigantic proportions. This prospect of permanence is being cotton shares at present more than any others. The export is specially good. Not only are sales to China increasing but Japanese goods are now in possession of Indian and Pacific markets where British and German goods formerly held the field.

There are now in Japan 2,768,000 spindles, owned by thirty-six companies with a capital of \$40,000,000 and employing 128,000 work people.

Every year from now on Japan's competition will be felt with great severity in every market on the Pacific. This competition is backed by government support in every form—high protection at home and a policy aimed at preventing the slightest danger from foreign control or even foreign profit-sharing in Japanese industries, and abroad, subsidized steamships, subsidized banks, preferential rates, and not least, a highly organized consular service.

Decree Hula Hula As Society Dance

Professors of Terpsichore Favor Hawaiian Art

"London Taps" is Popular; Vernon Castle Displays it in Trenches to Jewsharp Accompaniment

New York, Sept. 21—Hawaii's famous hula hula is going to be danced by Americans next winter. For so it was decreed by the American Society at the Hotel Majestic. Of course it is not to be the real hula, but a sort of sublimated Hawaiian dance adapted by certain radical and necessary changes for the ballroom. The immense popularity of Hawaiian music is responsible for the evolution of an Hawaiian dance for ballroom purposes and a great vogue is predicted for it by its sponsors.

Next to the Hawaiian the military influence will be strongest felt in the modern dances for the coming season, the dancing masters declare. Everything that is not Hawaiian will be military in the fox trot and even the stately waltz will be danced with a military bearing.

The influence of feminism is probably the cause of the decree of the dancing masters that in the modern dances the man shall go backward. The debutant of the dancing floor, who claimed she had walked twenty miles backward on the dancing floor, will have a sight of relief that she can now go forward again with propriety, nay, even elate.

Fox Trot and Waltz to Stay.

The fox trot will prevail, it is asserted, and the waltz will not be supplanted. The vogue of dancing is not on the decline, the dancing masters all insist, and if anything, with more people who know how to dance, it will be a more popular form of diversion this season than ever before.

Vernon Castle was the most talked of person of the convention. The rumor that he was killed when flying over the German lines on the western front was not taken seriously by any of his former associates and was not confirmed by his secretary, Falmage Thompson.

"London Taps" is the name of the most popular dance in England now, according to Mrs. Evelyn Habibel, of New York. It was taken originally from "The Broken Doll" chorus in the new musical comedy "Sambo," but it is London waltz was due, she said, to Vernon Castle, who took it up, and now it is danced from New York to New York. It is a military dance and the officers' spurs make a noise in the midst of a fox trot. The musicians all stop while the dancers keep tapping with their feet. "Vernon," Mrs. Habibel says, "is dancing it for the men in the trenches to the accompaniment of a home made Jewsharp."

"Walking the Dog," the new dance which has only been seen in vaudeville, was the bone of contention in a hot debate yesterday. Some of the dancing masters favor it and others are strongly opposed.

Louis H. Chalfi, formerly of the Russian imperial ball, belongs to the progressive party of dancing masters and would purge the dance of all suggestiveness. Yesterday his subject was "A Heart to Heart Talk Against Heart to Heart Dancing." He stated that he had stated his newest dances, including Greek interpretative and aesthetic dancing.

Adolph Newberger, for thirty-five years a dancing master in New York, and director of the dances in "Hip Hip Hoory" at the Hippodrome last year, is the leading advocate of the Hawaiian dances which, he says, will be arranged for the ballroom.

Some of the other new dances are "Cornell Pad," "Honey Special," "The girl's Revere," and "Corkerew Glise," all danced by the same teacher, "Major Butt's Manual of Arms" for the benefit of the Plattsbury rookies. It is presumed, and the "Terre Haute Fox."

There are about seventy dancing masters attending the convention, and they come and the way from the snow-capped mountains of Montana to the cranberry bogs of Massachusetts.

So far nothing has been said about the director of the American Society of Professors of Dancing.

His name is P. Nutt, of Vineland, N. J. He would not admit the reporters to the dance demonstrations, but that is hardly sufficient grounds for roasting him.

board of wages are being paid for farm help. But the manufacturers and farmers are cheerfully paying the increased wages to imported help and in some cases are actually encouraging the native and naturalized help to enlist in order to help Britain to increase her forces.

Analysis of the recruits from Canada show that Ontario leads the list with nearly 150,000 men. Quebec has recruited 96,000 men, the three eastern provinces 31,000, and the four western provinces the remainder. Toronto district has shown a total enlistment of nearly 80,000 men.

Organized labor is well represented in the recruits and it speaks well for that section that they agreed to make no demands for higher wages or shorter hours until the war is ended.

That Canada will have a period of reconstruction after the war, is certain. Already an economic commission is collecting data and framing legislation to put into effect when peace is declared.

Not in recruiting alone has the Dominion shown its loyalty. It has raised vast sums and given huge credits to provide munitions for the allies. By joint action of the government and banks neutral.

\$100,000,000 has been raised for that purpose, and it is estimated that orders for \$400,000,000 for contracts for munitions have been placed with Canadian factories.

Nearly a quarter of a million people are engaged in munition making. The whole country is "doing its bit." There is no shirking, no whining, no moaning, no cry for peace. Canada is resolute, loyal and enthusiastic in the cause of the mother country and her allies. Need \$47,000 For The Patriotic Fund

That is the cry of the Canadian Patriotic Fund in the district of St. John, which operates throughout the counties of St. John, Kings, Queens and Albert. Some time ago a committee was appointed by the local executive to discover, if possible, ways and means to raise the sum of \$47,000, which represents the deficit of the Canadian Patriotic Fund in the four counties. It is estimated that by the end of the present year, and traveling at its present ratio the district, which has St. John as its centre, will find its Canadian Patriotic Fund account with \$47,000 on the wrong side of the ledger. There must be a cleaning-up day and preparations are being made for it. Yesterday the special committee met at the board of trade rooms to deliver its report to the executive. Judge Forbes, the chairman of the special committee, occupied the chair. The gist of the report was that personal canvass was considered to be the best means of securing the amount of money needed to square the Canadian Patriotic Fund accounts in this district. It might be pointed out that the \$47,000 needed before the end of the year to balance the fund for this district does not represent the total amount of money necessary but the amount necessary over and above that which will come in during the balance of the year. This indicates that a very great effort is needed to pull the fund in this district out of the hole. For months more money has been paid out to dependents upon the fund than was received by the treasury in this district and the matter has now reached an almost chronic stage.

FIVE THOUSAND HOGS EAT DENVER'S GARBAGE

Why the garbage problem in Denver has been solved with apparently so little friction has been a mystery to many an eastern city official. Urges Admission Of East Indians

That Hinosos if brought to New Brunswick and placed on the soil would be a very great added source of wealth to the province, was the opinion expressed by James E. Dobbs, of the Canada-India League, who arrived in the city yesterday from Trinidad (B.W.I.), where he has been since June last. Mr. Dobbs was sent here by the Canada-India League to study the habits and traits of the East Indians, where many of them have settled under the indenture labor regulations. Speaking of the objects of the league, Mr. Dobbs said: "Canada has several million acres of fertile soil awaiting cultivation and extensive advertising has been done by the Canadian government inviting settlers to inhabit the country as agriculturists. Canada has always needed this kind of immigrant but perhaps never more so than today with her great shortage of laborers on the land, due to recruiting. Some East Indians naturally wanted to avail themselves of such an opportunity to come to Canada but when small groups of them responded to this general invitation they found to their dismay they were not wanted although foreigners of many nationalities were coming in freely. "There are about 4,500 East Indians in Canada who came here some years ago and mostly reside in British Columbia and these are contributing their share towards the general prosperity of the province in which they live. Many commendable things are said of them, and I believe they, together with a large number of Canadians, are very solicitous for a closer bond of fellowship and union among these two races who shelter under the Union Jack. 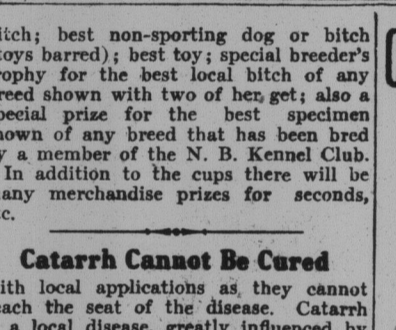
