## Thousand Canadians Are Killed, Says an Unofficial Report

## **Hundred Dominion Officers in The** List of Dead and Wounded

Few Names of Non-Coms. and Privates Are Yet Known--Several Days Before Complete Casualty List is Available -- Dominion's Sons Have **Nobly Done Their Part** 

A message to J. M. Robinson & Sons from Montreal today said:

"The casualty lists are incomplete but give the names of one thousand killed among the Canadians."

Ottawa, April 26—So far, it appears that 21 Canadian officers were killed and 68 wounded in the hree days fighting. This will mean a thousand men lost. The Canadian guns taken and recovered were behind the French and not behind the Canadian lines.

Ottawa, Ont., April 26—With perhaps 100 officers figuring in the list of dead and wounded, grave fears are entertained that this number will be augmented by greater and severer losses among the noncommissioned officers and men. The grim realities and terrific toll of war have been brought home to
the Canadian people in the last twenty four hours in a manner never before realized. Yesterday morning came the first casualty list from the titanic battle at Langemarck. With one exception all were re-

It led to hopes that, while suffering disabilities and wounds, the death toll had largely been escaped. The cables last night bringing tidings of the death of twenty valiant officers and augmenting the list of wounded told a different story. Today there are filtering into the militia department additional lists which intensify the already terrific tale of death and bloodshed among the Canadians fighting glori-

Ously and valourously for the traditions of the empire, and cause of liberty and freedom.

It cannot be said that any great surprise has been created at Ottawa by overseas developments in the last three days. They were recognized as the inevitable result of the war, and that participation which Canadians have so gladly and valorously undertaken.

The winter spent at Salisbury Plain under abnormal conditions produced its normal roll of deaths, and after the Canadian troops went to France and joined in the lighting, the casualities were steady but not numerous. Up to last week, the total deaths were only a little in excess of 300.

It was not regarded as anything out of the ordinary. At all times, however, it was recognized that the real struggle was yet to come and that once the spring "drive" began in earnest, results far more appalling than experienced, might be expected as a logical sequence of an intense altustion.

And so, when the Canadian division, in a battle which started last Thursday and still continues, was assigned a most important past in the awful struggle, heavy losses of officers and men have not unnaturally resulted.

Nowhere are the losses more keenly felt than at headquarters in Ottawa, where most of the officers are comparatively well known. While the capital thares in the predominant national gloom it also strikes the keynote of a patriotic call for more men, not only to uphold the empire, but to avenge Canadians who have gone down to death at the hands of Prussian militarism.

"It makes us close our teeth more firmly," remarked General Hughes last hight. We must now fight not only for liberty, but as well to avenge the blood of our Canadian hour."

The belief obtains here that the losses among the Canadian division will be a stimulating incentive to recruiting for further contingents. All along it has been most satisfactory, but now that Canadian feeling is stirred up as never before, the response to the call to arms, will be even more marked.

The official eye witness, if able to be on the scene, has not yet reported, but sufficient is known to establish the fact that the Canadian division was assigned a most important part, that they acquitted themselves valorously and that, after losing guns, they regained them. It was, however, with that heavy toll of death and disability, which might be expected from such a conflict under the terrifying conditions of modern warfare. The toll of dead and wounded among the officers has come first.

The non-coms and privates will come after. If anything like the same proportion is maintained in the ranks as among the officers, the losses must be heavy indeed. At the same time, in this war, the Germans have apparently made especial targets of the men directiong operations and it does not follow necessarily that the casualties in the ranks are relatively as large.

It will be probably some days until the list is complete, and until then it will not be known in its full and appalling significance, the toll which the was has imposed upon our valiant Canadian forces.

MAY BE GREATEST OF WAR

London, April 26—While a semi-official statement issued at Paris last night seeks to minimize the importance of the action at Lange Marck, accusing the Germans of magnifying their success in order to influence neutral countries, London attaches the greatest importance to these operations. The Times' military correspondent this morning says:—

"Some think that this will be the greatest battle of the war, but the allies are well prepared to meet any German offensive in this quarter and it need not be considered that there is most danger where there is most noise."

The Times' correspondent in Northern France says:—"The second battle of Flanders has begun. The enemy has been long and carefully preparing for it, and was biding his time, waiting for a favorable moment to develop his attack, but our unexpected capture of Hill 60 had a double effect, upsetting the enemy's calculations and compelling him to postpone, if not to abandon, his contemplated attack on the British position, and to disclose his hand in a premature attack on the French lines to the north."

## The Terrific Fight At Hill No. 60 Described By British Eye-Witness A TRIBUTE TO OUR SOLDIERS. Montreal, April 26—Under the heading "Our Day And Our Boys", the Star says editorially:—

London, April 25—"Trenches, para pets and sandbags disappeared," says the British official "eye-witness," in describing the effect of the explosions of the British mines which preceded the attack and capture by the British of Hill No. 60, to the southeast of Ypres, recently.

The gallantry of the Canadian troops in a desperate encounter with the Germans on Friday and Saturday is the subject of congratulatory messages from Sit John French and from the king himself, and the sad proof of their courage and devotion is found in the long list of casualties among the officers. Probably a hundred officers are listed among the killed and wounded, and we have yet to learn the number of casualties among the men under their command. The news from the battlefield has brought widespread sorrow, for among the killed and wounded are men from all parts of Canada. Their relatives and friends have at least the consolation that their loved ones proved their devotion and heroism in a manner to call forth the highest tributes of praise from the commander-in-chief and from the king, and that in a critical moment of the great struggle they saved the situation. From this time forward each day may be expected to bring its tale of sorrow to some homes in Canada, just as for many months past the days have brought mourning into the hofnes of the Mother Country. The seriousness of the war and the urgency of the cryfor more men will be more and more strongly impressed upon the minds of the people. Addressing a recruiting meeting in London yesterday Dr. Thomas J. McNamara said:—"We want more

distinction in the brilliant attack which recovered four guns that had fallen into the hands of the enemy, and with the guns took many German prisoners.

Saturday's news was not quite clear in relation to the attack made by the Germans against the French and British lines in the region of Ypres, although the latest cables said that the British were regaining ground which it was admitted had been lost. Last night's news was more definite and satisfactory. It showed that the Germans had either been rolled back or effectively stopped, and that the British, French and Beligians were not only holding their own, but were making some successful counter attacks. Despite the fact, however, that the German offensive had weakened, it

If it be true that the Germans have massed half a million men in that region the most desperate part of the battle on the road to Calass is yet to be fought. For the present the chief interest in the war is centred upon the operations in this region, and the reports will be awaited by Canadians with profound anxiety, intensified by the sorrow the casualty list brings to so many Canadian homes.

There must be more of self-denial, more of carnest devotion and personal work, and a fuller recognition of the terrible cost of the war. 



## **Empire Rings With Praise of Canadians**

London, April 25, 11.15 p.m.—The great attack in Flanders, originally levelled at the French, has been transferred to the British lines held by the Canadians, on the immediate right of the French, and here, for two days, the men from the dominion have been engaged in a deadly contest with the Germans. The latter state, in their official report, that they have made further progress toward Ypres and that the British counter-attacks have been repulsed.

The French account, on the other hand, declares that the Allies' counter-attacks continue with success and that the British hold all their positions, and repeated the charge that the Germans are using

bombs containing asphyxiating gases.

Ottawa, April 24—"They would never leave these guns in the hands of the Germans," said Major General Sam Hughes, minister of militia, regarding the Canadian victory, when shown the British war office statement. "They have done what was expected of them, what we all knew they could do and that was their duty. Yes, this despatch makes us prouder than ever of them. I am sorry that the despatch says there were many casualties, but we must be prepared for these, however many of them." CANADA LOOMS UP LARGE.

London, April 25—Canada loomed up prominently on the bulletin boards of the Saturday evening newspapers in London, "Canadians Saved the Situation," "Well Done Canadians," and "Bravo Canada." These were some of the headlines which appeared. In reference to this evening's statement from the war office, the Evening News says:

"The war office gives us, in this message, the kind of prompt news we want. Today's glorious bulletin will live always in the military chronicles of the empire. The despatch reveals that the left of our line which was unavoidably left uncovered by the French retirement, was held by the Canadians, who were in the first battle line and eager for the clash. The Germans did not capture their guns. They fell into them when the Canadians were swept back. Later, and with what impetuosity and grim resolution we are left to imagine, the Canadians made a counterattack, and re-took the four guns they had left behind, and also made German prisoners. Unhappily their casualties were heavy, but all around the empire will re-echo the praise of the war office for their conduct."



### Dr. J. L. Duval Is Wounded

Only Slightly, Says Cable to Wife—St. John Ambulance Boys Likely in First Aid Work in Great Battle

A cable received this morning by Mrs. Duval, of 116 Ludlow street, West St. John, from her husband, Major J. L. Duval, M. D., with No. 1 Field Ambulance at the front, told of his having been slightly wounded. It was dated "Hazebrouck, April 26, Slightly wounded. Writing."

Major Duval was one of the first physicians from St. John to offer his services and left here with the earliest contingent. He has been in France for several weeks, and has with him a complete ambulance detachment composed of St. John boys, with many from Fairville and West St. John. The announcement of his having been wounded would indicate that his unit was probably in the thick of the recent heavy fighting rendering first aid to the fallen in battle. FROM DOCTOR CORBET

In a letter from Major G. G. Corbett, M. D., received this morning by his wife, he says that his base hospital at Rouen, France, was filled with wounded Canadian soldiers as a result of the recent severe fighting. He, himself, is still quite well, although working almost night and day.


