Fredericton, N. B., Feb. 1—Premier P. J. Veniot's manifesto issued here tonight opens with a declaration that no further announcements respecting the inauguration of any new policies will be made prior to the open-ing of the legislature in early March.

It disposes of all rumors respecting any deviation from the policies initiated during the Foster regime by announcing that these policies will be carried through to a successful conclusion.

Touching on the important question of prohibition, Premier Veniot declares that he will make a thorough personal investigation into the situation before making any definite pronouncement as to the government policy. Nevertheless, he makes the very important statement that, "if the fault is in the law itself, steps should be taken to bring about a better or more efficient law. If the fault lies with the officials, charged with the administration of the law, this inefficiency should be made to disappear." The statement foreshadows amendment of the Work are a comparation of the

Workmen's Compensation Act, and concludes with an eloquent tribute to the worth and record of Hon. Dr. Foster, the retiring Premier. Hon. Mr. Veniot's statement is as follows:

ment is as follows: "It is not my intention to make any public an-nouncement before the opening of the Legislature touch-ing any new policy that would be pursued by the new Government. The speech from the throne will fore-shadow any new policy or policies looking to the future administration of provincial affairs.

"My attention has, however, been directed to the existence in certain quarters, of doubts as to my attitude towards the policies inaugurated by Hon. Mr. Foster during his tenure of office as Premier, and which are still more or less in the process of development. In order, therefore, to cause any such doubts or uncasiness to dis-appear from the minds of all interested, I wish to state that having assisted at the birth of every progressive measure introduced by Hon. Mr. Foster, and having stood unflinchingly by them in the Legislature, it would be folly for any one to entertain the idea that I would not follow in his footsteps and continue the good work, along the lines laid down by him, which has brought this along the lines laid down by him, which has brought this province to the fore as one of the most progressive of the Canadian Confederation. I sincerely hope that un-der my leadership the Government will be as progres-sive and businesslike as it was under the leadership of one whose resignation is regretted by all, but by none more than myself. 'It certainly must be a source of great satisfaction to the late Premier to know that his progressive policies in connection with the crown lands, the highways and the public health have been considered as being so far in ad-vance of legislation of a similar nature introduced elsevance of legislation of a similar nature introduced else-where, that many states of the American Union, as well as many provinces of Canada, have thought proper to adopt them in part or in whole. THE WATER POWERS.

"The development of the water powers will be con-tinued, and, wherever practical with proper protection to the province, our people will be given every opportu-nity to obtain power and energy at cost.

"For some time previous to my assuming the re-sponsibilities of Premier, the attention of the Govern-ment had been directed, both by the manufacturers and the representatives of labor, to certain apparent defici-encies in the administration of the Workmen's Com-pensation Act. I am a firm adherent of the principle of pensation Act. I am a firm adherent of the principle of Compensation, and while it may not be possible to meet all the divergent views of labor and capital, it should not be impossible, in my opinion, to find a happy medium by which these two important elements in our industrial life may be brought in closer touch with one another, and by this means find a common ground of agreement so that greater efficiency may be obtained in the working out of this important law. To this end I will put forth every effort.

PROHIBITION.

"I now come to a question of the most vital import-ance to the people of this province. Everyone must admit that the enforcement of the Prohibition Act is fraught with very serious difficulties, and perhaps it should not be wondered at were I to hesitate in making any definite pronouncement thereon before I would have an opportunity of making a thorough personal investigation into its workings. While I feel that an honest effort has been made in the past to enforce this Act with a fair measure of success, yet the criticisms that have lately been made by persons, whose sincerity I do not doubt, have lead me to feel that an effort should be made to find out if there are any reasonable grounds for complaint, and, if such grounds do exist, then steps must be taken to see that they disappear. If the fault lies with the officials charged with the administration of the with the officials charged with the administration of the law, this inefficiency should be made to disappear. If the fault is in the law itself, steps should be taken to bring about a better or more efficient law. But I am convinced that no change should take place until every means have been exhausted to bring about the results that were hoped for from the present act. In the meantime I hope that the true friends of the prohibition measure will not forget that 'to err is human', and, to succeed one must be backed by public sentiment to a degree unknown, up to the present at least, by your humble servant.

"I wish to take this opportunity of expressing to Hon. Mr. Foster, whom I considered it an honor to follow in the past, my regrets at his decision to retire from the leadership, and at the same time to extend to him my sincere thanks for the very generous con-sideration with which he always treated myself and the other members of his Government.

"In accepting the responsibilities that attach to the premiership, I am not unmindful of the success attained by my late leader in the application of business methods and the strict adherence to principles of integrity and fair-dealing with all classes of the population. It will be my aim to follow in his footsteps, and if I can achieve but one half of the success that has crowned his efforts I will feel that I have not worked in vain.


