SIX HUNDRED TO 800 THROWN OUT OF WORK

TESTIMONY OF ST. JOHN GIRL

Miss McKim Tells of Training on Technical Lines

Helps Pupils Follow Natural Bent of Talents—Is Household Arts Inspector of Ontario—Forty-eight Evening and Six Day Schools in Province.

When the Province of Ontario wanted an organizer of technical and industrial education it sent to Pratt Institute, New York, and engaged one of its staff, Miss Elsie McKim, daughter of Rev. R. P. McKim, rector of St. Luke's church in this city.

Organizer of Technical and Industrial Education in Ontario is the imposing little dame by Miss Elsie McKim of Toronto, who has been an interesting visitor in this city over the week-end.

Her visit to St. John is the result of a request from the St. Thomas Times-Journal last week.

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and Chatham, but the demand is growing rapidly. Two more schools are being asked for in Toronto now, one of which is in process of erection, and Niagara and Saint Ste. Marie are also opening new centres. There are night schools in forty-eight places in the province.

The sudden demand for technical schools at present is partly due to the Adolescent Act coming into force next September, when all children under sixteen years of age must return to school. The fact that these children left school, says Miss McKim, shows in the majority of cases that either they did not have sufficient ability along academic lines to warrant their parents sacrificing to give such education, or—which is more usual—they preferred industrial to academic work and in leaving school followed the natural bent of their talents. It seems only just to train these children along the lines on which they will most clearly go the farthest and do the best work. At present the goal of all high school education is matriculation, which a large percentage either cannot or do not care to attain.

Of course, says Miss McKim, a certain academic education is desirable for success or happiness in any line of work. The ideal course would be for all children to get their matriculation and then those specialize in industrial work who wish to, but this does not seem practical for a large number. Hence the necessity for the technical schools, where half time is given to industrial work and half time to training which will equip the child with a skilled knowledge of the trade he hopes to enter.

Government Aids Generously. The fairness of a technical school, in that it provides an equal opportunity for children of all talents, is quite evident. These schools, however, are not built in any locality unless there is a demand for them, but when this demand exists the government is very generous in its aid not only in the erection of the building, but also in paying the salaries of the teachers.

The boys' departments in these schools are very broad and have classes in navigational mechanics, railway work, telegraphy and in fact almost every branch of industry. The girls' work, however, in which Miss McKim is particularly interested, so far deals mainly with home-making subjects, recognizing the fact that such work ultimately falls to almost every girl, no matter what trade may intervene between girlhood and womanhood.

In the large cities dress-making and millinery is taught as a trade, but this is not warranted in small cities and few of the other industries which girls enter require much special training, although it is hoped to start such classes some time.

Teach Household Arts. Household arts are therefore the specialty for girls in the technical schools and they make a remarkably instructive and interesting course. Illustrating how practical such classes are, Miss McKim told of one which, among other things, studied house decorating, period furniture, how to judge good line in cheaper modern furniture and how to furnish certain rooms at a set price.

This same class once visited a dry goods store, where the owner gave a lecture on linens and flax, and later went to a meat shop, where the butcher carved a whole beef before them, pointing out the different cuts, their prices, quality and uses. The class, on returning to school, learned how to cook these cheaper cuts of meat to make them both nutritious and palatable.

Another time, the teacher wanted to buy dishes for the school kitchen and, being a wide-awake girl, she took the whole class with her to the store, where they had a lecture on the different patterns, qualities and prices of dishes. They returned to school and discussed which to purchase, the result of this experiment being that an unusually small number

of dishes has since been broken in that school kitchen.

Link Community Interests. Another very wide-awake teacher is successfully linking up community interests with those of her class. One class was opened to the public, when a hydro man demonstrated the uses of all his household conveniences, and Libby, McNeil Company provided materials for a complete meal from soup to ice cream, the class cooking the canned foods and learning how to use them to best advantage.

Miss McKim was particularly emphatic in the interview about the point that such classes and the technical schools are not formed because the children are not clever enough for academic work, but merely because their special talents lie in that direction and fairness demands as much assistance for them as for the children with an academic bent.

Miss McKim's enthusiasm is very contagious and those who met her, while on her inspection in St. Thomas, are more anxious than ever for a technical school in the city. Miss McKim, who was the guest of Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Griffin while here, left on Tuesday morning to inspect the night schools in Welland.

Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 28—Twelve little boys and girls, held virtual prisoners of science at the Philadelphia Hospital for Contagious Diseases for periods ranging from ten months to six years, will be given a home of their own at the institution.

The children are suffering from chronic diphtheria and must be kept at the hospital not only to protect the public from contagion, but for their own safety. It is explained that the disease has settled in their throats, destroying important tissues and muscles provided by nature as a part of their breathing apparatus and that unless hard rubber tubes are kept in their throats the chil-

dren are likely to die of suffocation. Nurses must constantly be in attendance in case one of these tubes slips from its place. Not one child in a thousand attacked by diphtheria contracts it in this chronic form, the hospital authorities say.

THE KING COUNTY BREAKS. To the Editor of the Times:—Sir,—I see by your paper in tonight's edition that you have been misinformed as to the King County breaks at Westfield, so I am taking the liberty to ask you to rectify this mistake in your paper on Monday. The credit really and justly belongs to Provincial Constables A. M. Sherwood and Andrew Garnett of St. John, as they had reached the

Gauthier, ex-minister of railways, suggested that those members of parliament who ran away from discussions of the principle of capital punishment when it was brought up in the house should be compelled to undertake executions, and this should be a duty imposed upon every member of parliament under the oath he takes on assuming his seat in parliament.

The association expressed satisfaction over the fact that a bill has been introduced in the senate by Hon. Landrum McMeas of Winnipeg to amend the criminal code to provide for the revision and remission of excessive punishments.

PRISONERS OF SCIENCE. Twelve Children Must Have Permanent Homes in Hospitals.

Pulpwood is cut in four foot lengths and the distance between Iriquois Falls and Toronto is about 460 miles.

Eight Antarctic Explorers Fall In Icy Waters When They Learn Rescued Comrade Gets Hot Rum

SIR ERNEST SHACKLETON IN BRILLIANT LECTURE DESCRIBES HOW THE MEN OF THE BULLDOG BREED BRAVED DANGERS AND SUFFERED HARSH SHIPS WITHOUT FLINCHING AMID THE DREARY SOUTHERN WATERS.

(Ottawa Journal) A story of true British courage of the highest class, the courage which enables men of the bulldog breed to face death or disaster without flinching, to persevere to the ultimate and regard the eternal hardship in which their tenacity may involve any mission for which they are given their word, was simply but eloquently told last evening to an audience which filled the auditorium of Ottawa Collegiate Institute.

The story was that of Sir Ernest Shackleton's second Antarctic expedition, and it was told by the chief actor of the drama, Sir Ernest himself, a red-headed man, who with his heroic composure placed the name of Britain in a forefront of Antarctic exploration. It was a distinguished speaker, sponsored by distinguished Canadians, and acted by a distinguished audience. Sir Ernest, Arthur Meighen, occupied the chair, and introduced Sir Ernest.

Reached Goal

Followed a trip of much hardship through the 800 miles of Antarctic sea to South Georgia, where help might be expected. The party, after sixteen days reached the goal but on the wrong side and crossed it on foot. Arriving at the whaling station, assistance was secured, and first through the co-operation of the Uruguayan government, and later the government and navy of Chile, the party left behind was rescued.

Local News

The government policeman, who patrols the countryside, visited the cottages on Friday afternoon, when all was in good order, but on Saturday Mr. Waring found his cottage badly damaged.

MONUMENT TO ISABEL. Mexico City, Feb. 18.—(Associated Press)—A monument dedicated to Queen Isabel of Spain who materially aided Christopher Columbus in his search for a new world, may be erected here. The movement was launched at a recent banquet of bankers and merchants.

A similar monument to Hernando Cortes, the intrepid Spaniard who conquered Mexico from the Aztecs, was suggested but the idea was not enthusiastically received.

It is hoped to unveil the monument to the Queen at the time of centenary of Mexico's independence next year.

A FAREWELL GIFT. The Bonnie Doon Club of Knox church chose a very pleasant way of honoring Miss Mary Murray, who is about to leave the city shortly. On Saturday afternoon for her enjoyment it arranged a tobogganing party in the park, which was followed by a party at the club.

During the evening a silver scallop dish was presented to Miss Murray by Miss Ethel Armstrong, the president of the club, on behalf of all the members. All good wishes for her future happiness were expressed to Miss Murray and a jolly theatre party wound up the entertainment.

RECTOR OF ST. JOHN'S RESIGNS

Announcement in Stone Church Yesterday—Other News of the Churches.

Announcement was made in St. John's (Stone) church yesterday morning that Rev. Canon G. A. Kuhring, who has been the rector of the church for the last sixteen years, had tendered his resignation and that it had been accepted by His Lordship Bishop Richardson. The announcement was contained in a letter from the bishop which was read after sermon by the Ven. Archdeacon H. A. Crowfoot, who conducted the morning service in Stone church. In the letter Bishop Richardson commended highly the good work done by Canon Kuhring in the parish, regretted his decision to leave and said that arrangements would be made to fill the vacancy on June 1 or September 1.

A short time ago Canon Kuhring sent his formal resignation to Bishop Richardson, announcing that it was final and would not be reconsidered. The bishop placed the matter before a conference of the vestry of the church and the final notice of acceptance was read yesterday.

Very many friends will hear with sincere regret the word of the removal of Canon Kuhring from St. John's. Canon Kuhring has been one of the most prominent of local clergymen and especially active in all matters looking toward the betterment of social and religious conditions. He went overseas as an army chaplain and served with conspicuous success in Gallipoli and in France. He is an active member of the G. W. V. A. and has been a true friend of women's work in the city and an ardent social worker. She was instrumental in organizing the local branch of V. A. D.'s which have rendered valuable service at home and overseas and was for several years president of the Women's Canadian Club. She is also one of the leaders in the Diocesan W. A.

The Value of Birds. (Ottawa Journal) The movement for increasing the bird population of the country is attracting additional support each year in the cities and towns, where appreciation of bird life is increasing. Many people are now making a study of birds and are encouraging them to spend the summers near their homes by providing nesting and other accommodations for them. But it is even more important for the farmer to protect and encourage the birds. Recognition of this is seen in the interest of agricultural colleges and government officials in the matter. The students of Macdonald College, Montreal, for instance, were given a lecture on the subject of birds and their usefulness the other day by the federal migratory bird officer for Ontario and Quebec, Harrison F. Lewis. It was at St. Michael's also on December 30, 1816, that Shelley was married to Mary Godwin.





Armstrong in the presence of a few intimate friends. The wedding was quiet on account of the death of the bride's father. Wm. Gilchrist gave the bride away. She was attended by Miss Edith Nason, and the groom was supported by Henry Mercer. Mr. and Mrs. Clarke will reside in Calgary.

MAXIM THIBEDEAU
In this city on Sunday, after a lingering illness, Maxim Thibedeau passed away in the seventy-fifth year of his age, leaving to mourn his wife, Mary, two daughters, two sons and one brother. The daughters are Mrs. Edie White, of West Virginia, and Mrs. Thomas Wood of Everett, Mass. The sons are Joseph of Nova Scotia, and George of the west side. The funeral will be from his son's residence, 95 Union street, to the Church of Assumption on Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock for high mass of requiem. Interment will be made in the Holy Cross cemetery.

LOCAL BUILDING
According to the report of James Carleton, city building inspector, only one permit for new construction was issued here during February. This was for a hall to be erected in Bruden street by Howard Holder, value \$3,000. Last year, for the same period, the value of permits was \$80,000. Nine permits for repairs and alterations were issued during the month just closed, with a nominal value of \$4,500, compared with four permits last year, valued at \$2,000. The repairs in two cases consisted of the construction of internal stairways and the others were for minor alterations and necessary upkeep. STEEVES CASE IS RESUMED

Moncton Doctor, on Stand This Morning, Told of Post-Mortem.

Moncton, N. B., Feb. 28.—The preliminary hearing in the case of O. Galus Steeves, in the Niagara Road tragedy, was continued at Coverdale today. Dr. R. L. Botsford of Moncton said he was instructed to make a post mortem examination on six bodies. He performed a post mortem on four—Mrs. Lucy Steeves, Beatrice, Emerson and Wetmore. "I removed from four bodies the organs which could be removed. Part of the skull was on one; the rest were headless. It would be impossible to tell of any abrasions on them. They were charred. The limbs were burned off—shapeless masses." He said that the organs were sent to a government analyst, M. V. Paddock, St. John. He also sent a dark brown substance to be examined for blood. The witness received this on the 17th. He said that he could not determine death by the condition of the bodies.

MONTREAL STOCK EXCHANGE
Montreal, Feb. 28.—The local stock exchange was only moderately active during the early trading this morning, but throughout strong. Abitibi went up a half point to 46. Atlantic Sugar remained unchanged at 81. Brompton, however, was the feature of the first half hour, rising from 36 1/2 to 39. Dominion Steel was up a half at 47. Breweries and Spanish River were steady at 69 and 74 respectively.

BIG FIRE AT MORRIS PLANT
Rest St. Louis, Ills., Feb. 28.—Fire yesterday caused damage estimated at \$500,000 to the plant of Morris & Company, packers, at the National Stock Yards, just north of here. It was said about 2,000 men will be thrown out of employment.


