



TURKS WIPE OUT GREEK SUBJECTS

Thousands Succumb to Famine Cold and D.sease - Stamping Out Christianity

Washington, May 15—Systematic efforts by the Turks to destroy Hellenism in Turkey are reported to the Greek legation here in despatches from Athens. Turkish prisoners arriving at Salonica, the despatches say, declare Greek civilization in Turkey has received its hardest blow since the Mohammedans took Constantinople in 1453.

Since the end of 1917 more than 200,000 Greeks have been impressed into the Turkish army, and great numbers are said to have succumbed to abuse, famine, cold and sickness. More than a million and a half of the Greek population has been taken from Thrace to Asia Minor. The entire population of Greek villages have been killed or carried away. In some instances half of those deported are said to have been killed or to have died through ill-treatment.
