SENTENCE IS SIX MONTHS IN PRISON Picture-Slashing Suffragette Quickly Dealt With SAYS ACT PREMEDITATED

She Has Been on Hunger Strike Since Her Arrest—Dr. Anna Shaw Deplores Militant Acts as Injuring Cause

(Canadian Press) London, March 12.—Miss Richardson, a militant suffragette, who hatched a celebrated Voltaire picture known as the Rokeby Venus, in the National Gallery, was today sentenced to six months imprisonment for her crime. The case against Miss Richardson was disposed of in record time. She was arrested on March 10, taken to the Bow Street police court and committed for trial by the magistrate on the same day. The grand jury yesterday returned a true bill against her, and today she was tried and convicted by a jury at the London sessions at the Old Bailey. The public prosecutor, in addressing the jury on behalf of the government, said that one might well doubt whether the prisoner was in her right senses. There was, however, no medical evidence to show that she was a person not responsible for her actions. Miss Richardson, who had been on a "hunger strike" since her arrest, in reply to the charge, said it had been premeditated and she pleaded guilty. Thelma Abbey Witness. BRITISH TRAINING SHIP AFIRE; PERFECT DISCIPLINE SAVES BOYS

Two Liners in Today With 755 Passengers Lake Manitoba and the Victorian; St. John People Return From Old Country

(Canadian Press) London, Eng., March 12.—The training ship Wellesley, one of the last of England's old time wooden warships, was burned last night in Shields harbor. Only a few of the 800 boys on board were injured. One of the lads made a dash through the smoke and rescued the captain's baby. Perfect discipline alone prevented a terrible disaster. The Lake Manitoba, Captain G. C. Evans, docked at No. 1 berth at 10 o'clock with 123 second cabin and 188 third class passengers and between 5,000 and 6,000 tons of general freight. She left Liverpool on Friday, February 27, for the southern route. The Manitoba had a fair passage all the way, except for a rather choppy sea on Saturday, but nothing out of the ordinary. BETTER AND CHEAPER SCHOOL BOOKS FOR P. E. ISLAND PUPILS

(Canadian Press) London, March 12.—Premier Asquith announced in the House of Commons today that on Monday he would make a general statement in regard to the government's proposals on home rule for Ireland. Members of parliament are still devoting themselves single-mindedly to the consideration of the many aspects of the new Irish question. Every other topic, has sunk into insignificance, and the smaller occupations which ordinarily interest the life of the average member are all laid on one side. Everyone at Westminster is pre-occupied with the many phases of the Irish situation created by Monday's debate, and naturally yesterday's visit of the Nationalist leader to Lloyd George at No. 11 Downing street, is being keenly discussed. The activities of the chancellor of the exchequer in the recent private negotiations between the government and Mr. Redmond is a matter of notoriety, and that there is some hope for a settlement is common knowledge. The breakfast party yesterday, which is attributed to Premier Asquith's offer to call an Ulster conference if only the time limit be dropped. In this, however, there is reason to believe that he has failed, as Mr. Redmond is too much afraid of Irish criticism to do so, but the resources of Lloyd George's diplomacy are not exhausted. In spite of his efforts, however, the belief is now that the negotiations for further concessions will fail; that the bill will pass as it stands and a general election will follow, probably in July. The Limit Reached. New York, March 12.—London special to the World says: The home rule situation continues to absorb all political interests. The Irish leader assured your correspondent in the House of Commons last night that Premier Asquith's proposal of Monday represented the utmost limit of any concession to which he would go, and that the government's attitude was now adjustment to all further concessions or modification. The opposition at present declares it is impossible to accept the proffered concessions, so a deadlock has been reached for the present. "The government intends now to proceed with the home rule bill, leaving it to the opposition to decide whether they will have the bill with or without the Asquith county plebiscite scheme."

PINDER'S STUMPAGE BILL PAID FEB. 26

House Learns That Valley Railway Bond Guarantees to Date is \$2,725,573

In reply to an inquiry by Mr. Duval asking if a statement in the Federation of February 12 had J. J. READY TO ADVANCE AGAINST TORREON

Willa May Give the Word At Any Time MEXICO CITY CUT OFF

(Canadian Press) Chihuahua, Mex., March 12.—Torreón, which is ready for the advance on Torreón, General Francisco Villa declared last night, after witnessing a review of the auxiliary corps. "I will soon order the advance. We have food for thirty days, ammunition for fifteen days of fighting, unless the cartridges are wasted, and the wheat supply problem in the vicinity of Torreón, which has given us some concern, has been solved. The rebel leader said he would leave a garrison of about 600 men in this city. Conditions along the east coast of Mexico were summarized today by Rear Admiral Fletcher in the following report to the navy department: "Rear Admiral Mayo reports from Tampico that Federal troops in that vicinity are concentrated at Tampico and Donnacona; no news of the Constitutionalists, no alarm at Tampico. Conditions in the 'Hermosillo' Cracola is a British Admiral. Mexico City, March 12.—Communication with Torreón has been cut. The capital has no exact advices of developments there, though it is known that there has been light fighting to the north, and that a large force of rebels is said to be approaching Torreón from the west. A rebel attack on Tampico is expected at any time. An insignificant movement in one of the barracks here, was suppressed today. Three conspirators were arrested. Mexico City, Mex., March 12.—Adolfo de La Lanza, minister of finance, in a formal statement today announced the government's definite abandonment of its idea of a stock exchange. No substitute scheme for the bank was announced, but he said the patriotism of Mexico insured the success of the government, being raised. Washington, D. C., March 12.—Two more regiments of United States troops were moving to join the Mexican border patrol today. Two battalions of the 9th Infantry at Fort Thomas, Ky., and Fort Logan, Ill., were ordered to move to the border. The 17th Infantry at Fort McPherson, Ga., were loading baggage trains and assembling field equipment to move to Laredo and Eagle Pass, to become part of a military force in the State of Texas.

labor party candidate at parliamentary elections.
"We aim at supplying the need of a central electoral machine which in conjunction with other local government associations will produce a party of women which will be so strong that it can approach party agents before a vacancy is declared and insist that a suitable woman candidate shall run on party lines. Failing this, our policy would be to force a three-cornered election on lines which would be most likely to succeed. In any case, we should ask the men candidates to accept our programme where we are not running independent candidates.
"It will be the first time that a fair political bargain will be offered without the care of children and domestic economies will be asking their votes in order to advance their interests. This is the human political party, not the machine dominated by official whips and voting mechanically, but a group of intelligent women working for London.
"We claim that in certain well-defined regions of practical municipal politics women must necessarily be the expert. The home is her sphere. She cannot leave it, and therefore must make it as perfect as possible and in order that the homes of the people may have the best expert brains employed in their government we have formed our party of practical political specialists with a clear, definite programme of work."

"Among the cities of 100,000 population or over, in which many deaths occur in hospitals to which patients are brought for treatment, Albany has the highest death rate, 122.8 and Boston the second, with 111.2, and curiously enough Cambridge ranks fifth in a death rate of 104.
"A large percentage of cancer cases can be cured if taken early or under the most favorable conditions. There is no specific cure, but we have a large number of curative agents, which, if applied in conjunction with surgery, will cure a greater percentage of cases than ever before, and prevent a recurrence of cancer after it has been removed.
"Massachusetts should have an active board to handle the distribution of radioactive materials whenever an enlightened state government or a national government can provide them. We should have a place or places in which all cancer victims desiring treatment may be tried out, and those responding to the treatment that we know should be given the full benefit of the best in the world.
"Dr. Francis J. Hanley, of Whitman, high medical examiner of the Massachusetts Cancer Order, of Foresters, called attention to the result from death rate in fraternal organizations, and these are risks selected by medical examination.
"Dr. Donoghue went before the committee men armed with several thousand dollars worth of radium, other chemicals and apparatus illustrative of the modern treatment of cancer.
"Dr. Horace Packard and Dr. Francis J. Hanley also favored the resolve, to which there was no opposition.

GOVERNMENT IS VERY GENEROUS TO THE CONTRACTORS

Gives One Three Times The Amount of His Tender—Comment on Norton Griffiths' Contract

Ottawa, March 11.—In a report tabled by Hon. Dr. Reid in commons today it was seen that the present government should share some of the condemnation of the Gutelius-Stanton report as regards changed contract prices, and sub-letting contracts. An instance of this is found in the case of a contract for excavating for the St. Malo shops in connection with the N. T. R., at Quebec, where the price was raised 300 per cent. The original price was 65 cents for excavating, per cubic yard, while by order-in-council the contractor was allowed to proceed with the work at \$2.50 making a difference of \$3,600 in the cost. Had this occurred under the old government the Stanton-Gutelius commission would undoubtedly have checked the amount up to "waste."

Another and still more striking contrast between present and practice under the former administration, is seen in the remarkable instance of sub-letting in connection with the \$10,000,000 contract awarded to the Norton Griffiths Company for the terminal and harbor work at Courtenay Bay, St. John. The contract price for rock excavation allowed by the government was \$2.80 per cubic yard. The company sublet this to the Courtenay Construction Company for \$117 per cubic yard. According to Messrs. Gutelius and Lynch-Staunton this would represent "a raise-off" of over 100 per cent. for the main contractors. It will be remembered that in the case of sub-letting on the N. T. R., a ten per cent. "raise-off" was regarded as scandalous.

It appears that the sub-contractors at Courtenay Bay thought that they were getting too much of the short end of the deal, and appealed to the government here to compel a higher price for them. Finally, the Norton Griffiths Company is said to have bought up the Courtenay Construction Company and to be doing the work under other arrangements.



TRIBUTES TO MEMORY OF LATE SHERIFF

Large Attendance at Funeral - Resolution of County Council - Rev. Mr. Cody Speaks of Mr. deForest's Life as Exemplary in Church, Business and Home

Many prominent citizens gathered today to pay a last tribute of respect to the late Stephen S. deForest, High Sheriff of St. John city and county, whose funeral was held from St. James' church at three o'clock this afternoon. A private service was held at his late residence, 48 Haverhill street, after which the body was taken to St. James' church where the funeral service was conducted by Rev. H. A. Cody. The hymn, "On the Resurrection Morning" was sung by the choir as the body was taken into the church. "Rock of Ages" was sung during the service, and at the close the choir sang "Now the Laborer's Task is O'er."

The procession formed at the church door and included many business and professional men and others in all walks of life. The members of the county council attended in a body. Interment took place in Fernhill.

The casket was covered with many beautiful floral tributes. Among them were a wreath of roses, carnations and lilies of the valley bearing the city coat of arms; a standing cross of roses from the congregation of St. James' church, where Mr. deForest was a worshipper for eleven years; a wreath of roses, carnations and lilies of the valley from St. James' choir; a wreath of roses and violets from the municipal council, and a crescent of roses and carnations from the members of the Sheriff's staff. There were also a large number of flowers from friends of the family.

His Life Exemplary

Rev. Mr. Cody spoke from Proverbs 10:1: "The memory of the just is blessed." He said:

The wise man of old knew whereof he spoke when he uttered those words. He understood much about life. He realized what it meant to lose friends. But when our friends and loved ones pass to that great silent bourne how good it is to have their memory surrounding us like a benediction. For a while the mad fever of life is washed, and the heart grows strong and calm.

Only such a memory comes to us today as we gather here to pay our last tribute of respect to one of St. John's worthiest sons. His memory is blessed, for his life we believe was just and upright. The true strength of his character was not in his wealth nor his industries, but in men such as Stephen deForest ever proved himself to be. He means much in the world of business to ring true to a high ideal like Sir Galahad of old, and to wear the "white mantle of heaven" life amidst the stress of keen competition. And yet as far as we know he did it. There is no doubt that his asceticism, no dishonor upon his name, and none poorer because he lived. During the last three years he occupied a very important office in this city. This position he greeted with that humility, courage, tactfulness and simplicity which so characterized his whole life. Years ago a great poet sent forth a pathetic and beautiful cry:

"Oh God, for a man with heart, head, hand, Like some of the simple great ones gone forever and ever by;
One still strong man in a blizzard land, Whatever you call him what care I— Aristocrat, democrat, autocrat—one Who can rule and dare not lie."

You do find such men. Our city has produced them, and we are with us today, but one is not, for God's finger touched him, and he slept.

Resolved, that the council of the Municipality of the City and County of Saint John, as a mark of their esteem attend Saint James Church in the City of Saint John, at three o'clock on Thursday, the twelfth day of March, 1914, and further

Resolved, that this council mourn the death of so estimable a citizen and worthy official, the more so because of the many years of usefulness which apparently awaited him; and further

Resolved, that the members of this council extend their deep sympathy to the widow and family, and a copy of this resolution be forwarded to his family.
