



Already Kitchener is following in another direction in Napoleon's footsteps. He ordered a road to be made between Cairo and Alexandria, and now it is anounced on no less an authority than the under-secretary of state for public works, he is studying a plan for covering Egypt with a complete series of main roads.

These will be undertaken by the government itself, while the auxiliary ones will be laid by the provincial councils. This is a step which will give great satisfaction to everyone for, apart from the military standpoint, such a system of roads will be of immense commercial value, as it will open up districts that are latent through lack of communications; it will further develop others that are at present dependent solely either on the river of the railway for transport, and it will give the country an additional attraction in the eyes of the tourist, who at present
