

The Times has dwelt more than once upon the importance of taking agricultural education to the man on the farm. The agricultural colleges do a splendid work, but they are only attended by those who can afford it; and the number in attendance, in proportion to the number in attendance, in proportion to the number in attendance, in proportion to the number of young men engaged in farm work, is pitiably small. It is true that when a man who has attended the college and gained a knowledge of scientific farming returns to his home and puts in practice what he has learned, his farming is an object lesson to others, but unfortunately such object lessons do not appear to have the results which are desired. What is needed is to have an expert go down into the settlement and visit the farmers, encouraging them to demonstrate, under his instructions, the capabilities of their farms. This is done to a considerable extent in the provincial sanitarium. If the municipal council does not agree with the views of the site, it should take action on its work.
