"Gasoline engines should not be allowed to run with garage doors closed," he said. "An ordinary gasoline motor will generate sufficient carbon monoxide gas to asphyxiate an adult within five minutes, if operating in a closed garage, 10x10x20."

In applying aid to anyone overcome by carbon monoxide polsoning, it is pointed out that the rescuer should let the fresh air into the premises, or he too may be overcome. "When a man is overcome by gas, remove him to the fresh air quickly and send for a doctor. In the meantime, keep him comfortably warm and do not allow him to become chilled keep him warm at all times. A chill may cause a strain on his already weakened condition and may cause pneumonia or death.

"If the patient is even slightly gassed, he should not be allowed to make any exertion. If he must be moved, carry him. Keep the patient lying down. To walk him around may injure his heart or even kill him. Keep him quiet.

"If patient is unconscious, place him

him quiet.

"If patient is unconscious, place him prone, (on the floor face downwards); this will help to keep his tongue out of his throat. If he is not breathing, or if his breathing stops, start prone pressure method of artificial respiration at once. After consciousness returns, turn him on his back, if more comfortable, but keep him lying down for at least six hours."
