

# EIGHTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE HAVEN, AND PRISON GATE MISSION.

"For the love of Christ constraineth us."-2 Cor. v. 14.

" For love's sake."-Philemon 9.

"Freely ye have received, freely give."-Matt. x. 8.

Paul, inspired by the Spirit of God, and writing in apostolic times, makes this remarkable statement: "Now abideth faith, hope and love; but the greatest of these is love." A distinguished Christian writer of our own day gives us, in the following words, the conclusion he had reached, after a life-long experience and study of great truths: "I do not distinguish one from another merely by the difference in their thought power; still less do I distinguish them by the difference in their executive power. There must be a deeper gauge than these. Still less do I distinguish them by external differences, as where one is high and another is low; where one is rich and another is poor, where one is wise and another is unwise. The point where true manhood or womanhood resides is in the neighborhood of love. In the copiousness, the variety, the endlessness, the sweetness and the purity of the element of love, you shall find the measure that God applies discriminating between one and another."

Our blessed Lord, in correcting the false impressions of the Jews, in His Sermon on the Mount, and in making a practical application of this truth concerning love, says with a definiteness and distinctness that resounds through the ages: "But I say unto you, love your enemies...

. . that ye may be the children of your Father which is in heaven.

For if ye love them which love you, what thank have ye?"

In summing up our records at the close of the year, as rescue workers, we speak with humility and tenderness of our work as a "labor of love," and we rejoice that the privilege of loving the fallen and the unfortunate has been given to us. Truly, neither man nor woman an seek and try to save the lost, the unfortunate, t'e abandoned, without having the soul aflame with love—love to God and mankind. And when we say love, we mean that grace of the Spirit described by Paul in his letter to the Corinthians: "Love suffereth long, and is kind; love envieth not; love vaunteth not itself, is not puffed up. Doth not behave itself unseemly, seeketh not her own, is not easily provoked, thinketh no evil; rejoiceth not in iniquity, but rejoiceth in the truth; beareth all things, believeth all things, hopeth all things, endureth all things."

The work of rescuing lost women, especially, is difficult, often discouraging, frequently unsuccessful, wearing to brain and heart, and always taxing the patience as no other service does; and yet, standing in the light of God's great love to us, we rejoice that we have been counted worthy to be coworkers with Him who came to seek and to save the lost, who came not to be ministered unto, but to minister, who came to give His life as a ransom for the chief of sinners.

This has been in some respects a quiet and uneventful year, and yet in other ways, our experiences have been remarkable, abundantly and generally encouraging, occasionally the reverse. Let us look for a little while at the lights and the shadows, and learn the lessons our blessed Master wishes to teach us, through these varying experiences. As day

has succeeded day, wherein have we been encouraged?

(t) Financially, we have been blessed. The various departments of our Institution cannot be carried on without means, and this our Heavenly Father, the Lord of heaven and earth, has bountifully provided. Our Government grant has been increased from 2 cents per capita, per diem, to the sum of 7 cents per capita, per day, making our income this year about \$1700. As a committee, we desire to express thus publicly our thanks to Hon. J. M. Gibson, to Dr. Chamberlain and others, for this timely recognition of the good work done in our Institution.

(2) Our City grant has been arranged upon a more permanent and systematic basis. Instead of receiving aid from the City Council at the rate of 2 cents per capita, per diem, we are paid at the rate of \$7.50 per month for all city cases sent to us by the Relief officer appointed by the Council. At this rate of remuneration our City grant this year amounts to the sum of \$1.400. For this just and helpful arrangement we are indebted to Ald. Shaw, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the City Council, 1895, and to the Mayor and Board of Control for 1896.

(3) Prejudices are being gradually removed from the minds of our benevolent citizens. As an evidence of this, we mention the fact, that our lady collectors meet with increasing sympathy, practically expressed, when they make their yearly visits to business establishments, houses of

citizens, etc.

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(4) Our Industrial work, especially the Laundry department, is well patronized and has prospered, the receipts this year being more than any previous year. Regular employment is a strong element, we believe, in the work of reformation, and we are grateful for the large amount of patronage received.

(5) We have been able this year to pay off the mortgage of \$500, held by the late H. A. Massey and the Hon. S. H. Blake, on the building. Thus relieved of the floating debt, our indebtedness on the building is \$15,500, being the amount of the mortgage held by the Widmer estate.

(6) Our inmates have remained with us for longer periods this year, than in the past. This is to us a matter of satisfaction, as probably the greatest hindrance to our work is the constant re-appearance of "old cases."

(7) The religious services in the institution have been nobly sustained, by a devoted band of workers, who never relax their earnest efforts, for the spiritual development of the members of our large household.

(8) The gratitude of inmates who have received shelter, assistance and sympathy in the past, is very inspiring. Very numerous are the letters received from former inmates, expressing in-most touching terms, sincere thanks for a helping hand, or a kind word in the time of trial or sore need.

(9) As a Committee, we are very happy in being able to retain the services of our entire staff, and we gladly place on record our high appreciation of the important work, so perseveringly, so faithfully, and so graciously rendered by our Superintendent and her co workers.

For a moment we glance at the reverse side, and ask, what are our

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discouragements?

(1) The constant re-appearance of what we call "old cases."

Surely it is discouraging to lift up and set upon her feet, or in other words, provide with a good situation, one of the inebriate class, to find in two or three weeks, or a month, that she is down again, seeking re-admission to the institution, a little lower in the scale of moralty than before. Every time there is failure to stand, the will is a little weaker, and more powerless to resist temptation in the future, and we mourn over the lives thus wrecked and stranded.

(2) Another discouragement is the slowness of those long accustomed to a life of vice and crime, to grasp moral and spiritual truth, and apply it to their lives. Truly, it is line upon line, precept upon precept, here a little, and there a little.

(3) The resignation of Mrs. Harvie, who has been our honored President during many years of toil, trial and discouragement, was a source of sorrow and anxiety. Her rare administrative power, good judgment and ready tact made her place hard to fill. We cannot give better expression to our thoughts and feelings than by inserting here the address presented to her by the Board of Management, when her duties as our President ceased.

#### To Mrs. L. J. Harvie, President :-

We, the officers and members of the Haven and Prison Gate Mission, Board of Management, desire to express and to place upon record, our grateful appreciation of the admirable and efficient manner in which your duties as our President have been performed.

During sixteen years of very varied experiences—times of sunshine and hours of shadow—your wisdom and syn-pathy and your firm hand have guided us safely through many a strait, and over many a sand-bar. Your thorough knowledge of the work in all its phases, from its inception until the present hour of comparative

prosperity, your fidelity to its best interests, your ability and gracious courtesy, have bound you to our hearts with the three-fold cord, of admiration, esteem and less.

Our best wishes go with you to your new work, and we pray that in its special duties, you may be sustained, as you have been here, by the gracious presence of the Master, and by and by receive from his own hand, the reward of service well done.

The thought running through the whole address must have conveyed to her mind the blessed

truth, that her labor has not been in vain the Lord.

At the close of the year another discouragement came to us, when because of her husband's prolonged illness, Mrs. Hastings, our long-tried, faithful friend, and efficient Treasurer, was obliged to resign. Her loss will be keenly felt because of her sweet Christian spirit and strong faith, as well as her marked official capability. Her place will be taken by Mrs. Lorimar, whose energetic discharge of secretarial duties during the past year gives promise of equal energy and faithfulness in her new position. The Secretary's chair is now vacant, but Mrs. O'Brien, our first Vice-President, has kindly consented to fill the vacancy until a suitable appointment can be made.

We have been very highly favored in our choice of a new President, Mrs. McClelland, for many years and still a prominent worker in the W. F. M. Society of the Presbyterian Church, and also in the W. C. T. Union, was unanimously elected, and has kindly consented to accept the office.

We look for good results from her able leadership.

Sincere and hearty thanks are given to the many friends who have in so many ways contributed to the success of our work. Even the smallest and humblest gift has been accepted in the spirit in which it was given,

and will assuredly receive a reward.

In closing, we cannot but notice how numerous have been our blessings, and how few comparatively our difficulties and discouragements, and we turn our faces hopefully to the new year, more anxious than ever to give to our suffering sisters of the fullness we have received.

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### SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

"To set at liberty them that are bruised."-Luke iv: 18. "They that sow in tears shall reap in joy."-Psa. cxxvi: 5.

This beautiful work of loosing from the fetters of sinful habits our wronged and neglected sisters is our work; and this gracious assurance that, like God's rainbow of promise, spans our sky, and reflects, even through our tears of sadness and discouragement, the radiant brightness of the Saviour's love, speaks to us of the joy that awaits those who share in the Master's travall of soul over earth's lost and erring ones.

On the threshold of the new institution year we are compelled to pause and answer many and solemn heart questionings. For whom has the work been done? Have we done it faithfully and unselfishly, with a single eye to God's glory? Have we ourselves been growing in grace and spiritual power? Has the work of the Lord prospered in our hands? And if some good has been done, and if some precious ones have been led to seek a new heart and to lead a new life, why not more? As we look back, and around, and forward there would come to us a crushing sense of inefficiency and of failure, but for the cheering power of that gracious promise, "In due season ye shall reap if ye faint not."

"To set at liberty them that are bruised." This is Christ's own work delegated to us. But what a picture! What a photograph, in a word, of our poor women and girls! "Them that are bruised." Six hundred and thirty-two, including eighty-four little children, have come to us during the year. We can easily count their numbers and recall their names and faces, but who shall count for us the weary strife against poverty, the long, hard struggles against the cruel fires of fierce temptation, the pitiful protests against sorrow and pain and the anguish of loneliness ere ever the path of sin was entered; and then the soul-writhings of remorse, desolation and despair. Bruised indeed they are, aye torn and bleeding, and only the Good Physician can bring to them the blessed, blood-bought healing that is needed. "None but Jesus can do these helpless sinners good;" but we to whom He has said, "Go work among the fallen and perishing, by the hedges and in the dark corners of my vineyard," have the privilege of bringing each of these bruised ones within the charmed circle of helpful Christian influence, where she can learn of her Heavenly Father's love, and of His mighty power to save; and where she can feel the reflected sweetness of that love in the kindness of those We have not had so many admissions this year as we had last, but we have seemed to be more crowded because larger numbers have stayed for longer periods. In many cases this was a hopeful sign, giving evidence of a desire to be protected against themselves, and from the temptations to which their weakness exposed them. And who can tell just what it has meant to these shipwrecked voyagers on the ocean of life to be admitted into the brightness and warmth and comfort of this safe and quiet harbour? And when, along with kind consideration of physical needs and distresses, they have found themselves in an atmosphere of helpful, uplifting influences, we have rejoiced to think that they must of necessity have become convinced of the love of Christ, and of His gracious willingness to do them good. And even if we dare boast of no better results, is it not well that for weeks at a time, and in some instances for months, many of these weak and erring sisters have been sheltered from the ruder storms of life, and shielded from its fierce and pitiless temptations? Is it not well that when thus able to think rationally, and their hearts, long closed against the light, have been unlocked by the key of love, and opened to the sunshine of Heaven by the hand of Christian kindness, is it not well that they should be where the love of Jesus is the motive power, and where help and hope of better things, both for this life and the life to come, may be given them? But we "thank God and take courage," because good as this is, it is not all. We have reason to rejoice in the fact that our labor has not been in vain. Many who have come to us so bruised and beaten, that hope seemed well-nigh crushed, have thankfully grasped the truth, that even for them the Saviour's arms were opened wide, the Saviour's love was free, and have gone out from us, either to their own homes or to situations, strengthened and upheld by the knowledge that their sin and shame, however black and terrible, had not cut them off from God's mercy, nor from the love and sympathy of their friends in "The Haven." In all this our efforts have been ably supported by the many dear Christian workers, who have so faithfully and cheerfully filled the programme of religious services during the year. The Metropolitan Church Mission Band will miss, and so shall we, their energetic and gifted leader, Miss McGuffin, who has removed to another part of the city. But the large-hearted love for these poor, fallen sisters, which prompted her unwearied efforts, throbs also in the hearts of her successor and helpers. Our girls will not soon forget her bright and forceful addresses, her pleasant smile and the warm clasp of her hand. The Y. P. S. C. E. of Cooke's Church have not grown weary in well-doing, but continue to come regularly as the months go by; and the Epworth League of Bathurst St. Meth. Church have given us several delightful treats and entertainments A new and very pleasing addition to our list of services has been a regular monthly meeting conducted by the Royal Templars of Temperance. And I must make special mention also of the dear young friends from the China Inland Mission who have come every Sunday afternoon for Sunday School. To all of these our hearty thanks are most cordially given for their kind and efficient help; and not to these only, but to the many individual workers, who, often at great personal inconvenience and even sacrifice, have sustained the Haven services both on Sunday and weekday.

Again it is my privilege to mention with unstinted praise, the unwearied devotion to this blessed but most trying work of my dear

sister workers, Miss Fitzsimmons and Mrs. Canfield. Efficient, loyal, true-hearted and sympathetic under every phase of their wonderfully varied duties, they have proved themselves to be helpmates in the best and truest sense. And those who, under them, help to carry on the industrial work of the house and care for the children, also deserve recognition.

To the ladies of the Committee who have granted me their hearty support, and who, by kind and ready sympathy, have smoothed many a bit of the rougher pathway, I take this opportunity of expressing my very earnest thanks. As an institution we have had special freedom from sickness, and this we continue to attribute, under God's blessing, to the ever-ready exercise of care and skill on the part of our kind medical advisers, Dr. Stowe Gullen and Dr. J. B. Gullen. Only one baby out of our ninety-five died during the year; and this poor little creature was brought to us in a dying condition. The whooping-cough has seized four of our babies,

but we hope to win them back to health and strength.

Our industrial departments deserve more than a passing notice, were we thinking of them merely as educating and training influences. The sewing-room has no returns for the Treasurer, but it has paid its own way, and has furnished small supplies to the house, and many a needed garment, besides teaching our girls and women to sew and to mend their own clothes with neatness and care. The laundry has not only sustained its well-earned reputation for first-class work, but has made a short step forward in the balance paid the Treasurer. This industry is a great boon to the institution, for above and beyond its monied returns, since it gives employment to a class of women who, as a rule, do not know how to sew. and do not care to learn, but who are active and strong and willing to work. They are, in this way, uplifted above any sense of pauperism, and may thus retain their self-respect and the respect of those who know their capable and willing service. These good workers have been greatly encouraged in their efforts by the kind personal interest manifested by so many of the dear friends who hold meetings. We thank the Templars, Mr. Frogley and others for gifts which may seem small in themselves, but they mean much to those who have so little.

One of the most happy events of the year, from the inmates point of view, was their presentation to Mrs. Harvie of a travelling satchel, and an address in which was expressed their love for her, and their gratitude to her for her loving efforts on their behalf through all the years.

And now, as I close this brief record of our year's labors, a record that can never give more than the merest bird's-eye view of what we have done and what we have aimed at doing, I must devoutly thank God for His help and blessing. "The joy of the Lord has indeed been our strength," and, knowing that His presence will go with us, we do not hesitate to go forward.

# CONSTITUTION

OF

# The Baven and Prison Gate Mission.

I.

The Institution shall be called "THE HAVEN AND PRISON GATE MISSION."

II

The object of the Mission shall be, intermediate reformatory work, the visiting of the Gaol, the meeting of female prisoners on the morning of discharge, and the maintenance of a home for the shelter of friendless and fallen women.

#### III

The management of the Prison Gate Mission and Haven shall be vested in a committee of ladies, known as the Board of Management. The said Board of Management shall elect annually from among themselves, a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a Necretary, and appoint all Sub-Committees.

#### IV

An Advisory Board of gentlemen shall be elected at the annual business meeting, and shall be consulted in all matters referring to the building and the important alterations and repairing thereof, also in the investment of the funds.

#### V.

The Board of Managers shall meet weekly for the transaction of all business. The annual meeting for the election of officers shall be held on the first Wednesday of October, at which annual meeting a report of the preceding twelve months shall be submitted, and arrangements made for the annual public meeting.

#### VI.

The funds necessary for the support of this Institution shall be procured from Government, County and City grants, annual subscriptions, donations, collections, and bequests, etc.

### VII.

In electing new members to the Board of Management, one month's notice in writing shall be given at one of the weekly meetings, in which notice shall be set forth the name and residence of the lady proposed.

#### VIII.

The Board of Management shall have power to alter and amend the Constitution, By-laws and Rules, provided one month's notice shall be given in writing, settirg forth the alteration or amendment proposed, but no such alteration or amendment shall be made unless the same shall be carried by a vote of two-thirds of the members of the Board of Management.

# GENERAL RULES.

1.

The regular meetings of the Board of Management shall be held on Wednesday, at half-past ten a.m. Special meetings may be called by the Secretary, upon the order of the President, or at the request of any three members, at such other place and time as may be ordered.

H

All meetings shall be opened with Scripture reading and prayer. Five members, of whom one shall be an officer, shall form a quorum at regular weekly meetings. The Presidents, or in her absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, or some one chosen by the meeting, shall preside. She shall sign the minutes of the preceding meeting, and shall propose and declare all resolutions, giving the casting vote in case of a tie.

III.

For the investment or disposal of the funds, or the sale of any of the property of the Institution, a quorum of nine members of the Board of Management, of whom three shall be officers, shall be necessary. But no such investment, or disposal, or stle, shall take place without the consent, in writing, of a majority of the Advisory Board.

IV.

The Secretary shall keep a record of all business, read the same at the following meeting, and inform the meeting of all correspondence connected with the work. She shall give notice of all special meetings, prepare an annual report of the progress and prospects of the Institution, and discharge the duties generally that pertain to the office.

V

The Treasurer shall receive all moneys for the use of the Institution, deposit the same in one of the chartered banks of the city; keep an accurate account of receipts and expenditures, and pay all accounts by cheques, on the order of the Board of Managers. She shall present a report on the first Wednesday of each month; prepare a statement showing receipts and expenditures during the year, to be submitted at the annual business meeting, said statement to be audited by some one appointed by the Board of Management.

VI.

The various departments of work shall be in charge of Sub-Committees, to consist of several members, and a report of each department shall be submitted upon the first Wednesday of each month.

VII.

When the Board shall have been called to order, all discussion shall be addressed to the chair, and only one member shall be allowed to speak at a time.

VIII.

Any member of the Board of Management absenting herself from twelve consecutive regular meetings, except from sickness or other unavoidable cause, shall thereupon cease to be a member of the Board of Management. Members unavoidably absent are requested to notify the Secretary.

### HOUSE RULES FOR BOARD.

I

The visitor for the week shall give a report every Wednesday. She shall interview all admissions, not departures, and temporarily absent in the hospitals. She shall read, pray, and converse with inmates, either individually or collectively, as she may deem proper. She shall have a general supervision of the household, and shall visit as frequently as possible. She shall confer with the Superintendent with regard to holding of religious services at the Haven.

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City cases awaiting admission to maternity hospitals shall not be received as regular inmates until they have procured a city pass.

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All maternity cases who are eligible for admittance to the Infants' Home shall be required to go there, unless some other provision for the mother and child, approved of by the Committee, has been made. Maternity cases not eligible for admission to the Infants' Home shall be arranged for by the Board of Management as soon as possible after admission.

IV

Former inmates having left their situations without proper cause, are not to be admitted, unless they report themselves immediately to the Matron or a member of the Committee, and shall not be retained as immates unless the Board of Management consider they had sufficient cause for leaving their situations.

V

Inmates incapable (through sickness, age, or infirmity) of employment, and not having friends, shall be transferred, as speedily as possible, to benevolent institutions in the city elsewhere.

VI.

When circumstances admit, innates shall be required to pay one dollar and a half a week for board; fifteen cents for lodging and breakfast. The admission of innates shall not, in any case, depend upon their ability to offer renuncration, and those able to pay are in no way excused from taking part in the work.

VII.

Infants shall not be adopted without the approx of of the Board of Management, and parties wishing to adopt must furnish references.

VIII.

Applicants sent with a written order by the Mayor, any member of the Council, minister, member of Board of Management, or other responsible person, shall be admitted, if the order be presented within a reasonable time after its issue, applicant to await the action of the Board of Management.

Note.—This condition is imposed to prevent persons decidedly intoxicated from expecting to be admitted; any one sending applicant will kindly mark the time in the note.

# RULES FOR SUPERINTENDENT, MATRONS AND INMATES.

#### I

It shall be the duty of the Superintendent to take charge of the household, receive visitors wishing to inspect the institution, and those applying for servants and charwomen, interview all applicants for admission, and friends of the inmates. Inspect all letters received by inmates, and control the behaviour of the inmates. In cases of insubordination, the Matrons shall appeal to her.

#### $\Pi$

The Superintendent shall take charge of all moneys brought into the Home by inmates, giving a receipt for the same, seep an accurate account of money paid out for board and other expenses, and submit said account to the Treasurer upon the first Wednesday of each month, and pay to her all money received for board during the foregoing month.

#### III.

The Superintendent shall admit all applicants, subject to the approval of the Board of Management.

#### IV

In mates regularly engaged in the work of the industrial departments, shall not be sent to situations or removed from the department, without the knowledge and consent of the Convener of the Sub-Committee in charge of that department.

#### V

The First Matron shall act in the absence of the Superintendent, have charge of the housekeeping, and the supervision of the maternity wing, and employ the inmates of said wing.

#### VI.

The Second Matron shall have charge of the Prison Gate wing and Laundry, and employ inmates of said wing.

A room in each wing of the building shall be set apart for use as a nursery, in which infants shall be kept separate from the rest of the inmates, during the hours of work; one or more women shall be placed in charge, and shall be responsible to the Superintendent for the proper discharge of her duties.

#### VIII.

Inmates shall rise at 6 o'clock. Breakfast shall be served at 7.30. Dinner at 12, and tea at 6 p.m. Morning prayers held at 8.15. Evening prayers at 7.30. Hour for retiring, 9.30. All inmates required to be present at prayers, and to attend the various services held in the Home.

#### 1X.

All inmates are required to assist in the industrial departments and household work, and refusing so to do shall not be retained as an inmate.

Χ.

When employment offers, any inmate capable of work, shall be required to accept it. The rate of wages to be agreed upon in the presence of the Superintendent and proposed employer.

The use of profane language strictly forbidden; a second offence to be reported to the Board of Management. Smoking not allowed.

VII

The infringement of any of the above rules improper behaviour, and insurbordination, if continued after remonstrance by the Matrons, Weekly Visitor, or any member of the Board of Management, shall render the offender liable to expulsion.

XIII.

Former inmates visiting the Haven shall report themselves at once to the Superintendent, and shall not be allowed to enter the industrial departments or dormitories, without special permission.
