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

HEALTH RULES FOR FALL RIVER SCHOOLS

A List of "Dont's" That Must

Be Observed in That City The Fall River Board of Health has adopted a stringent set of rules for observ-

Children with the following diseases must be kept from attendance:

With chicken-pox, until crusts are off.

With mumps, two weeks and longer it the glands are tender.

With whooping cough, while the child

With whooping cough, while the child whoops.

With German measles, for two weeks.

With measles until two weeks from the beginning of the sickness.

When there is measles in a family, children who have previously had it may be allowed in school. Those who have not had it must be excluded for two weeks from the beginning of the last case.

All children living in houses where there is diphtheria, scarlet fever or small pox must be excluded from school until they present a permit from the board of health. A set of rules also has been promulgated for the pupils and copies are to be pasted in every textbook in use, so that the importance of observing them will be impressed on the little ones at every turn. Among the rules referred to are the following:

Among the rules referred to are the following:

Do not spit if you can help it. Never spit on a slate, floor or sidewalk. Spitting promotes consumption and other diseases.

Do not put the fingers into the mouth.

Never lick your fingers when turning pages or when counting money.

Do not put pencils into the mouth or wet them with your lips.

Do not put money into your mouth.


Do not put anything into the mouth except food and drink.





COOK SAYS HE WILL SEND FOR ESKIMOS TO BACK HIM UP

Scientists for and Against Rival Claimants for North Pole Honors-Arctic Club Secretary in St. John Last Night Talks About the Situation.

New York, Sept. 8—The lie was hurled today concerning the discovery of the North Pole, and the foundation laid for a controversy unparalleled in history. Commander Robert E. Peary is making uncertain progress southward off the coast of Labrador, in his ship, the Roosevelt, but there came from him today a message as direct as his homeward journey has been slow. It challenges the veracity of Frederick A. Cook, of Brooklyn, and further complicates a situation which the whole world is discoussing.

In effect, Peary discredits Cook's claim with the intimation that he (Peary) and he alone planted the American flag at the North Pole on April 6, 1808, and that Dr. Cook, who asserts that he unfurled the flag at the pole on April 21, 1908, must substantiate his claim.

At Copenhagen Cook, shown his rival's statement tonight, stood by his guns, delined to enter into a debate and calmly asserted that his records would sustain him. To prove his right of discovery before the entire world beyond a shadow of doubt, he announced that he will despatch a ship to Greenland and bring to America his Eskimo companions. Then, with their testimony and his data, he declares that he will stand ready to face all detractors.

In the meantime Peary continues his homeward journey on the ice-scarred Roosevelt, and is tonight at Battle Harbor, Labrador, still more than 400 miles from North Sydney (C. B.), the objective of the homeward cruise through the Strait of Belle Isle.


