Lake Settlement Still Threatened by Forest Fires and Inhabitants

Fear the Worst.

DULUTH, Minn.. Sept. 11.—While on cititons in the region of forest fires north of Duluth are threatening to night, no actual damage to habitations has resulted and the residents are hoping for a change in wind or a rain.

No rain has fallen in this region since July 19 and everything in the woods is as alry as parchment. Many valuable tracts of pine have already been devastated by the flames and this evening the walls of fire with a land wind behind them are eating their way towards the settlements along the north shore of Lake Superior.

The inhabitants of the region are gathered along the shore, praying for rain, but prepared to take to the lake in small raft should the worst come. Within less than two miles of Grand Marais there is at present in flames a track of spruce and brush over three miles in length. A strong land breeze from the northwest is shooting the fire along the outskirts of, the town, giving the village a lease of life.

Grand Marais has no system of waterworks and the tewn is without any fire protection with the exception of two chemical engines.

Conditions at the Pigeon River Intia in reservation, Big Bay, Chicago Bay, Cascade, Cofton and Nutson are similar to those existing at Grand Marais. All of them are likely to be wiped off the map.



# BRING SUIT FOR DIVORCE

Former Gets Wind of Wife's Intentions and Gets There First

BUT SHE'S READY NOW WITH HER SUIT

Mrs. Currey Talks at Length to Sun-Declares Husband's Sister First Cause of Trouble

Dr. L. A. Currey has filed a libel for divorce a mensa et thoro and judicial separation from his wife and custody of his children. Mrs. Currey will file a counter suit against him at once.

Dr. Currey has filed libel on the grounds of ungovernable temper, violence, striking the plaintiff, kicking him, throwing things at his head, and also neglecting her household, publishing untruthful scandals, unbelief in the Christian faith, devoting her time to fads and crazes, neglecting her children, keeping improper company herself and bad company for the children, teaching them bad habits, etc. The libel is sworn to.

For a short time Mrs. Currey with her five children has been residing at Woodman's Point.

Mrs. Currey s Story

She was at first anxious to have nothing said about the trouble.

Her son opened a rear door in answer to repeated knockings. Three men came in, one a policeman. Mr. Currey did not

She thought perhaps that her husband meant that she did not keep company sufficiently aristocratic enough to suit him. # DISCOLORED NECK

HE fashion of wearing the collarless blouse has brought with it a double trouble to the up-to-date woman. For one thing, it exposes the sensitive skin of throat and neck to wind and dust, making it coarse from constant, exposure. At the same time, it lays bare to sight the ugly black rim about the throat caused by wearing the tight, high collars of last year. The skin of throat, neck and ohest will show lack of care more quickly than that of any other part of the body.

If you have this ugly black streak about your throat, your first treatment must be towards eliminating it. Cold water will stand you in little stead; the neck should be washed with warm water, into which a few drops of bensoin have been added. This done, you should exercise the neck until a free perspiration appears, then again bathe it in warm water, and apply the following lotion, letting it dry on the neck:


