Fraserville Navigation Co. Will Likely Place New Boat on Route.

MAKING PLANS.

With the close of navigation and the withdrawing for the season of the Canada from the Campbellton-Gaspere route the Fraserville Navigation Co. are making extensive plans for the next season's business.

During the past season the Canada has served the public only in a fair manner and the competition of another steamer during the passenger rush no doubt cut into the business.

But next year this company proposes to have a new steamer to place on this route, which will be modern in all respects. They are at present negotiating for the purchase of a steamer running out of Montreal, which will be placed on the route as an express steamer to handle mail and passengers while the Canada will handle the freight traffic.

The company will make a more definite announcement at a later date.

CANADA'S NAVY

Some of those Conservatives who are not joining with Mr. P. D. Monk in opposing expenditure on naval defence, are ridiculing the proposal to organize a Canadian naval service. They say it will be a "toy navy". In view of this, it is well to keep the facts in mind. The government has decided to build three cruisers of the Bristol class, costing \$1,500,000 each. The Bristol are the most recent type of scout adopted by the British Admiralty. They displace 4,000 tons and have a speed of 25 knots an hour. They are armed with two six-inch and ten four-inch quick-firing guns, as well as smaller weapons. There will be four destroyers, costing \$400,000 each. The destroyers are speedier craft, intended to war against torpedo boats. They carry torpedoes to be used in attacking larger vessels. The number of officers and men needed for these vessels will be 1,400, and the pay roll and victualling will cost about \$500,000 per annum. It is estimated that the total cost of the naval force of Canada will be \$2,000,000 a year, including the cost of maintaining efficient dock yards available for the largest ships of the royal navy. This is to be a nucleus of a Canadian naval force. It is a good beginning.

FREE DISTRIBUTION OF GOOD SEEDS

Department of Agriculture
Will send Samples on
Application.

By instruction of the Hon. Minister of Agriculture a distribution is being made this season of samples of superior sorts of grain and potatoes to Canadian farmers for the improvement of seed. The stock for distribution has been secured mainly from the Experimental Farms at Indian Head, Sask., Brandon, Man., and Ottawa, Ont. The samples consist of oats, spring wheat, barley, peas, Indian corn (for ensilage only), and potatoes. The quantity of oats sent is 4 lbs., and of wheat or barley 5 lbs., sufficient in each case to sow one-twentieth of an acre. The samples of Indian corn, peas and potatoes weigh 3 lbs. each. A quantity of each of the following varieties has been secured for this distribution:

OATS—Banner, Abundance, Danish Island, Wide-Awake, White Giant, Thousand Dollar, Improved Ligowo—all white varieties.

WHEAT—Red varieties: Red Fife (beardless), Marquis, Stanley and Chelsea (early beardless); Preston, Huron and Pringle's Champlain (early bearded); White varieties: White Fife (beardless), Bobs (early beardless).

BARLEY—Six-rowed: Munsy, Odessa, and Mansfield, well, and Canadian Thorpe.

FIELD PEAS—Arthur and Golden Vine.

INDIAN CORN (for ensilage)—Early sorts: Angel of Midnight, Tompkins' Early, and Longfellow; later varieties: Selected Learning, Early Mastodon, and White Cap Yellow Dent.

POTATOES—Early varieties: Rochester Rose, and Irish Cobbler. Medium to late varieties: Gold Coin, Carman No. 1, and Money Maker. The later varieties are, as a rule, more productive than the earlier kinds.

Only one sample can be sent to each applicant, hence if an individual receives a sample of oats he cannot also receive one of wheat, barley, peas, Indian corn, printed cards or sheets, or lists of names from one individual, or applications for more than one sample for one household, cannot be entertained. The samples will be sent free of charge through the mail.

Applications should be addressed to the Director of Experimental Farms, Ottawa, and may be sent at any time from the 1st of December to the 15th of February, after which the lists will be closed, so that the samples asked for may be sent out in good time for sowing. Applicants should mention the variety they prefer, with a second sort as an alternative. Applications will be filled in the order in which they are received, so long as the supply of seeds lasts. Farmers are advised to apply early to avoid disappointment.

Those applying for Indian corn or potatoes should bear in mind that the corn is not usually distributed until April, and that potatoes cannot be mailed until danger from frost is transit is over. No postage is required on mail matter addressed to the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa.
