

EUROPEAN INTELLIGENCE.

Arrival of the "China."

HALFAN, Oct. 9.
The China left Liverpool at 3 o'clock on the afternoon of the 30th ult., and arrived on the 1st, and arrived at Halifax at 4 a.m. on the 9th. She has 100 passengers and 132 Boston passengers.

Penian arrests continue of daily occurrence, particularly in the provinces.

A passenger by the City of Manchester from New York, named O'Riordan, who asserts that he is a United States Captain, was arrested at Queenstown on landing from the steamer. Trenchable documents were found on him.

Three additional arrests were reported among the troops in Garrison at Cork.

The prisoners in Dublin, forty-one in all, were to be brought up for examination on the 30th inst.—the day the China left Liverpool.

The official Dublin Gazette of the 29th ult. contains a proclamation disarming several baronies in Tipperary, Limerick, and Waterford Counties.

The London Times makes the suggestion that the Prince of Wales should visit Ireland occasionally, and points out that the royal family have passed time on the Continent rather than in the sister kingdom.

The Times American correspondent reports the Penians as numbering 300,000 men in America.

Sir Robert Peel, Chief Secretary for Ireland, had been summoned before a Magistrate by Robert Gray, Dublin banker, for consequences of altercation in railway carriage.

Countess de Clare, mother of Lady Wodehouse, is dead.

It is stated that an effort is being made by committee of Confederate bondholders to induce Stock Exchange Committee to admit them to privilege of quotation in official list.

Baring's Circular reports considerable transactions in Southern States stocks, but gives no quotations.

The Countess de Paris had given birth to a daughter at Trivedubum, near London.

Large number of royal family of France present upon occasion.

Admiral Phidias, who is of Hebrew faith, has been unanimously elected Lord Mayor of London.

LATEST VIA QUEENSTOWN.—Sunday, Oct. 1st.—Fenian prisoners were brought before the Police Magistrate in Dublin yesterday, and included the proprietor and editor of the Irish People newspaper.

Mr. Barry, Queen's Counsel, appeared for the Crown, and made a long speech.

He said that within the last fortnight 23,500 arrived from America to be expended in revolutionary Ireland, and by that day's mail Government had intercepted a letter for Lopper, one of the prisoners, containing draft for £100 on Rothchilds.

Several other bills were also intercepted. Making of pikes had been extensively carried on.

One prisoner made 2000. Numerous revolvers and breast-plates were found in possession of prisoners connected with Irish People.

He quoted incendiary paragraph urging employment of force, from the number of that paper which was about to be issued when seized.

Mr. Barry concluded by asserting that the Fenians were powerful both in Ireland and America, trusted this affair would end forever such hopeless conspiracies.

Evidence was given against prisoners, and some were identified as connected with suppressed Fenian organ.

Investigation still pending, and will probably last several days.

In private examination of six Fenians at Dublin Castle yesterday, correspondence was put in showing that the plots were most sanguinary.

The design was to write down nobility, aristocracy and landowners, and assassinate them all on breaking out of the Revolution.

The Duke of Leinster and others were specially named.

Linon manufacturers and others would be called on for support under threats of extermination and confiscation of property.

The evidence of treason is said to be most complete.

Our Canadian Correspondence.

VISIT TO KINGSTON.

Dear Standard:
In my last I gave a hasty sketch of the Penian Penitentiary at Kingston; I regret that I cannot devote greater space to such worthy institutions as it and the Criminal Lunatic Asylum, which is situated quite near the former, and which we next visited.

The Asylum is presided over by Dr. Birchfield, a gentleman of great ability and marked suavity. Immediately on arriving at his place, the Dr. made us partake of a champagne lunch, which, quite as a surprise, he had prepared for us; he then conducted us through the fine new buildings, which, large airy rooms, and spacious passages, and showed us the crazy creatures under his care all of whom appeared perfectly harmless.

Two women, whose quarters were at some distance from those of the men, did not, in their conversation at once betrayed their insanity; their conversation at once betrayed their insanity; the men, whose numbers were much greater, were making speeches, singing songs, and doing things so ridiculous, that their loss of reason was evident.

Hurrying into town, we took a launch at the hotel and hastened down to the steamer "Play de Quint," on board of which we made an excursion down the lake (Ontario).

The excursion was productive of a great deal of pleasure to all, the scenery was very good, especially the "Thousand Isles," lying in beautiful forms and seemingly countless number on the bosom of the lake; an abundance of fruit and game was on hand, and the land of the Royal Canadian Rifles was in attendance, and last and best of all, the ladies of the Penian, who, whose kindness, so largely displayed during our short stay, will not soon be forgotten by us.

At seven o'clock, P. M. we sat down to a capital dinner, given by the citizens at the British American House. Mirth, good-humour, and warm friendly feeling, without which any entertainment of the kind cannot be a success, were here in the ascendant.

After the removal of the cloth, which was actually removed, the Mayor, who presided, gave the toast: (How Mr. Creighton ever accepted the office of Mayor, unless his merits overtopped his excessive modesty, I cannot say.)

Any report of the speeches, I conceive, would be out of place here, suffice it to say, that every expression of feeling in favor of confederation met with rapturous applause, which plainly showed the sentiments of the present assembly, which was a fair representation of the people of the city.

In reply to the toast of the evening, the speakers were:

For New Brunswick, Col. Boyd, and Mr. J. A. Beckwith.

For Nova Scotia, Hon. L. H. Shannon.

P. E. Island, Hon. E. Whelan.

All of these except Col. Boyd, who was strictly non-committal, were warmly in favor of confederation.

About twelve o'clock the party separated, and we bid adieu to our Kingston friends, amidst mutual regrets that our stay could not be prolonged.

OUR RETURN TO MONTREAL.

Two hours or less after the convivialities at Kingston broke up, we set out for Montreal. Sleeping-cars having been specially provided for us, we lost no time in taking our berth and laying ourselves down to sleep.

As it is a sleeping-car about as long as three ordinary nights compressed into one. The railway officials did everything they could to make us comfortable, but tired nature's sweet restorer is not to be won in a sleeping-car, your correspondent regrets to say, after several persistent attempts. At nine o'clock, A. M., we arrived at Montreal, where we were conducted immediately to the Donnegana Hotel, and at eleven o'clock were publicly received by the Mayor and the members of the Council of the Province, and the friends of the Canadian Institute.

The reception over, the Mayor informed us that the New-England, the Canadian Institute Library, and the library of the Canadian Institute were open to us, and that until two o'clock we were "at liberty" to visit these institutions. At that hour, carriages came to the hotel to convey us to the cars, which in a few moments brought us to Lachine, where we got on board the steamer "Lotbiniere," in which, according to programme, we were to descend the Lachine Rapids, tickets for which, as well as for a concert in the evening by the St. George's Society, together with a programme of our entertainment during the three days and a half of our stay, were issued to us.

A small party from Montreal, added to our own, embarked on the steamer, and we steamed slowly down the beautiful Lachine River; for a quarter of a mile before reaching the Rapids, the current runs very fast, and the water is consequently quite rough; at the point which gives the name to the place, the river makes a perpendicular descent, and at the same time bends suddenly, in a narrow channel, round the rock, requiring the steerman to be very nice indeed in his management.

We made the descent in fine style and without any accident to "mar the harmony of the occasion"—as a journalist says—beyond the "ducking" of a few venturesome gentlemen, who were on the main deck forward. In a short time we were in the St. Lawrence, passing under the Victoria Bridge, which we cheered lustily, and back again to Montreal.

The steamer, of course, does not reach Lachine by way of the Rapids, but goes up the Lachine Canal.

In the evening most of us went to the concert, which was held in the City Hall, a room capable of holding three thousand people, and a capital place for a promenade concert, such as we attended.

The music, by amateur volunteers and a regimental band, was very fair; but, the chief feature of the evening's entertainment was, no doubt, D'Arcy McGee's speech, in which, with eloquent indignation, he denied the statements in Dr. Mackay's recent letter to the "Times."

FROM THE STATES.

Boston, Oct. 7.

The North Carolina convention has passed a resolution, declaring the ordinance of secession null and void.

Two incendiary fires in Mobile yesterday and the day before destroyed warehouses containing 15,500 bales of cotton.

Four men were arrested yesterday in Providence for passing counterfeit United States currency, of the denomination of \$100, \$20, and 50 cent scrip.

Advices from San Francisco state that \$1,122,000 in gold for New York and \$342,600 for England were shipped on the 3d inst.

The tower of Eufrasi was violently shaken by an earthquake on the 27th ult.
