The Krupps have undertaken to put into the venture all the most modern agricultural machinery necessary, and to develop the region into one vast model farm. It is understood that this Russian venture lies outside the usual activities of the Krupps, which have strictly limited themselves thus far to production within the German Reich, and have only exported articles that could be manufactured on German soil in their own plants. heir own plants.

If the Krupps nevertheless embarked upon a new policy, this was obviously done in the hope that Russia may yet prove the richest export field for German industry. Whether the nope will be justified, remains to be seen.





### New Carlisle

APPLES OF GOOD QUALITY
FOR THE HOME GARDEN.
A good home fruit garden is a great tasset to any family. It provides an abundance of appetizing and hearthful food, and often prevents children from yielding to temptation and thooking" apples from the neighbours. For the home garden the varieties planted should cover the season well, and be of good to very good quality, if such trees are available. Early Summer—Two of the hardjost and best early summer apples are Tetofsky and Yellow Transparent; Tetofsky and Yellow Transparent; Tetofsky is the better in quality for eating, but is rather small and best only overy other year. The Yellow Transparent is the best for the home garden. Crimson Beauty, a 'nighty coloured variety and hardy, is very early but is inferior in quality.

Summer—The principal summer apple for commerce is the Duchess of Oldenburgh, and this is a very reliable sort for home use as well, but the quality is not good enough for a dessert apple. For the home garden, the Melba, orizinated at the Experimental Farm, Ottawa, will, it is believed, soon take the place of the Duchess. The Lawland Raspberry, is a Russian variety of good quality. In some parts of the Maritime Provinces, Williams Favorite does well and it is good in quality.

Autumu—The Wealthy is the outstanding autumn variety for the home garden, as it comes into bearing early, the trees bear heavily and the fruit is good in quality.
