Heligoland, the island which Great Britain has agreed to give over to Germany, in the rearrangement of territory con many, in the reatrangement of territory consequent on the African deal, is an island in the North Sea 40 miles northwest of the mouth of the Elbe. It had a population in 1871 of about 2,000 souls. The island is triangular, about a mile long from north to south, and one-third of a mile broad from east to wast. It was formerly much from east to west. It was formerly much broader, but the action of the sea is continually wearing it away. In 1714 it was taken from the Duke of Holstein-Gottorp by the Danes, from whom it was captured by the English in 1807, for whose fleets it by the English in 1807, for whose fleets it served as a station during the war with France. It was formally ceded to Great Britain in 1814. The inhabitants are descendants of Frisians and speak the Frisian language as well as the low German. The Government consists of a governor appointed by the Crown, aided by an executive council, a form of government establishment. tive council, a form of government established by the Queen in 1868.

QUEBEC'S LESSON. The Quebec Government has been sus-tained by a majority of from 25 to 30 in a Honse of 73. Premier Mercier paid no attention to the prophecies of the Tory organs that his party would be wiped out of existence in the Province, but went right ahead with the contest, and the result has proved who were the false prophets. Even Mr. Taillon, the Tory leader, has been defeated. Though Mr. Chapleau, Sir John Macdonald's most unscrupulous lieutenant, and Sir Adolphe Caron went to the rescue, and Dominion Government employes from Ottawa stumped and canvassed the counties for the Tory candidates, the record of the crowd was such as to discredit them in advance. Mr. Mercier, to our mind, is not a model legislator, but he is an improvement on the men who landed the Province in over \$20,000,000 of debt, and who have carried out, as members of the Dominion Government, a similar programme of extravagance, corruption and feathering of family nests to that which disgraced their regime in Quebec. We in Ontario cannot improve the system of administering public affairs in Quebec, but we can insist on an improvement at Ottawa. Hitherto the public resources of Canada have been used for unduly influencing doubtful constituencies. Millions of dollars have been thus squandered. The very men who de-nounced Mercier for his free-spending habits will take millions of hard-earned dollars from the people of Ontario and spend them in buying up troublesome districts. So long as this system is allowed to prevail at Ottawa, so long will Macdonald, Chap-leau, Carron & Co., have imitators in the smaller Provinces. With the Dominion purse closed to every questionable demand, economy would soon prevail in the Provincial Governments.

THE VALUE OF EXPORT TRADE In his paper on "Comparative Taxation" in the June Century Edward Atkinson, of Boston, makes the remark that "The only way by which we can put a part of our taxes upon the people of other lands is by increasing our exports to which local and national taxes have already been charged as a part of the cost." The theory of the proectionists is that by putting a tariff tax on goods brought in from foreign countries we are levying taxation upon foreigners and making them contribute to our public revenue. This theory would imply that the foreign producers are selling their goods to us at a price less than the amount of the tariff rate imposed, whatever that may be, and that to this extent they are sustaining a loss of profits, if not upon cost of production. Now a state of this result is the state of the state foreign producers are selling their goods to state of things may be conceived in which farmers or manufacturers sell products for less than the cost, or at a very small margin above cost. But only very foolish men can be expected to carry on business in this way. If goods must be sold at a loss, the least loss is likely to be sustained at home, before cost of transportation is added, and unless producers are very cosmopolitan any favors which they have to bestow are not as likely to be shared with foreigners as with their own countrymen. The first element in fixing the price of an article is the cost of production, and this includes the cost of raw material, of labor, of the use of machinery, and of any rates or taxes which may be imposed by the municipality or the State as the inserest of the business in the maintenance of law and order, without which no rights of property could be secured. If any other charges are made they are added to the cost of production. and if an article in reaching a foreign market is made subject to an additional tax the actual cost is increased by that ernment employment in Africa. much, and the whole becomes a charge upon the consumer. The producer, unless he sells at a loss, receives the full amount of the cost price at the place of sale, and if this place is in a foreign country it includes the duties, if any, which that country imposes upon his goods. He may pay the duties when the goods are sent in, but they are recouped to him in the end; otherwise the transaction is a loss and he is deterred from repeating it. If the market has fallen he may be obliged to sell at a reduced margin of profit, but until profit finally disappears every item of cost is paid for by the consumer and returned to the producer. It follows, therefore, that in the conduct of export trade under profitable conditions—and trade is a business of mutual advantages production. If the article is imported he pays any duty which the Government of his own country may levy upon it, and he also pays any tax which is the article's share imposed by State or local authorities in the sountry of production. SILVER AND GOLD. The United States Senate has emasculated the bill for the increased coinage

law, no Secretary of the Treasury has ever issued over \$2,000,000 each month of silver money, while the law has permitted \$4,000. 000 to be issued. One reason for this caution was found to be the indisposition of the financiers to circulate the silver money. They had an idea that silver, the bases gold out of circulation entirely. So great and widespread was this belief, that the silver coins were absolutely debarred from sirculation, and as soon as the United States treasury paid them out they would flow back again. The banks almost everywhere refused to take silver on deposit, Finally, at a moment when the situation was getting quite serious, the solution to the dilemma was discovered, which was, to store up in the vaults of the treasury the silver dollar, and issue in their stead treasury notes in various denominations. These were soon found to go into circulation and to stav there as they passed freely from one hand to another in the payment of debts—the butcher, the baker, the candlestick-maker and all other tradespeople were only too glad to be the recipients of them in place of personal "I. O. U's." Confidence in this silver paper money, although backed then by only 72 cents of real value, grew day by day, and at no time since been a halt-the result is that there is now in circulation of these money tokens about \$300,000,000, end the cry being still for more, the United States Government recently promoted a Treasury to purchase \$4,500,000 worth of silver a month, at the market price, but not to exceed \$1 for \$75.25 grains of pure silver, and to pay for it in treasury notes of the United States. The denominations of these notes were to vary from \$1 to \$1,000. These notes were to be redeemable on deagencies, and to be legal tender for all debts. The bill so stipulating passed the House of Representatives, but the Senate would have none of it, and after debating its provisions for many days so altered it as to provide for the free coinage of silver. The unit of value of the United States dollar was fixed at 4121 grains of standard silver or of 25 8-10th grains of standard gold. These coins, it is stipulated, shall be legal tender for all debts, public or private. Any owner of silver or gold bullion may deposit either metal at any mint of the United States to be formed into standard dollars or bars for his benefit, or he may take certificates of denomina-tions of less than \$1 or more than \$100 instead, which certificates shall also be legal

private. The amended bill will now go back to the House of Representatives, and it is said will be passed by that body. What action the President will take remains to be seen It is known that he favors an increased coinage of silver, but he is opposed to the free coinage idea. The fact is that both he and his Cabinet fear the result of the inflation of the currency which the placing of silver on a level with the more precious metal will cause. This apprehension was exemplified by Mr. Sherman, of Ohio, in the debate in the Senate. He intimated that he did not believe that the effect of the free coinage of silver would be to advance its price to that of gold. On the contrary the result would would meet all the needs of the country, but intimated that he was not averse to an increase to \$54,000,000 a year, partly as a compromise, and partly because he "be lieved that treasury notes, based on silver bullion, would be as safe a substitute for paper money as could be conceived." The currency of the country, he maintained, was larger now in proportion to the population than ever it was before. Under the circumstances, we would look for the vetoing of the free coinage measure by the President, but for the fact that the silver mine owners of the West have enormou influence in Washington, and as Mr. Har-rison has not a backbone of any too great strength he may be afraid to go in the face of the majority in Congress, even to ward off what may prove a crisis.

On the investiture of Candahar by Ayoub Khan he commanded the troops in the memorable march from Cabul to that city, described as one of the most brilliant military feats of modern times, and utterly defeated Ayoub. For these services he was created a baronet and received several other distinctions. He was sent to South Africh to command the expedition against the Boers, but was recalled, peace having been restored before his arrival. He subsequently sunceeded Sir Donald Stewart (who by the way arrived in Canada a few days ago) in command of the Indian Army. 
