ACCIDENT TO THE ARIZONA.

LONDON, Sept. 14.—The Guion Line steamer Arizona, from New York, Sept. 5, for Liverpool, arrived at Queenstown yesterday in a battered condition. Passengers report that early Sunday, Sept. 6, while the Arizona was in a fog, but steaming rapidly, an unknown sailing vessel, believed to be a large coasting schooner, struck her port quarter. The passengers, who were in bed at the time of the accident, were awakened by the shock and noise of the collision, and rushed on deck. Curtiss' Story.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 12.—Curtiss ("Sam" of Posen") tells the following story of the shooting of Officer Grant: I was at the Grand Opera House last night with my wife to see Bernhardt in "Camille." I left the theater about 10 o'clock to go to the Tivoli Theater with Wm. Kreling, one of the proprietors. We had a drink together, and I left him to return to the opera house for my wife. When I reached the corner of Third and Mission streets I was suddenly tumbled into the gutter, and after that I remember nothing only somebody pulling and jerking me about until I found myselt in a wagon, with handcuffs on my wrists.

When Curtiss was taken to jail last night he appeared to be under the influence of liquor, and incoherently told of his doings during the night, protesting he had no weapon and that he was innocent of murder. The place where the officer arrested Curtiss is some blocks from the station house, but the shooting occurred within half a block of the station and within hearing of a number of policemen. Grant was killed instantly, the bullet entering the middle of the forehead near the brain and penetrating the brain. The pistol with which Curtiss shot the police officer was found in the street a short distance from where the tragedy occurred.

Eggs in England.

The price of eggs in England is of importance now that the American market has been closed to us. Mr. D. D. Wilson, of Seaforth, recently sold a consignment in England, so a special cable dispatch stated, at 8 shillings per long 100 (10 dozen), about 19 cents per dozen. The Walkerton Herald says: It must not be forgotten, however, that eggs in that market are graded according to size, and the consignment in question was graded as firsts, weighing from 16 to 17 pounds per 10 dozen. At the same time seconds were sold at 16 cents; those weighing less than 8 to a pound at 14c, and small eggs (the greater part of our spring product) at as low as 11 cents per dozen. While shippers can save themselves and generally make a profit on the larger sized eggs, such profits are swallowed up by the loss of 3 cents or more on the large number of small sized eggs. to take. TYPHOID EPIDEMIC.

Report of the Medical Health Office

Cause the Trouble—Samples of Water Analyzed—Wells To Be Closed Up— Sewer on Craig Street Absolutely

Aldermen Ivey (chairman), Thomas, Wyattand Skinner, Dr. Gardiner, Mr. Heaman, Dr. Hutchinson and Secretary Bell were preasen yesterday afternoon at the meeting of the Board of Heaith. Dr. Hutchinson, medical health officer, submitted his report on the typhoid fever outbreak in South London. It is appended:

"Your medical health officer begs to submit the following report upon the recent outbreak of typhoid fever in the city, including two deaths in wards 5 and 6 respectively, distributed as follows: One on Quebec street, in ward 5; one on Cartwright street, in ward 4, and eleven cases in ward 6, Of these two occurred on Alma street, two on Bruce street, one on Queen street, one on Victoria avenue, four on Craig street and one on the Wortley road, the latter a young woman, who was sent to the hospital and died there yesterday afternoon.

"Of the thirteen families in which the disease made its appearance well water was used in eleven. Of the two fatal cases one used city and the other well water.

"As to the cause of the outbreak the residents of Ward 6 are inclined to stribute the cause ef the disease to gravel taken from the river bed and spread upon Craig street, but the fact that typhoid fever was not found on Craig street alone, but appeared simultaneously in other parts of the city where no gravel from the river bed had been laid readily shows that that could not have been the cause. Furthermore complete destruction by oxidation of any injurious matter which the gravel may have contained would take place in a few days by exposure to the sun's heat.



Dominion Votors' Lists Final Revision.

In view of the large number of byeelections certain to be held during the next
four or five months, and the great probability that a general election will be held
on the Federal voters' lists now being prepared, it is important, very important, that
the workers of the Libersl party and that
all Canadians concerned for the welfare of
the country should pay strict attention to
the final revision and exercise the utmost
vigilance to get every person entitled to a

the final revision and exercise the utmost vigilance to get every person entitled to a vote enrolled and the name of every unqualified person struck off the lists.

The preliminary lists prepared by the revising officer (which should be issued on or before Sept. I) consist of two, viz.: One entitled "Names to be added and corrections to be made," and the other, "Names to be removed."

The date of the final revision of the lists shall not be less than two weeks after the

The date of the mai revision of the lists shall not be less than two weeks after the publication (by circulation to the person stated in the act) and posting up of the original and supplimentary lists in three conspicuous public places in each polling district.

district.

The revising officer, at the time of posting up the lists, shall publish the dates and places for holding the courts of final re-

vision.

Each sitting of such court shall include,
when practicable, three and (except in
cities and towns) not more than five polling

districts.

The revising officer will furnish to any person applying for the same a copy of the original and preliminarily revised lists at a price not exceeding a few cents for a poll-

price not exceeding a few cents for a polling district.

Two weeks' notice must be given to the revising officer by any person desiring to add to, or object, or in any way to amend or correct the lists.

Two weeks' notice must be given to the persons whose name is objected to, by personal delivery or by registered letter to his postoffice address, as given in the preliminary voters' lists.

The last revised assessment roll furnishes prims facie evidence of a former elector's removal, if his name does not appear thereon—and likewise furnishes prims facie evidence of the right of a person to have his name added to the voters' lists, if attached to his name on the assessment roll is any one of the required qualifications.

The voters' list as finally revised at this court cannot be amended afterwards.

Every person whose name appears on the list as finally revised can exercise the franchise in the event of an election.
