No International Strike.

Zurich, Aug. 11.—The International Socialists' Congress yesterday rejected a resolution offered by Norwegian delegates tesolution offered by Norwegian delegates that a universal strike be started immediately after a war is declared. The resolution was supported by representatives of only four nations, while the representatives of fourteen nations voted against it. A Belgian amendment in favor of aiming to suppress militarism by withholding supplies was alonged.

Austria Alarmed.

VIENNA, Aug. 11 .- An official statement declares that the condition of the country with regard to cholera is yery precarious—much more serious than it was in 1892. The home effice has sent a circular to Government officials throughout the country enjoining the strictest precautions. Cholera has broken out among the navvies, mostly Italians and Croatians, building a railway at Marmorasa, on the Galician frontier. Thirty-five have died. One hundred have fled in the direction of their homes without waiting for their wages. Seven cases of cholers and two deaths have eccurred at Czoineti.

Russia Repudiates Gold. St. Petersburg, Aug. 11.—The Moscow ledomosti says that the Imperial Council, ssembled in extraordinary session, has

promulgated the following ukase:
"In view of the strigency of gold in the money market, and in view of the critical state of affairs in financial circles in general, state of affairs in financial circles in general, at it is ordered that hereafter no contracts in any money or other transaction shall be held to be legal in which the basis of future payment shall be gold coin or certificates, to the exclusion of all other specie or notes for specie. "Nor shall it make any difference in east

one of the contracting parties pays a premium now in order to compensate for the future payment to him of gold.

"The Ministry of Finance shall be the final judge of all such cases in which the parties may contest their liability to the operations of this new law, and is hereby empowered to investigate any and all contracts."

On the Repeal of the Sherman Silver Bill.

> Arrangement Reached Between the Advocates and Autis for Discus-Question.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 11.—The conference of silver and anti-silver men has reached an agreement by which general debate on a bill for the repeal of the purchase clause for the Sherman law is to be limited to eleven days. This will be tollowed by debate for three days under the five minute rule, when voting will begin on the bill and various silver amendments.

The present arrangement is that the repeal bill will be introduced in the House to-day; that an accompanying resolution shall prescribe the method of procedure and that debate shall begin at once.

If carried out this programme will bring the House to a vote on the amendments on Aug. 28.

New York, Aug. 11.—Bradstreet's says: The irrational but widespread hoarding of curroncy has compelled jobbers and manufacturers in many instances to do business more nearly than ever on a cash basis. This has resulted in a further restriction of trade throughout the country, accompanied by such signs of aggravation as increased difficulty in disposing of commercial paper, a still greater scarcity of currency at larger centers and a shut-down movement among industrial establishments. The latter, together with curtailment of forces in that and in commercial lines, points to be enforced idleness of nearly 1,000,000 wage-earners within the past two months as compared with not more than 400,000 at the close of 1884, the previous year of great business depression. Aug. 28.

ASIATIC CHOLERA SURE. Two More Cases Developed at New

York Quarantine. Official Rules for Treatment of the Dread Disease.

QUARANTINE, S. I., Aug. 11—12:40 p.m.
—The bacteriological examination made in
the two cases removed yesterday—Francis
Malo and Mariano Riberaco—resulted in
finding the spirillia of Asiatic cholera in
each case. Both patients are in the same
condition as when removed—no better, no
worse.

Two cases were removed from Hoffman Island at noon to the hospital at Swinburne Island, both showing choleraic symptoms.

QUARANTINE, S. I., Aug. 11—9 p.m.—At 4 p.m. three cases were transferred to Swinburne Island from Hoffman, and at 7:30 p.m. two more were taken to the same place. All showed characteristic symptoms of cholora.

The bacteriological examinations of the cases removed to day have not been completed as yet.

All are well on the Karamania. Thus far all the cases have developed within the period of incubation after the removal of the passengers from the steamer.

service of the Health Board, will say in the forthcoming issue of the American Druggist and Pharmaceutical Record, "that there are three important facts to bear in mind regarding the Asiatic plague:

"First—Cholera can be taken into the body only by means of food or drink.
"Second—Even if taken into a healthy stomach cholera germs are harmless, as the acid gastric juice at once kills and digests them.

"Third—Cholera germs are killed when submitted to the boiling temperature."

Bearing these facts in mind, every house wife has it in her power to protect herself and her family against cholera if it should come to New York. The first thing is hot meals, made up of hot courses, consisting of thoroughly cooked dishes, served boiling or broiling hot and eaten as hot as they can be borne. This means total abstinence from ices, iced or cold drinks; raw fruits, salads, and even bread.

If cholera should come, or if there is any diarrheal disorder, it will be good judgment for every individual to eat and drink in moderation and only of a steaming hot diet, changed and varied as often as possible. wife has it in her power to protect hersel

the annual report regarding loan and building societies in Canada, and an Ottawa correspondent summarizes it. There are 90 of these companies, of which 70 send returns. The total amount in loans at the end of 1892 was \$113,659,640, and the amount of interest paid in this Province was \$12,414,292. In Ontario during the year 881 mortgages were foreclosed, representing an indebtedness of \$2,234,791. The amount of farm chattel mortgages paid and accrued during the year was \$3,496,438, an increase of \$106,847 over that of 1891. The amount of principal and interest overdue and in default on mortgages was \$2,519,452, being \$380,953 more than the previous year. These reports do not show that the ondition of the farmer improved last year To the figures given above must be added the loans from the other twenty societies which did not send in reports, all of which are situated in Ontario. There must also be added the large amounts borrowed from banks, from private individuals and from other sources, which would doubtless be at least equal to the amount, as specified. From this must of course be deducted the amount of mortgage indebtedness on other real estate properties than farms, but this amount would be inconsiderable, and probably would not equal the amount of current debts owned by the farmers.

A London electrician has invented as abtachment for the telephone which will enable the instrument to talk loud enough for a person in any part of a large room to hear and understand. He has succeeded not so much by an improvement on the existing telephones, although some modifica-tion of the apparatus has been effected, as by his method of arranging the circuit and bringing its resistance as low as possible. To this end the usual induction coil is discarded, and the two instruments, transmitter and receiver, are directly connected in circuit with the line and the battery. The transmitter of A at one end of the line is connected with the receiver of B at the other end. As this arrangement only permits of A speaking to sisted curative efforts.

B, and not of B replying to A without a change of the connections and a substituon of apparatus, two separate lines are employed having a common return wire On the second line the transmitter of B is directly connected to the receiver of A. speak out so as to be heard in any part of a speak out so as to be heard in any part of a room, conversation can be carried on by each person simply speaking to his transmitter. This apparatus is attached to flexible conductors and is held in the hand. To open a conversation it is sufficient to pick up the portable transmitter and press a button in its casing so as to establish the circuit, then speak into it. The receiver at the other end acts as its own call-bell by the loudness of its voice, and the response comes equally prompt and loud. The user has no need to listen carefully with one or two receivers held up to his head. All he has to do is speak into his transmitter and keep his ears open. The apparatus is therefore highly convenient, and allows the user freedom of action. It is chiefly intended for domestic service from one part to another of a house, office, or workshop, and it will be especially useful on board ship, particularly in men-of-war, or in building yards, farms, newspaper offices, and other arge establishments

THE WATER SUPPLY.

Some people pretend that the water supply of this city cannot be augmented during the present drought, except by an expenditure of \$40,000 or \$50,000. At the last neeting of the commissioners, it was shown that for an expenditure of a few hundred dollars the supply could be added to to the extent of probably 1,000,000 gallons daily. When this is the case, what sense is there in depriving the citizens of the water supply that the commissioners have contracted to give them? Be not penny wise and

As to the question of permanently adding to the pumping capacity at Springbank, no reasonable taxpayer will say that we should proceed on "the hand-to-mouth" system. The city needs a water supply that will meet abnormal conditions such as those that have come this year, and are almost certain to recur every season or two.

IS IT A CANCER OURE?

Every now and again professed cures for ancer have been announced, but in the large majority of cases, though many have een tried, no permanent relief has been afforded. If, however, the remarkable experiments that have lately been made at the New York cancer hospital mean anything, they betoken that a cure is within the possibilities. The new remedy-heroic it undoubtedly is-came to the knowledge of the experts at the hospital through a patient becoming accidentally incculated with the virus of erysipelas several weeks ago. As the disease progressed it was noticed that the patient's cancerous condition improved. This fact suggested to Dr. William T. Bull the advisability of inoculating other patients with the poison of erysipelas. Accordingly several cases were set apart and experiments were begun and carried out by Dr. W. B. Coley under the direction of Dr. Bull. The inoculations were made not only on patients with carcinoma (commonly known as cancer), but also on others who were suffering from sarcoma, which is a much more malignant form of tumor than the ordinary cancer. The results in both forms were very satisfactory. For inoculating purposes a pure culture of the streptococcus was used. Of the cases of carcinoma about 25 per cent. were reported cured, while in the sarcomatous cases the results were even better, showing as many as 40 per cent. of those experimented upon to have become well and free after the attack of erysipelas.

It has been said that whatever good has resulted was due to the local reaction. This theory is apparently disproved by the fact that inoculations made at a distance from tumor have been known to cause it to disappear. The injections, as a rule, were made into the tumor itself, and were repeated every 48 hours. The reaction produced was almost identical with that produced by true erysipelas, though in most of the cases it was milder in degree, passing away within 24 to 48 hours. The dangers attending this form of treatment are insignificant when one considers the usual outcome of a case of cancer, or sarcoma, which is almost invariably fatal.

The subject of cancer is not generally understood. What is popularly known as cancer includes many different forms of tumors, such as carcinoma, of which there are four varieties-the spheroidal-celled, which includes the hard and soft cancers; what is known as epithelioma, the form usually seen affecting the lip; the cylindrical-celled, and the colloid. Of sarcomata the surgeons also make four sub-divisious-the round-celled, spindle-celled, mixed-celled and the myeloid or giantcelled. For other than scientific purposes the sub divisions are hardly necessary, as the various forms of sarcomata are all said

to be very malignant. In the report written by Dr. Coley he concludes: First, that the curative effect of erysipelas upon malignant tumors is an established fact; second, the action upon the sarcoma is invariably more powerful the sates is invariantly in the ratio of 3 to 1; third, the treatment of inoperable malignant humors by repeated inoculations of erysirelas is both practicable and not attended with great risk; fourth, the eurative action is systematic and probably due chiefly to the toxic products of the streptooccus, which products may be isolated and used without producing erysipelas; and fifth, that the method of inoculation should not be employed indiscriminately until further clinical experiments have proved its
