THE KING IS DEAD, LONG LIVE THE KING; COPENHAGEN ACCLAIMS THE NEW SOVEREIGN

Frederick the Eighth Was This Morning Proclaimed Monarch of Denmark in the Presence of Fifty Thousand Citizens of the Danish Capital.

Copenhagen, Jan. 30 .- Frederick VIII. was proclaimed King of Denmark at noon today in Malienborg Square in front of the palace. The cereonly a few minutes. The Premier, M. The Premier then called for cheers for King Frederick VIII. The new ruler of Denmark joined the Premier on the balcony, and in a short speech declared that he would rule in accordance with the example set him by his father, and he trusted that the same accord between the king and the nation would continue as heretofore. His majesty concluded with calling for cheers for the father-

King Frederick received a warm-hearted greeting from the assembled crowd, whose cheers mingled enthusiastically with the National Anthem. New King Is Popular.

Frederick VIII., the new king of Denmark, who will ascend the throne in his 62nd year, bears the weight of his years lightly, and is almost as popular with the people of Denmark as was his father. By the wish of his parents, he was brought up with great simplicity, and his early education was obtained at the town grammar school, for not until he was 10 years old was the difficult question of his father's succession to the Danish throne finally settled. It was Frederick's curious fate to see his younger new king has been highly popular since his His bearing is stately, and his manner quiet. He is noted for his culture and possesses many foreign distinctions. While seldom openly identifying himself with political questions, he has taken an active important debates in the Riksdag. He is chancellor of the Copenhagen University and head of the Freemasons of Denmark, and is well known as promoter of all philanthropic objects. His interest in the army, of which he is inspector-general, is keen, and he has introduced several reforms which have improved the lot of the private soldiers, as the result of which he is extremely popular with the troops.

Wife is Richest Princess.

Little can be predicted as to the new king's public policy. The new Louisa, is reputed to be the tallest and richest princess in Europe. She is a handsome woman of the blonde type. The new queen inherited large fortunes both from Prince Frederick of the Netherlands and Princess Charles of Sweden. Nevertheless she and her husband have adhered to the plainness and simplicity characteristic of the Danish court, showing the nation the happy spectacle of a united couple living on terms of the closest affection and sympathy with their eight children. Though they have paid many visits to foreign courts, they are essentially a home-keeping couple when compared with other royal personages.

Frederick is credited with having a less determined character than his father, while it is whispered that the new queen possesses the stronger character of the two, and possibly this latter fact will have considerable influence on the policy of the new king. Both are deeply imbued with religious con-



THE TOWNSEND BILL

Measure to Control Railroad Rates Now Before Congress.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 30. - Opening what promises to be a week's discussion of the railroad rate bill, Mr. Townsend, of Michigan, addressed the House for more than an hour today touching on and elucidating practically every phase of the railroad rate-making problem and describing in detail the terms of the Hepburn bill.

Regarding the question as one of the most important ever before Congress, Mr. Townsend advocated the bill as the correct remedy for the evil which exsted, and predicted that not withstanding the protests of the roads, greater prosperity would come to them under ts provisions than otherwise.

In brief, the bill attempts, he said, to place under the supervision of the interstate commerce commission every form of interstate and foreign commerce, and all instrumentalities of commerce and transportation. The most serious complaints on the part of the shippers, he said, have been directed against special service, such as private cars, icing, elevator and terminal charges, and the like.

Mr. Townsend believes the bill affords a complete remedy for all of these evils, as hereafter every such charge must be just and reasonable, and in it is an evidence that a pretty full vote case it is not, the commission has

ANTIQUITIES.

******* [From the Chicago Record-Herald.] The craze for collecting antiquities has spread all over Europe and America. Almost everybody who makes any pretensions to artistic taste and has enough money is buying old things of one kind or another. Rich competitors for such articles sometimes bid them up to fabulous prices. Henry Labouchere tells in London Truth the remarkable history of a Louis XIV. writing table. It had been at Silverton Park, Lord Egremont's place near Exeter, for many years. Thirteen years ago the contents of the house at Silverton Park were sold at auction, and this table was knocked down for And men with fur coats tread to uncle's \$110. The purchaser took it to Paris and sold it within a few weeks for \$10,000. Two years later it went at For seed and bulb, shirtwaist and auction for \$15,000. At the recent watering can. Cronier sale it brought \$23,000. At the same sale \$85,000 was paid for a Fragonard which 50 years ago was bought for \$12.

It is a perhaps inevitable consequences of such excribtant prices that an extensive manufacture of spurious antiquities has sprung up. The rich of the United States are its chief victims. "Americans," writes M. Felix Duquesnal, a French art critic, "are swindled on a scale they cannot imagimagine. Certain galleries of 'ancient masters' over the Atlantic contain few pictures over ten years old." One of the leading French manufacturers of antiquities began as a sculptor's assistant. Finding he could not make more than \$1,000 a year in his profession, he turned to his present business. He now employs four workmen, makes about \$7,500 per annum, and expects to double his income in two years.

He does not sell to private purchasers, but only to dealers. It is said to be in the United States. Among his specialties are "eighteenth century" and "empire" furniture. He claims that even an expert cannot tell if a piece of furniture is a forgery without pulling it to pieces. One dealer near the Madeleine in Paris has a "private collection" of old furniture in his bedroom which he shows only after much importunity. He has sold the "Louis XVI. bed at a handsome figure five or six times.

Eighteenth century engravings, including colored prints, are counterfeited wholesale. Antique jewelry is manufactured by steeping. Sulphuric acid is used on silver, aqua regia on gold. The surface of the metal is then worn with ground brick. After the stones are inserted the whole is greased with tallow and rubbed in with soot. "Greek and Roman jewels, renaissance enamels, episcopal rings, and Benvenuto Cellini plate are made in Germany." Vienna is specialized in counterfeiting sixteenth century enamels. Abbeville and Amiens make flint arrow tips and hatchets for museums of geclogy. Old pewters are manufactured at Rouen, Etruscan pottery halls from ROYALTY WILL SEE Leeds.

A safe way to checkmate the forgers would be for rich people to quit collecting bric-a-brac, and ebgin buying the works of living artists. That would be a good change. It would put a stop to an industry which owes its Prince and Princess of Wales large profits solely to its fraudulent character, and would at the same time give needed encouragement to modern art. American collectors might promote the culture of the age and save themselves from much further robbery and ridicule by acting on that sugges-




