### All Conscientious Objectors In Canada Are Liberated After

Each Case Was Taken Up and Considered On Its Merits-Bona Fide Objectors Get More Leniency Than

Ottawa, July 31.-Practically all conscientious objectors to military service have been released from Jall. The policy has been to take each case on its merits. Investigations were made and reports obtained. Where a man was found to be a bona fide conscientious objector a maximum sentence was served of about six months. Where a man was shown to be "slacking" the sentence was longer. In April there were between forty and fifty cases under inquiry by the solicitor-general. Since then 25 of the men have been liberated. 

### CHICAGO WHITES AND BLACKS CONTINUE TO SHOOT, STAB AND LOOT DESPITE U.S. SOLDIERS

Chicago, July 31.-Chicago was comparatively calm today for the first time since Sunday, and public officials expressed the belief that the use of five regiments of state troops has effectually quelled the race riots, which resulted in thirty deaths and the injury of more than 1,000

State militiamen are patrolling the danger districts on the South Side. Their appearance on the streets has had the effect of suppressing violent disturbances. They were aided in their work by a driving rain, which kept crowds from gathering in the streets. A dozen arrests were made of whites and negroes, charged with carrying concealed weapons, and there were several sporadic fights between white men and negroes, but no mob attacks were reported.

State, city and county officials continued to operate in the suppression of violence. Governor Lowden, in a statement issued this morning, called attention to the fact that the city was not under martial law, and that no such action is contemplated unless conditions grow materially worse. He explained that the state troops are working in connection with the police, and that rioters will be prosecuted in the municipal and state courts, and not by military authorities,

Chicago, July 31.—Six thousand troops on duty with rifles and bayonets in the most densely populated negro quarters of Chicago, and a light fall of rain, failed to stop fighting between whites and blacks last night. Long after midnight isolated groups continued shooting, stabbling and looting in places which the military had been unable to reach. The death list remained at 30, none being reported killed last night. Several hundred have been injured during the four nights of rioting and a dozen of these may die.

Adjutant General Dickson, on returning from the placing of troops, eported that snipers had fired on a company of soldiers on the way to Englewood. No one was injured. The general reported that after the troops had taken their stations, quiet had prevailed in the patrolled

The result was the sordid Pontiac tragedy. This was revealed with the arrival yesterday in London of the body and effects of George Near, who is alleged to have shot his wife first and then turned the weapon on himself.

A letter written by Mrs. Near to her husband, the last she ever wrote to him, mentioned gossiping tongues. It was written just prior to her departure from London. This letter showed that the young wife felt the sting of gossip which she declared was untrue and she fought to defend all that is held dear by a good woman.

Not yet out of her teens, this young wife said: "Going away, I will not be taking any chances of giving people reason to talk."

On the ground near the bodies a note was found which was in the hand writing of Near. It read: "This is my wife, Mrs. Near, and myself, George Near, both of London, Ontario. There are letters in my pocket."

Since the death of Near and his wife efforts have been made by both the Michigan and Canadian authorities to locate the man who left this city with Near, so far without result. It is thought by the authorities that if the missing man could be located new light would be shed on the tragedy.







Former Attorney-General of Manitoba Expresses Views on Liberal Rally - Will Have To Deal With Labor

WINNIPEG, July 39.—Hon. A. B. Hudson, former attorney-general of Manitoba, expects the coming Liberal convention in the east to formulate a platform which will unite the party and which will map out a course in the interests of the Dominion as a whole. He expressed his opinions on the convention and the political situation in Canada in an interview with your correspondent today.

"Are you going to the Liberal convention?" Mr. Hudson was asked. "No, I am not able to go on account of private business. I hope the convention will turn out well. There are quite a number of forward-looking men going from both east and west, and if their views prevail a real Liberal program will be adopted. They will also see that the men put in control are men who believe in the policy adopted and can be trusted to carry it out."

"What is likely to be proposed with regard to the tariff?"

"Well, our western men are bound to stick out for something very like the farmers' platform. The Legislatures of the three prairie provinces have passed resolutions very similar to it. For that matter, resolutions proposed by the Opposition in Parliament did not fall very far short of it, and one can hardly expect the convention to do less."

Labor Problems.

"What about labor problems?"

"The time has come when these problems must be dealt with courage-ously. We cannot afford to lag behind other countries in meeting the legitimate demands of labor. In addition to meeting these there will doubtless be a proposal for some more efficient and equitable mode of settling labor disputes, and also for the encovragement of profit-sharing schemes and co-operation."

2.—A cash payment on account to be made to the farmer at the time he sells his wheat.

3.—The wheat crop of Canada to be sold by the board at the prevailing world prices, and the surplus proceeds, after expenses are deducted, to be distributed to the original sellers of the wheat in proportion to grade and quantity.

4.—No speculation on exchanges or profiteering by handlers to be allowed in disposing of the wheat crop of 1919 to the disadvantage of either producer or consumer.
