Incident Creates Great Excitement in the Turkish Capital.

Constantinople, April 7 .- (By the Associated Press).—Gen. Denekine, for-mer commander of anti-Bolshevik orces in Southern Russia, arrived here Monday night and is today a fugitive on board a British warship. Immediately after he landed, he went to the Russian embassy with Gen. Romanovsky, his former chief of staff, and it was! while he was there that the latter was

been apprehended, and there is little chance he will be caught, as attaches at the Russian embassy say, so far as they can determine, nobody saw the tragedy.

**Toronto Woman Alleged To Be** a Skillful Shoplifter.

New York, April 7 .- The 60-year-old Toronto woman who was yesterday sentenced in the court of special sessions to 60 days in the workhouse for petty larceny and whose identity mystified police officials, was definitely identified today as Mrs. Frank Coulson rento. Pleading guilty to the theft of articles valued at \$38 from a local department store, Mrs. Coulson yesterday refused to reveal her real name, saying that she had a son who was killed while fighting with the Canadian army in France, and she did not want to bring disgrace upon his memory.

According to Miss Mangin, probation officer, Mrs. Coulson served a term in the Mercer Reformatory in Toronto for shoplifting. Miss Mangin also claims to have learned that Mrs. Coulson acted as go-between in department stores. as go-between in department stores there, aiding saleswomen to steal ar-ticles and receiving her payment in mer-chandise. The records show, according to Miss Mangin's statement, that the woman was arrested in Buffalo for stealing linen from the Hotel Statler. where she was employed, and was fined 30 on that occasion. Her son, who was an elevator man in the same hotel, returned to Toronto at the outbreak of the war and enlisted

a Canadian battalion. He was missing for a year, and was finally reported as dead. For the past three years, Miss Mangin said, Mrs. Coulson has been spending her time visiting friends and relatives, paying no board, but giving them expensive presents.



### CHATHAM STATEMENT SURPRISES M. O. H.

Health Officer, Says Dr. W. S. Downham.

Some surprise at the statement of Dr. McRitchie, M. O. H. of Chatham, that pasteurization of milk gave no protection to the public whatever, was expressed today by Dr. W. S. Downham, London's medical officer of health.

health.
"If Dr. McRitchie has been correctly dif-"If Dr. McRitchie has been correctly reported his opinion is certainly different from that ever expressed by any other health officer." said Dr. Downham. "Pasteurization of milk has some drawbacks, but it is generally regarded as a good sanitary precaution. The milk is placed in proper vessels, and is heated to a temperature of 140 or 145 degrees. It is kept at that heat for about half an hour, at end of which time all germs are supposed to have been killed, particularly tubercolosis germs.

"One disadvantage is that the milk is delivered a day later than if it was sent out directly without pasteurization, and is therefore not as fresh.

cent out directly without pasteuriza-tion, and is therefore not as fresh. Another disadvantage is that it reduces the viscosity. Milk, which has been pasteurized sometimes looks as though it did not contain a proper amount of butter fat, although a test will show that it does. 

PRICES STILL UP IN STEEL MARKET

In its summary of the iron, steel, metal and machinery markets for week ending April 8, Canadian Machinery and Manufacturing News, Toronto, makes the following comment: lines of business in either steel, fron





In view of the deep interest of the West in transportation problems, the feeling was that the Hudson Bay route should receive equal consideration with other projects in formulating a broadly national policy, and that until such a policy is determined upon, expenditures on Welland enlargement should be confined to such features only as well be useful in any case and will not tend to prejudice the decision on the relative merits of all the routes. OTTAWA, April 6.—Following the Easter recess the House of Commons resumed sittings today. But proceedings aroused little interest, and at one time the House was threatened with being counted out for lack of a quorum. Chiefly the food and drugs bill was under consideration. The bill's many clauses are largely a consolidation of previous acts. But the way in committee was slow, and when the committee rose merely the technical "progress" was reported. The bill still remains in the committee stage.

An amusing incident marked the earlier stages of the discussion. Mr. Fielding asked Mr. Rowell, who was in charge of the bill, if whiskey could be considered a food.

"No, sir," Mr. McMaster interposed, "whiskey is a poison."

The committee laughed, but none attempted further definition.

Later in the evening there was a somewhat sharp discussion over whether Mr. Duff of Lunenburg should be permitted to read a poem. The House was again in committee, this time on a bill to amend the Canada shipping act in regard to certificates of service. Suddenly Mr. Duff intimated that

act in regard to certificates of service. Suddenly Mr. Duff intimated that he proposed to read a poem. The deputy speaker hastily observed that he did not think this either the time or

There should be provision made for such a case. Mr. Rowell explained that the clause







Next of kin who wish these wooden crosses to be sent to them are there-fore requested to apply to the secretary, Imperial War Graves Commission, Win-chester House, St. James Square, S. W. I., before September I, stating the ad-dress to which the cross is to be sent, and giving the ways porticular. dress to which the cross is to be sent, and giving the usual particulars regarding the soldier on whose grave it was erected. It will be a convenience if the name of the cemetery is also given. A note will be made of these wishes, and the wooden cross will be sent in due course. This will, of course, not take place for some time, so next of kin should keep the secretary informed of any change of address.

# IN NEWSPRINT ORDER

Price Brothers' Appeal Supported, Government Control Ends.

Ottawa, April 6.—(The Canadian

Press)-The right of the board of

Ottawa, April 6.—(The Canadian Press)—The right of the board of commerce to order Price Bros. Company to ship newsprint paper to specified firms in Montreal at a fixed price, which was lower than the price obtainable in the United States, was not upheld by the supreme court in a decision handed down today. The court rules that newsprint is not a necessity of life in the sense that it is necessary to the physical life of the individual. The supreme court decides that orders in council under the war measure act are reviewable by the court, when their validity is held in question. The judgement is considered here to mean that it is the end of Government control of newsprint.

The object of the order of the board of commerce of February 6 last, was to compel Price Bros. to ship about fifteen per cent of its newsprint output to Canadian consumers, instead of to the United States, where a higher price could be obtained. It is represented that the firm had been selling all its newsprint in the United States for some time. Price Bros. ignored the board's order for some weeks, but hegan shipping newsprint at the Canadian price of \$80 per ton to Montreal firms, the difference between this price and the United States price, \$90 per ton and up, being deposited in trust fund pending the decision of the supreme court.

### **WOULD HAVE MOVIES** PUT UNDER CONTROL OF EDUCATION DEPT.

Since 1875 Japan, Great Britain, France. Russia and Germany for reasons of diplomacy and commerce, have been advancing huge sums to China in the way of loans. As a result the Chinese people have been burdened with eversoaring taxation in the effort to meet these gigantic obligations. There has been, as a consequence, no development of the country's natural resources that measures up to the possibilities. China has been so burdened with debt that she has been unable to grow and progress as her economic potentialities demand. Commenting on the situation the New York Review says:

"China, however, is too large and too important a country to permit of a receivership in the interests of any one power or group of powers. In comparison with her tangible resources, China is not insolvent, but in need of large-scale reorganization. The fact that she has in the past raised funds from every possible source on every kind of security at exorbitant rates, does not mean desperate need and low security. Neither is the payment to reputable bankers of a comsion of 6 to 9 per cent on national loans the sign of failing credit. The truth is, as might be suspected from a glance at the list of external obligations, that China has been milked by the predatory finance of the powers. It has been the drive of the governnent-backed pound sterling, rouble and franc, the yen diplomacy, the dollar diplomacy, which has cornered China.

"Just two nations are in a position to furnish the sinews for this financial renovation of China. It is a question whether Japanese yen and American dollars will devote themselves to a decade of reconstructive co-operation, or will prefer to bring China into a new welter of financial im-

Because of its geographical position this country should be a natural seller to China when that staggering giant becomes established. Whatever plan of reorganization is adopted for the Chinese Canada is greatly interested.

[Exchange.] Passover, the traditional Jewish Feast of Un-

eavened Bread, began on Friday evening, April 2, and ends on Saturday, April 10. The Passover—in Hebrew "Pesach"—was an agricultural festival originally, but at an early period was transformed into a festival of redemption by connecting it with the wondrous deliverance of the Hebrews from the Egyptian yoke. It is this memorable event which is commemorated in the festival, and the ritual ceremony observed during the seven days in which it is celebrated among Reform Jews, or eight among Orthodox, is Identified with the exodus of the Hebrews from Egyptian tyranny, and further symbolizes joy in the triumph f liberty and freedom over tyranny and oppression

This festival, falling in the springtime of the year, was utilized by the synagogue as a means of consecrating the Jewish home to God as the Releemer and Protector of Israel. The story of the leliverance from slavery was the occasion for roleing confidence in the future redemption from ppression and woe. The Passover Feast endowed he Jew ever anew with endurance during the dark night of mediaeval bigotry and with faith in the 'Keeper of Israel," who slumbereth not nor sleep-Exultation over Israel's glorious redemption holding out the promise of a greater day of liberty to those who still chafe under the yoke of oppression, is the resounding note in its celebration today. During the Passover week the Matzoth, uneavened bread, is eaten. This food is characterized as the "bread of affliction," and is a reminder of the hasty exodus of the Israelites from the land

of oppression. The Feast of the Passover is ushered in with a home ceremony, the "Seder," on the eve of the festival, in which all members of the household participate in reading a richly-adorned tale of leliverance, the "Haggadah," reciting the various events leading up to the exodus and immediately following. This celebration breathes an exuberant spirit of thankfulness and joy, and is replete with ongs and thanksgiving. ### LIQUOR IMPORTATION HAD LITTLE EFFECT ON DISPENSARY SALE

**Ontario Government Sold Over** Two Millions in Seven Months.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, April 6.- The moonshiner pesn't need to get caught to increase Ontario revenue, according to the report of the Ontario License Commission, abled in the Legislature today. The booze he makes and gets seized is taken by the board and redistilled and sold for industrial purposes. Last year the revenue from this source to the pro-vince was \$37,000. Real booze, too, when it is seized, has

a double revenue to the province. First there is the fine, and then the board takes the liquor and sells it in the dispensaries. The large sum of \$72.737.43 was derived in sales of liquor which had been seized last year.

Twenty permits for the manufacture of pretice where were ligued in 1919. of native wines were issued in 1919, and 530 permits for industrial concerns to use alcohol for manufacturing pur-

Considerable liquor was donated to provincial and other hospitals for medicinal purposes. Large quantities of in-ferior liquor were redistilled "with excellent results." It was turned into 65 over-proof alcohol. The report adds significantly "further like revenue will' doubtless be obtained from time to

"Revocation of the Dominion order-in-council prohibiting liquor importa-tions has affected the volume but little, for the reason doubtless that the dis-pensaries have the confidence of the public as to quality, price and service, as compared with the traffickers be-yond the province whose aim is the largest and speedlest profits obtainable" says the report.

Dispensaries' Profits.

The net profits of the dispensaries for the seven months are reported as \$376.094, or 20.20 per cent of the sales.

Regarding the policy purused the report says: "The board aims at a basis of gross profit of 33 1-3 per cent on the sale price with discounts to druggists. doctors and manufacturers; to hospitals the board sells at 5 per cent gross profit, which means less than cost when overhead charges are included."

CONVICTIONS DECREASED. TORONTO, April 6.—Although convictions under the Ontario temperance act decreased from 3.285 to 2.447 during the year 1919, revenue from fines col-lected in the same period advanced from \$204.514.38 to \$231,833.80 in the same period, according to the annual report of the Ontario license commislature this afternoon. Total sales for the seven months' period were \$2.010.404.23, and gross profits \$713,168.65. Gross profits were 35.47 per cent of the sales, and net profits 20.20 per cent. There were 43 convictions against holders of standard hotel licenses for breaches of the Ontario temperance act during the year, and 2,504 convictions against other persons. There were 479 dismissals. The figures for 1918 were: Against licenses, 43 convictions; other convictions, 3,238; dismissals.

For the year ending April 30, 1919, here were 29 convictions for viola-ions of the Canada Temperance act, which is in force in Huron, Manitoulin and Perth Counties. There were also three dismissals. The previous year convictions totalled 93, and dis-

nissals 15.

Total Fines Collected.







Unusual Prevalence in March Had Bad Effect.

SUBDIVIDE PROPERTY

contagious diseases among the children of the city during the month of March, both the enrollment and the average attendance of the public schools showed a decrease over the corresponding month of 1919, according to the monthly school report made by Inspector C. B. Edwards at a meeting of the board of education Tuesday afternoon.

The total enrollment for the public schools, including the kindergarten and the primary department, was 7,885, while last year it was 8,058, showing a decrease of 173. The average attendance for March this year was 6.698 career.

As Brigginshaw, the villain of the while last year the average was 7,212, piece, Mr. Carlisle Hannah has an op- giving a decrease for this year of 514. The contagious diseases in order of prevalence were: Mumps, scarlet fever,

whooping cough, diphtheria and chickenpox. The chief dental inspector reports a total of 466 operations during the month of March performed by Dr Moore at the central clinic, and at the prophylactic clinic 619, conducted by himself.

Preparations have begun for the public school festival chorus, which, it is expected, will be held in May. The musical part has hitherto been under the direction of Mr. Quantz, assisted by several teachers. The co-operation of the board has been requested. W. H. T. Mooney, principal of the Collegiate Institute, reported a general increase in the enrollment and the at-


